Unit 14 - 16:

Late Gothic Art in Italy through the Early Renaissance in Europe (Northern & Italian) How did artworks begin to develop Humanism through new subject matters, depictions of realism and development of linear perspective?

Student will develop an altarpiece based on their representation of humanism and personal experience (Late Gothic). Student focus on the main creations in painting during the early Renaissance in Northern Europe: New subject matter (Landscapes & Portraits), and symbolism depicted through realism. Student will also focus on the early Renaissance in Italy creation of Linear Perspective (Masaccio).

Student will need to research the following artworks to understand the specific new creations (mentioned above) as well as the style based on various regions during the 14th & 15th centuries.

Student will create an altarpiece using either traditional tempera or oil paint. The altarpiece may be a diptych or a triptych. The size and shape is open. Student should manipulate symbolism through realism as well as add linear perspective. (Keep in mind the common mistakes made in perspective in the early years of its development). Student may manipulate the subject matter as needed to meet the theme of their representation of humanism and personal experience.

Student will be graded on accuracy of development/creation based on research of art period styles as well as effort and craftsmanship.

The artwork needs notecards of information explaining the new creations in paintings during that time period to be displayed in front of the piece as well as an additional notecard with their artist's statement of the work they created.
