


School is very important.

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## Waking hours children spend learning ...

How much of that time would you guess children spend:

Learning at school?
Learning at home?

## More than



Less than 15% of a child's time through age 18 is spent in school. Time at Home vs. Time in School 180 days per school year.

#### TOTAL TIME

- 16 waking hours/day
- 365 days per year
- 18 years

Total of 105,120 waking hours by age 18.

#### TIME IN SCHOOL

- 6.5 hours per school day
- 180 school days per year
- 13 school years

Total of 15,210 hours in school by age 18.

#### Children spend much more time learning at home than at school.

85% Home and other 15% At school

#### Coleman Report: Family is most powerful influence on student achievement.



Research studies over the years have found similar results.



#### Parents boost reading success.

Children who practiced reading at home with parents made bigger gains.








## Parents can raise achievement test scores.

University of Michigan study: 1 hour = 1/2 point

#### The evidence is clear:



Parents, better than anyone else, teach their children the essentials for success in life:

- Right from wrong
- Respect for others
- Family values religious, cultural, political
- Family traditions
- Sense of being part of a family group
- Sense of self



Parents, better than anyone else, teach their children the essentials for success in life:

- Self-worth
- Self-respect
- Self-discipline
- Work ethic
- Manners
- Motivation
- Character traits
- Love



Research proves that students with involved parents are more likely to:

 Complete more homework.



## Parents' best approach to homework:

- Establish a daily time and place for homework.
- Set high, realistic expectations that homework will be done, and done well. (Homework Schedule)



Discuss weekly priorities (test, homework) and help child to establish a plan to complete tasks.

Teaching your child to "Think/Plan Ahead"!



Allow them to see or experience the consequences of not thinking ahead or planning! (Use yourself as a model)

#### In summary, as busy parents you can:



- 1. Make sure your child gets to school every day.
- 2. Make good use of car time.



- 3. Exchange notes with your child.
- 4. Schedule time with your child.

- 5. Encourage reading.
- 6. Limit kids' "screen time."



- 7. Get to know your child's teachers.
- 8. Set a time for homework.
- 9. Provide learning resources at home.
- 10. Open communication lines.
- 11. Discuss test & follow up
