Evidence of Success

Increase in both raw numbers and percentage of Blacks, Black Males and Hispanics in enrollment in AP/IB/AICE over the previous year. Hispanic males showed an increase in numbers participating but not in percentage. At the same the gap for the previous year was not reduced in any area due to an overall corresponding increase in both Whites and White Males.

For the entire time period (2011-12 to 2015-16) the number of Black and Black males has increased, but more importantly the percentage of participation has doubled in that time frame. Hispanic and Hispanic males raw numbers have both increased in the time interval. Percentage increase of Hispanics has increased by almost 20%, but for Hispanic males, the percentage participation has decreased from 15% to 11%.

Methods and Strategies

All high schools have increased the number of students completing Algebra 1 by the end of 9th grade by scheduling all incoming freshman who are scoring level 1 and 2 on 8th grade FCAT Math into both Algebra 1A and Algebra 1B. This should allow more students to complete Algebra 2 by 11th grade and open the opportunity for AP courses in the senior year. Several high schools have decided to end Honors English at the 11th and 12th grade level and offer AP English in place of these courses. Students who were in the honors track will be required to take AP English Language, AP English Literature or DE English. Escambia County has become the first district in Northwest Florida to join with NMSI (National Math and Science Initiative) to encourage more student participation in AP course work in English, Math and Science. Teachers and students will receive a monetary incentive to successfully complete AP exams. AP teachers will receive extra summer training and mentoring during the school year. Elementary, middle, and non-AP high school teachers will all receive training in skills and techniques to better prepare students for AP coursework in high school.

The District implemented an opportunity for rising 6th graders to take 6th grade math course during the summer. This opportunity allows students multiple pathways for accelerating in the field of mathematics.

In 2015-2016 the opportunity was opened for all middle school students to accelerate through a virtual option. Elementary and secondary mathematics specialists offered a parent information nights to provide information on math advancement. Elementary schools identified all rising sixth grade students that met the criteria for an advance math program

Accountability Measure and Timelines

As part of the NMSI grant, all participating high schools must show increased participation and results on the exams in each year of the three year program. The expectation of increased participation is focused on encouraging underrepresented groups to undertake the level of rigor found in the AP curriculum.

Evidence of Success

For the past year, there was an increase in raw number of Blacks, Black Males, and Hispanic Males participating in DE, but only Blacks showed a percentage increase. Hispanics overall showed a decrease in participation.

For the entire time period (2011-12 to 2015-16), the only area that shows an increase in both numbers and percentage is Blacks overall. Hispanics and Hispanic Males both maintained their percentage of participation but Hispanics actually showed a decrease in participation.

Methods/Strategies from the 2013-14 Update

All high schools have increased the number of students completing Algebra 1 by the end of 9th grade by scheduling all incoming freshman who are scoring Level 1 and Level 2 on 8the grade FCAT Math into both Algebra 1A and Algebra 1B. This should allow more students to complete Algebra 2 by 11th grade and open the opportunity for DE math courses in the senior year. Several high schools have decided to end Honors English at the 11th and 12th grade level and offer AP English or DE English in place of these courses. Students who were in the honors track will be required to take AP English Language, AP English Literature or DE English. Although not related to the goals of the NMSI program, many students will benefit from the program and may opt for DE over AP coursework.

Accountability Measure and Timelines

The impact of both the Algebra 1A/1B block and the NMSI grant will take up to three years to see the impact on DE. The change in English assignments in 11th and 12th grade should show an increase in participation this year at schools with DE English programs in place.

Significant increase in number participating for Blacks (over 100%) and Black Males (29.7%) and moderate increases in raw numbers in both Hispanics and Hispanic Males. All four areas showed significant increases in percentage of participation and although Whites and White Males increased, the gap decreased in all four areas.

Methods/Strategies from the 2013-14 Update

The additional training from NMSI, the blocking of Algebra 1A and Algebra 1B, plus the increased requirements for Scholar Diploma for the state of Florida, will all increase participation in Level 3 courses for all groups over the next three years.

Accountability Measure and Timelines

Enrollment in Level 3 classes as well as AP/IB/ACE/DE will all be monitored over the three year time frame of the NMSI grant. Performance will also be monitored since that is now a larger component of the new high school grade in Florida.

B. Review the employment data to identify any racial/ethnic or gender underrepresentation in administrative and faculty positions.

The data in the report does represent the District's demographic data. However, the District's data reveals a disparity between the make-up of the District's student population and the workforce employed by the District in the administrative and instructional areas.

The District implemented a new procedure for the 2009-2010 academic year concerning annual contract non-renewal which is continuing. All annual contract non-renewals are reviewed during the staffing process to ensure compliance will all Federal, State and District laws, case law, guidelines, initiatives (including Florida Equity Act) and rules. The review process is an effort to continue the District's initiative to recruit and retain certified/highly qualified gender specific and minority instructors. Superintendent Thomas considers the District's diversity plan objectives formulated under the Florida Equity Act when reviewing selections for administrative and professional appointments.

The District continues to use strategies to stress the importance to each site-based administrator's role in employing a diversified work force as evidenced by School Board Rule 2.04 (14) (Diversity Component).

Despite the difficult economic situation in the State of Florida, the District gave an average 2% pay raise during the 2015-2016 academic year which assisted in boosting our starting teacher salaries closer to the state average. This raise allows the District to become more competitive in our effort to recruit minority instructors into the District. We are continuing

to address the District's financial position to determine if we can address our salary issue for the 2016-2017 academic year.

The data contained in the report reflect an increase in hiring black teachers from 330 to 379, an increase in Hispanic teachers from 54 to 60, an increase in other from 51 to 63 and an increase in male teachers from 498 to 582 over the 2015-2016 academic year. We showed increases in hiring black District Administrators from 5 to 7 and increase in black principals from 9 to 10 during the same time period. We have also continued a training component for individuals seeking entrance into our principal pool (prerequisite for school-based administrative positions). This component is to ensure individuals previously not successful the opportunity to increase their ability to make the cut scores for entrance into the pool. This training component has been highly successful.

C. Identify specific methods and strategies used to address any racial/ethnic or gender underrepresentation in administrative, instructional and guidance positions.

In the spring of 2016, we sent recruiting teams to 16 institutions. Part of our recruit efforts were to attract minority/underrepresented graduates into our teaching positions. The recruiting team provided teaching contracts to 47 individual to include 7 black, 6 males and 2 Hispanic/Other underrepresented graduates from the college recruiting trips. We also had over 500 individuals attend our teacher fair and hiring event looking for teaching jobs within Escambia County School District. As a result of the teacher hiring event we hired 78 teachers including 11 black teachers, 1 Native American teacher, 10 male teachers and 1 Hispanic teacher. We continue to place great emphasis on attracting individuals typically underrepresented in our teaching ranks into the profession.

PART VII: PREGNANT AND PARENTING STUDENTS

 - Pregnant and parenting students remain at their zoned district school to continue their education. Students are placed on home instruction after giving birth. When they return to school, if needed, the District provides child care services through contracted day care providers in our county. If the student should need transportation to the day care and school, then the school district provides this option as well. Our district contracts with Children's Home Society to provide to pregnant and parenting teens. This contract provides a full time Case Manager to conduct a group instruction with pregnant and parenting students in monthly support groups to cover such topics as: pregnancy/prenatal care, labor and delivery, medical services for parents and infants, child development, parenting skills, infant care, Healthy Start program, substance abuse prevention, child abuse/neglect prevention, relationships and domestic violence, employment skills, family planning with emphasis on sexual abstinence, and available community resources/contacts/locations.
- (2) If the district operates a separate facility for pregnant and parenting students, how are students informed of the different curricula, services or other options available at the facility versus what is available at their home schools
 - Our district does not operate a single facility for pregnant and parenting students.
- (3) How are school counselors and administrators trained to effectively advise pregnant or parenting students of their options to participate in regular classroom activities or enroll in a special program, and their access to curricular, extracurricular, and ancillary service programs?
