

She always wanted to write. She kept waiting for the perfect time in her life to start writing, but after more than twenty years of designing book jackets for other people, she realized that the perfect time would never really present itself. So, she decided to just go for it. *Wonder* is her first novel. Although, she didn't design the cover, she sure does love it.

- if needed, additional explanation of what it means to you.


