CLASSROOM EXPECTATIONS

Notebook:

You will need a three-ring binder for this class. All notes, quizzes, assignments and tests will be kept in the binder. You are responsible for keeping up with all notes, project information, rubrics and assignments.

Classroom Rules:

Consequences for not following classroom rules

1st: Verbal warning

2nd: In class isolation and communication with parent

3rd: 30 minute teacher detention and communication with parent

4th and beyond: Referral to appropriate administrator

Attendance: As stated in the student handbook.

An unexcused tardy or absence equals a zero in any work that is graded by the teacher during the time not in class. Only three parent notes are allowed per semester for a total of three missed days. All other absences or tardies must have a medical or legal excuse in order to be excused. You must be present **thirty (30) minutes** during a class period to be counted as present. (This is relevant for exam exemptions as well.) If a student is absent, s/he should e-mail the teacher to inquire about the work. Also, calling a classmate to inquire about work done or work to be done is highly recommended!

<u>**Tardies:**</u> school wide policy. Your tardies are now cumulative throughout every class. Please see your student handbook regarding the Tardy Policy and how that will impact your grade exemption possibilities during finals. Be on time to every class!

<u>Make-Up Work:</u> A parent excuse must be brought in within three (3) days of returning to school. For every day absent, the student has one day to make-up the work. For any excused absence or tardy, it is the **student's** responsibility to see the teacher the first day back or call a classmate regarding any missed assignments, quizzes, tests, etc.. Make-up times are before and after school and must be scheduled with the teacher in advance. If a time is not scheduled during the allotted time frame, a zero will be given for the missed work. If the assignments were assigned prior to the absence, the student will be required to do the work with the rest of the class on the specified date(s) unless **prior arrangements** have been made with the teacher.

Recovery Policy:

This year we are focusing on Mastery Learning, but our recovery policy has changed and is strictly enforced. I am still willing to work with all students to learn the material and to have their grade reflect their learning. But simply retaking an exam is not an option. You must be actively trying to master the material and completing all assignments given before you will be allowed to recover a grade.

The Foreign Language Department has adopted the following recovery policy:

- must attempt work first (no recovery for zeros not attempted)
- Only summative grades can be recovered after a tutoring session
- Tutoring and/or recovery packet will be required.
- Strict 2 week window for recovery after the grade is given

Cheating:

Students found cheating will receive a zero for the assignment, quiz, test or final exam. Student may be referred to an administrator and a parent contacted.

Hall Passes:

Students should not ask to leave the room during the first 15 minutes of class or the last 15 minutes of class unless it is an absolute emergency. Only 1 student is allowed out of the classroom at a time. You must have a pass to leave the room.

Vocabulary: Vocabulary terms will be presented and concepts and definitions developed as the material is presented in class. In Spanish IV, we will continue learning more vocabulary and grammar. However, we will spend a great deal of time conversing, writing, reading and listening in Spanish. We will also study many aspects of Spanish and Hispanic cultures in Spanish.
