Dual Enrollment

The Dual Enrollment (DE) program provides funding for 9th-12th grade students who are dually enrolled at a Georgia high school and a participating eligible postsecondary institution in Georgia. These students take post-secondary coursework for credit towards both high school graduation and postsecondary degree, diploma, or certificate requirements.

- The DE program covers tuition, mandatory fees, and required textbooks.
- The student must apply and be accepted to a participating eligible postsecondary institution.
- The student and parent/guardian must sign a Student Participation Agreement during a follow-up advisement session with the high school counselor.
- Eligible students may participate in high school competitive and other extracurricular events.
- Courses do not count against any maximum hourly caps for the HOPE scholarships or grants.
- Students are responsible for keeping up with high school information.
- The DE dual-credit program will pay a maximum of 15 semester hours or 12 quarter hours per student and per postsecondary institution.

High School Counts

The courses you take earn credits towards graduation. Failure to achieve the correct number of credits, or the correct graduation requirements, will result in a failure to graduate. In addition, your high school grades will be used to figure your GPA (Grade Point Average). Your grades, credits, and EOC test scores will all be on your transcript (your official high school academic record).

Grade Point Average (GPA): Your Grade Point Average (GPA) is the average of your semester (or end of term) grades, starting with your FRESHMAN year.

Forsyth County Schools uses a 4.0 scale in which:

A=4, B=3, and C=2. No credit is awarded for a failing grade.

An additional point is added to the weighted GPA for an AP/DE course.

Class Rank refers to how high schools show where students stand in relation to the other members of their class. The student with the highest GPA is number one; the student with the next highest GPA is number two, and so on. Class rank is written as two numbers (35/675). The first number is the student's place in the class and the second number is the total number of students in the class. You can find your class rank on your unofficial transcript in Parent Portal.

<u>Transcript</u>: Your transcript details your academic achievement in grades 9-12.

A transcript is a copy of your high school record and includes the following information:

- •Grades and credits for each course completed, beginning with grade 9
- Current cumulative GPA and Class Rank
- Anticipated graduation date
- EOC test scores

An official transcript has a signature, stamp, or seal verifying its authenticity. An unofficial transcript is exactly the same as an official transcript, except that it has no signature, stamp, or seal. Students can follow the appropriate procedures for getting a copy of their transcript by following the instructions on the Lambert High School Counseling Webpage.

The GPA Mystery

High School Cumulative GPA

All grades on the transcript are converted from numerical grades to a 4.0 scale and averaged where each:

A=4 B=3 C=2 F=0

Core GPA

- Only English, Math, Science, Social Studies and World Language course grades are included
- Grades are converted to the 4.0 scale and averaged

HOPE GPA

- Calculated by GSFC.
- All English, Math, Science, Social Studies and World Language course grades earned in high school. Dual Enrollment credits are counted.
- Middle school grades <u>do NOT</u> count
- Numeric grades are converted to the 4.0 scale and averaged
- Each AP/DE core course grade receives an additional .5 points except if an A is earned.

College GPA

Colleges use your transcript to help calculate your admission GPA. How they calculate the GPA is determined by the college. Your college GPA most likely will differ from your high school GPA. Contact the college to find out which formula they use.

TIP: Lunch and Learn is a great time for students to ask questions about their GPA, class rank, or other things they're unsure of. There are counselors available in the counseling office during this time. If your counselor is not available to meet, please complete an appointment request form.
