Characterization in Arthur Miller's The Crucible

Rebecca Nurse	Round & Static	Nurturer, Motherly figure: "Rebecca walks across the room to the bed. Gentleness exudes from her. Betty is quietly whimpering, eyes shut. Rebecca simply stands over the child, who gradually quiets" (24, 1). Wisdom: "A child's spirit is like a child, you can never catch it by running after it; you must stand still, and, for love, it will soon itself come back" (25, 1). Martyr

Paragraph response:

In Arthur Miller's *The* Crucible, Rebecca Nurse, a pillar in the community of Salem, Massachusetts and Godfearing Puritan woman, is a round character, a character who has more than one character trait. *Nurse, a mother and grandmother to over 20 children, is both a motherly figure and voice of reason in an era of hysteria and fear for the supernatural.* For example, as Rebecca walks toward Betty while she is sick "Gentleness exudes from her....[she] simply stands over the child, who gradually quiets" (24). The stage directions above indicate that Rebecca is a motherly figure to Betty who is bed-ridden from unknown causes because it is merely her presence that relieves Betty's distress. *In addition, Rebecca also represents wisdom.* A few lines later, as Rebecca explains that Betty is simply pretending to be sick she says "A child's spirit is like a child, you can never catch it by running after it; you must stand still, and, for love, it will soon itself come back" (25). Here, Rebecca urges Rev. Parris to disregard witchcraft as the cause for Betty's distress and suggests that the cure is patience. Rebecca contends that Betty will soon become bored and her sickness will cease. Not only does Rebecca nurture Betty but she also sees that Betty's sickness is simply a game meant to facilitate attention, illustrating wisdom while others are hysterical thus showing that Rebecca is a round character.
