• It is with great pride and excitement that we share the wonderful news that Chief Joseph Elementary School has been named a *National Blue Ribbon School!* Only two schools earned this award in the entire state of Montana in 2024. This prestigious recognition is a testament to the hard work and dedication of the students, staff, and families at Chief Joseph Elementary. The *National Blue Ribbon Schools* program honors schools for their overall academic excellence or progress in closing achievement gaps, and Chief Joseph's commitment to providing a high-quality education for every student is truly something to celebrate. It also highlights the strong partnership between the school and the families and community members who support its success. Congratulations to Chief Joseph Elementary on this outstanding achievement!

Helping Hands – Working together to support our students and staff.

• As we approach the heart of the school year, many families begin looking ahead to one of the most exciting milestones—graduation. Let me explain how graduation dates are calculated in Montana to ensure everyone understands the process and timeline. In Montana, graduation dates are determined by state regulations that set the required number of instructional hours for students to complete before they can graduate. For high school students, this means accumulating a minimum of 1,080 hours of instructional time over the course of the year, with the exception of seniors who can have 1050 hours of instruction (the difference of 5 days at the end of the year). Counting backwards 5 days from the last day of school, seniors will graduate the weekend before other students recess for summer. I hope this helps clarify how graduation dates are calculated, and as always, we are here to answer any questions you may have as we prepare to celebrate the Class of 2025.
