Science- Miss Beekler took 35 AP Biology students to the 1st Annual Healthcare Career Summit at Dallastown Area High School. Students from 11 school districts got to hear from 40 careers in the health field and watch them in action as they act out a scenario. 
Students in Mrs. Plassio's biology classes have been studying cells. They are doing classic labs such as the onion and cork cells, but have also been challenged with finding moving organisms, and trying to see very small bacteria under the scope. Students have shared they like seeing things that they have, such as their own cheek cells and the prepared blood slides. Some kids were fascinated with the moving live euglena; "Where did they come from?" was a common question.



From October 15- October 17, 18 students from Cliff and three staff members, Mrs. Eisner, Ms. Beekler, and Mrs. Haun had the opportunity to attend a trip of a lifetime to the Karen Noonan Center with the Chesapeake Bay Foundation. Every year the trip is different from the previous year when it comes to what they are able to catch, see, experience and you never know what the weather may bring. Mrs. Burrows' biology class spent a few days researching and learning about clipping, growing, and maintaining succulents. Bonus points were given when tasks were completed in a creative or clever way. Points were also deducted when missions were not completed correctly. It was intense, engaging, fun, and VERY competitive. The winners were: Senior Julia Breneman, Sophomore Alexis Slaseman, and Freshman Bianca Valadez Vechinski.

Sra. Leland's Spanish 1 Classes:

Students are just finishing unit 3 which promotes the acquisition of vocabulary they will use while visiting places in a city, using different modes of transportation or having a conversation at a restaurant. Students have also learned about interesting places to visit in Mexico City, the murals of Diego Rivera, Mexico City's landmarks and cuisine and Frida Kahlo and her art. Besides learning the present tense of the verb ir (to) and -er verbs, students are also using ir a + infinitive to talk about things they are going to do in the future to create bucket lists. This

week, students are creating maps of their Spanish city and writing sentences to indicate the location of each place on the map. We are also having a Skype interview with Cooper Clark, a sophomore at Cedar Cliff currently studying in Madrid, Spain. Students are looking forward to learning more about the challenges and benefits of becoming an exchange student. Our week will not be complete without our International Education Week's Food Day on Friday, November 22. Students are bringing a dish from their heritage or a Spanish speaking country to share with other classes in the World Language Department before Thanksgiving recess.

English Department Update

New inductees into NHS have been hard at work serving the community within and outside our building. They are embarking on a gift buying campaign for local families, so there is something under their trees this holiday. They will assist with conference days and directing parents through the building next week.

The stuffed animals drive is wrapping up and schools will begin counting the donations in preparation for pick up on Monday. The bears will be delivered to Hershey for the annual throwing of bears onto the ice. The donations will then find a new home through first responders helping children in trauma. This is the second annual collaboration between the district and WSEA, and we hope it is one that continues into the future.

Mrs. Hoch's seniors are working their way through the novel All American Boys, which deals with the difficult themes of racism, police brutality, and justice. They have gone on multiple site visits to manufacturing firms in order to see what kinds of jobs local employers are in need of. The next trip is scheduled for December 6 to visit Ames True Temper in Camp Hill.

Mrs. Hoch's A.P. students are experiencing what it is like to create a lesson from the ground up to teach. The students were required to research logical fallacy types, select one, and build a lesson with an assessment for their peers.

In Ms. Boweman's AP Literature course, we just finished reading Ralph Ellison's Invisible Man and will be writing about it in various ways. After the holiday break, the students will each choose a complex novel published after the year 2000 to read independently. The College Board will be focusing on the test to include more contemporary texts.

In English 101/College Comp 1, the students are writing and revising their main argumentation papers that are due after the Thanksgiving break. They are using scholarly journal articles found through HACC's library to support their assertions.

The English Language Development (ELD) program at CC currently represents 56 students from 22 countries and 15 languages. Six students were recently inducted into the ESL Honor Society that was held during the World Language Honor Society inductions. Students in English for EL I class have been working with aquaponics students to research plants from their native countries that could possibly be grown in the lab. Ms. Sementelli and Mrs. Rizzardo have been working to expand our ELD curriculum with two new classes this year in order to reach the diverse needs of our students.

Ms. Forsyth's classes are currently learning the effects of an author's use of certain literary devices and the element of setting and how they can affect characters, conflict, mood, and theme. They will then analyze selections of literature for the effects of the author's use of these devices and then write an original description of a setting of their choice using some of these devices.

Mrs. Wolfe's Creative Writing class is participating in National Novel Writing Month by setting ambitious goals for themselves to writer longer pieces of fiction. Student's goals range from 5,000 words to 50,000. Even Mrs. Wolfe is participating!

This week, 9th grade students in Miss Russell's classes will begin their unit on Monster by Walter Dean Myers. In addition to studying the unique literary elements of this novel, we will dive into the issue of bias and discovering our own biases. We are excited to welcome Mr. Santiago into our classroom throughout this unit and are eager to see how his insight and this novel can interact!

Art- The CC NAHS and Honors Studio students are in the developing stages of a collaboration with Allen Middle school to develop a "Visual Response" mural on a wall in the ES department. The mural project is designed to provide positive peer mentorship between the HS and MS students while at the same time giving the MS students ownership in the construction of the mural and a better sense of belonging in their larger school community.

Physical Education- The Cedar Cliff physical education department purchased amazing little pieces of technology called "activity trackers" that monitor each student's progress toward fitness goals. We can now monitor our students' daily steps, distance, heart rate and calories burned throughout a class. Students and teachers can gather and review data collected with the activity trackers. The information will show them activity levels, areas they could improve and how they compare to classmates.

Friends Forever Club- Cedar Cliff Friends Forever kicked off the start of the holiday season celebrating their FRIENDS-GIVING dinner on Thursday November 14 in the cafeteria where they enjoyed pizza and turkey subs with sides provided by students and families. e-Sports- Mrs. Haun is beyond excited to report that an e-Sports team is starting at CCHS! E-Sports is competitive video gaming. Technology Education - Students in Mr. Kambic's Applied Engineering course designed a working bridge. At first, they had to design the bridge using West Point Bridge Designer program. They then built a one quarter scale model of the bridge to test I out with 120 pounds of weight. After that was proven successful, the students built a full scale bridge eight feet in length. The students in the group walked across the bridge, one at a time, to demonstrate the safety of the bridge.



Cedar Cliff's Construction Technology class had the opportunity to design and build a modular greenhouse. The class researched local building codes and applied them to the design, construction, and transportation of the structure. Students worked together as a team to lay out the foundation, walls, custom-designed tresses, and door to meet real-life constraints. Students finished the greenhouse with paint and the disassembled the structure to be transported to the final construction site.







On November 9th, CCHS JROTC Cadets Mitchell James, Joshua Weber, Aven Sandoval, Khoi Ngo, and Rebecca DuBose performed Color Guard duties at the Army Heritage Center's (AHEC) unveiling of the new World War II D-Day educational exhibit titled "Liberation Pointe." The new display honors the sacrifices of D-Day and WWII veterans. The display is part of an Eagle Scout project designed to celebrate the 75th Anniversary of the D-Day landings. Reenactors dressed in period military garb attended the ceremony while four actual D-Day veterans were also in attendance. Cadets were able to witness and take part in the dedication as the WWII veterans poured sand from each of the five D-Day beaches into the base of the monument.

His unit fought in Europe with the 104th Infantry Division from late 1944 into 1945. The JROTC cadets formally opened the ceremony with the presentation of the colors and closed the ceremony as they retired the colors to conclude the event.





Over the course of the Veteran's Day weekend, JROTC cadets from Cedar Cliff High School performed a totals of eleven separate Color Guards in support of area schools, businesses, and community organizations as many people took time out of their busy schedules to honor those who have served and sacrificed for our nation.
