The Elwood-John H. Glenn High School athletics program has much to be proud of this year. Several of its teams were recognized as Outstanding Sportsmanship Teams for the 2011-2012 Fall Season, including the Girls Varsity Volleyball Team.

#### **EDUCATION HIGHLIGHTS**

### Literacy and Learning: Developing Writers K-12

In an ongoing effort to improve the District's curriculum and align itself with the New York State Common Core Learning Standards, the District has revamped its writing curriculum over the past year. From kindergarten through grade twelve, all levels have begun to implement new units of study, geared to ensure that students are better prepared with the writing skills they need to succeed upon graduation.

At Harley Avenue Primary School, the new writing sequence was developed last year by a curriculum writing team. The program was designed so that children expand upon their writing skills as they move across grade levels. For example, in kindergarten, journal writing is introduced, which may include the students writing words or drawing pictures of personal narratives and dictating their stories to the teacher. At the first-grade level, the students also complete personal narratives, but are encouraged to write in complete sentences and to use proper punctuation, spelling, and grammar. In the second grade, students are asked to use sequencing words when writing their narratives, and are expected to incorporate details into their writing.

While the personal narratives are just one unit of study at Harley, the other units such as response to

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
literature, expository writing, and poetry also follow a similar progression. Prior to leaving Harley, secondgrade students also begin to write non-fiction reports, incorporating charts and diagrams.

At James H. Boyd Intermediate School, the overall goal is to establish reciprocity between reading and writing. At all grade levels, teachers place an emphasis on non-fiction reading and writing, and students are asked to respond to literature and to write across a variety of genres.

To complement what students learn in the classroom, Boyd routinely hosts author visits and cultural arts programs to emphasize the importance of reading and writing. From "Child's Play," a troupe that acts out skits written by Boyd students, to author Brian Hines, who conducted a writer's workshop for fourth and fifth-grade students, Boyd provides its students with a myriad of opportunities to develop the skill of writing. Principal Pamela Fine states, "Students love meeting and working with authors. These experts serve as mentors to students. It is wonderful to see how excited children become when they learn how a story was developed and the craft the author used to construct the text.'

When students enter sixth grade at Elwood

Middle School, a large emphasis is placed on ensuring that proper writing takes place across all curricular areas – not just in English class. Students begin to write persuasive essays, informational papers, and compositions that support or defend an idea. Overall, they use critical skills as they write and begin to acquire the skills they will need to compose a full research paper by the time they



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are seniors in high school. Also at the middle school level, students begin to incorporate the use of technology into their writing by using Google Docs and Efolio to write collaboratively as a team.

By the time students enter high school, they have a solid writing foundation and are prepared to begin work at a higher level. For the 2011-12 school year, the high school writing curriculum was further adjusted through curriculum mapping to develop specific units by grade level. In addition to studying literature in each grade level, students gradually learn how to write a research paper, including how to properly cite sources and check their work to ensure they are not inadvertently plagiarizing. From writing an informational paper in grade nine to an openended research paper in grade twelve, the curriculum continues to be refined to ensure that students are college and career ready upon graduation.

Also at the January 19 meeting, **Superintendent Peter Scordo** presented a draft budget to the Board for the 2012-13 school year. The budget, as presented, represents a tax levy increase of 1.98% and eflects all new curriculum changes. Over the course of the next several months, the Board will review the budget and make any necessary adjustments prior to adopting the pending plan in late March. ## **Board Adopts Curriculum Changes**

At its January 19 business meeting, the Elwood Board of Education adopted a set of curriculum changes for the middle and high school levels that take effect with the start of the 2012-13 school year. As presented at the January 5 meeting in detail, the "restructuring" was initiated to align courses with the Common Core Learning Standards and ensure that every student is "Harvard Ready." At the same time, the curriculum changes allow the District to streamline costs in the face of the 2% tax levy cap (see sidebar).

In his presentation in early January, Middle School Principal Dr. Hugh Gigante presented a refined curriculum that not only spoke to the trend in declining projected enrollment for the school, but to how the courses will meet the expectations of the Common Core Standards. Curriculum changes for the sixth grade include:

- Eliminating "0" period so that students can use the time for additional help and/or services
- Integrating library media skills, general music, and computers across the curriculum
- Moving performing music into the school day
- Refining the ELA/Math structure by adding a development class every other day (students will be placed based on skill strengths and weaknesses) and delaying the accelerated math track until the seventh grade
- Moving art and family consumer science to the sixth grade, which will increase the credits from \( \frac{1}{2} \)

For the seventh and eighth grades, changes include the addition of a monitored organizational period every other day for those students who do not receive Academic Intervention Services (AIS). Students needing

AIS in more than one subject would receive those services in lieu of either MST or technology for the seventh grade and in lieu of the art/family and consumer science cycle for the eighth grade. Music will remain as an elective and take place during "0" period. In addition, Modern Issues will be eliminated from the eighth-grade curriculum.

Changes to the high school curriculum were also adopted by the Board of Education. In his address to the Board and community in early January, High School Principal Dr. Vincent Mulieri presented changes that maintain the breadth of the high school program and structure of a comprehensive high school, provide an array of educational options for students, and are fiscally responsible.

Specific changes include a reconfiguration of

the nine-period school day to include a Freshman Seminar for ninth-grade students. The seminar would replace CDOS and health for the freshmen (making CDOS an elective and moving the health requirement to grades 10-12). This seminar would help ninth graders with organizational, learning, technology, and social/emotional skills.

Additional changes at the high school include making Science Research a club with an independent study program and providing more elective options for eleventh and twelfth grades.

## Boyd Celebrates New Playground


