Course Description: This course is a survey of the political, economic, social, and cultural aspects of the United States throughout its history. Consideration is given to artistic and scientific contributions as well as contemporary links to the past. The first semester will cover the periods from European exploration up to Reconstruction. The second semester begins with the Expansion and continues to the present.

Student Expectations and Achievement

The high school United States history course provides students with a comprehensive, intensive study of major events and themes in United States history. Beginning with early European colonization, the course examines major events and themes throughout United States history. The course concludes with significant developments in the early 21st century. Mastery of the Georgia Performance Standards will be expected of all students. Mastery is defined as achieving a minimum of 90% of the course content. Mastery of those standards should be evident with an 'Exceeds' score on the Georgia Milestone for US history.

UNIT REPAIR POLICY

In an effort to aid in student mastery, students will have the opportunity to participate in Unit Repair if he/she makes a 73 or lower on a unit assessment (as defined by the teacher).*

- 1. In order to receive this opportunity, the *student* must initiate the desire to reassess and communicate with the teacher to receive instructions.
- 2. Students will be required to complete coursework, as defined by the teacher, to show a greater understanding of the material to reassess.
- 3. The student has 2 weeks from the date the graded test is returned to complete the practice work and take the reassessment. The communication, completion of coursework, and reassessment must all take place within the allotted two weeks.
- 4. Reassessment cannot be given during regular class time. Students must make arrangements at the teacher's convenience.
- 5. Students will receive an average score of the first and second assessment for their final assessment grade. The second reassessment must be different from the first assessment, while covering the same standards/content.

• Student attendance during the unit;

^{*}Teachers will take into consideration the following when determining student eligibility for reassessment:

- Student effort/preparation during the unit;
- Student completion of unit work/assignments during the unit.

- o Book Cover for textbook by Monday, Aug. 10th
