A Cohesive College Preparatory Program

The IB curriculum provides a cohesive and comprehensive liberal arts and sciences program of study for motivated juniors and seniors of differing educational backgrounds, abilities, and interests. It is not just a set of examinations, but a rigorous pre-university program which provides a foundation for life-long education. Courses are offered in six interconnected academic areas. Students pursuing the full diploma benefit from the three core elements that seek to develop them holistically: Theory of Knowledge (TOK), Creativity, Activity and Service (CAS) and the Extended Essay.





The IB Diploma Program at Northport High School

A Self-Selecting Program

The IB Program, while demanding, is open to any student.

It is possible to challenge the full IB Diploma or to take one or more IB Courses during junior and/or senior year.

Who is suited for the IB Program?

IB is for the student who is willing to work hard at his/her studies and wants to be prepared to succeed in college. Students who are successful in the program are:

- curious and enjoy thinking critically and creatively
- genuinely concerned for others and their community at large
- interested in developing an international outlook
- willing to manage several demanding classes simultaneously
- willing to advance personal study habits, including selfdiscipline, self-motivation, & time management

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Core Elements of the Full IB Diploma Program

In addition to a rigorous and cohesive schedule of IB Courses, full IB Diploma Candidates engage in three core elements that are central to the educational philosophy of the Diploma Program.

Theory of Knowledge (TOK)

The TOK course provides students with an opportunity to explore and reflect on the *nature of knowledge* and the *process of knowing*.



This course is composed almost entirely of questions and is often a favorite of IB Diploma Candidates.

In TOK, students reflect on the knowledge, beliefs and opinions that they have built up from their years of academic studies and their lives outside the classroom. The course is intended to be challenging and thought-provoking – as well as empowering – for students.

Theory of Knowledge is a two-semester course that is taken in the spring of the junior year and the fall of the senior year.

Extended Essay (EE)

The Extended Essay is an independent, self-directed research project completed under the advice and guidance of a dedicated mentor who is a Northport faculty member. It provides:



- excellent practical preparation for undergraduate research
- an opportunity for students to investigate a topic of personal interest to them, which relates to one of the student's six Diploma Program subjects or takes the interdisciplinary approach of a World Studies extended essay.

Participation in this process develops the capacity to analyze, synthesize and evaluate knowledge. The Extended Essay is written outside of the classroom on the student's own time. Students begin the Extended Essay process in February of their junior year and submit their essays in the winter of their senior year.

Creativity, Activity, Service (CAS)

CAS involves students in a range of activities alongside their academic studies, engaging them in a personal journey of self-discovery that spans junior and senior years. Students are required to reflect on how their various experiences in one of the three strands – Creativity, Activity, Service – enhance their personal and interpersonal development. In addition, students are required to undertake a CAS project which will challenge them to show initiative, demonstrate perseverance and develop skills such as collaboration, problem solving and decision making.

CAS is an important counterbalance to the academic pressures of the Diploma Program.



Why Choose the International Baccalaureate Program at Northport High School?

Personal Growth

Beyond the external benefits, such as weighted grades and advanced college standing, the true benefit of earning the IB Diploma is intrinsic in nature. The change that occurs within a student academically and personally while pursuing the diploma produces far greater personal growth and satisfaction than the diploma itself.

College and Career Readiness

Amid the many outstanding educational programs at Northport, the IB Program is unique in that it prepares high school students for quality university life in a way no other educational program can. For those who may decide to not go on to college or who do not complete their first year, the program will offer one of the most enriching experiences possible. This is made possible by three key features of the IB Program:

- 1. Academic rigor: Students learn how to learn, how to analyze, how to reach considered conclusions about humankind, its languages and literature, its ways in society, and the scientific forces of its environment. An IB diploma candidate is indeed functioning at a level of an introductory college student.
- 2. Comprehensiveness of the Program: Students encounter rigor throughout <u>all</u> disciplines. Students refine areas of strength and developmentally improve areas of weakness. A significant portion of the course work such as essays, oral commentaries, portfolios, and lab books is submitted for evaluation.
- 3. Internationalism: The IB Program encourages students to think globally and the IB curriculum is based on true international standards. Coursework and exams are graded by an international team of examiners, professionals from North and South America, Europe, Africa, Asia, and Australia who undergo extensive training to ensure uniform standards are maintained worldwide.

College Recognition

In over sixty countries around the world, the IB Diploma is accepted as an entrance qualification for higher education.

In the United States, many institutions of higher learning grant college credit based on IB subject scores.

Universities are eager to attract IB diploma students because:

- They are recognized as being prepared to accept educational challenges.
- They have self-confidence with university level material.
- They have developed the capacity for independent research and study.
- They have cultivated sound thinking and communication skills.
- They engage in extracurricular activities alongside academic studies.
- They think in global terms and have a cultural sensitivity and international orientation.



Comparing the AP and International Baccalaureate Programs

The AP and IB Programs at Northport High School are both successful and highly respected by major colleges and universities throughout the nation. Each program is designed to enrich the high school experience and offer students an excellent opportunity to prepare for advanced study and potentially earn college credit. Students are encouraged to evaluate both programs to determine which course of study is most suitable for them.

The Successful IB Student

Student responsibilities

- Students are expected to share responsibility for creating a challenging and fruitful learning environment. Students should demonstrate mutual respect and consideration for others. This assists in creating an atmosphere of harmony and cooperation, which is conducive to learning.
- Students will spend much time studying outside of class; many IB students utilize both the library and modern technology to gather resources and collaborate regularly with their peers.
- Academic honesty: Maintaining academic integrity within a program is paramount. Within the IB Program, this goal is taken especially seriously. Students must abide by the Northport High School Academic Honesty Policy.
- Assignment due dates: Students must meet course, CAS, and Extended Essay deadlines.
 The IB Coordinator, in consultation with teachers, sets due dates for all student work
 evaluated by the international grading team. Teachers set other major course assignments.
 The timing of submission dates spreads the workload fairly across the two years of the
 program.

How to ensure excellence in IB studies

The IB is a demanding program of study, but well-organized students can do well and still find time to pursue other interests both inside and outside of school. A successful IB student:

- Works consistently throughout the two years of study.
- Makes a study plan for the coming week/month, anticipating deadlines for essays, assignments, etc., and forthcoming sporting and social activities.
- Works in surroundings conducive toward thoughtful study.
- Begins studying sooner rather than later, and in a sustained fashion.
- Follows up recent class notes carefully and checks for clarification with the teacher to ensure he/she understands what is being taught/learned. Class notes are well organized.
- Engages in lively discussion and debate with fellow students and teachers.
- Demonstrates eagerness to ask questions.
- Submits thorough assignments that are carefully researched, analyzed, and presented.



Planning and Scheduling in the IB Program

Course Candidates

Sophomores who wish to enroll in one or more IB courses should communicate their preference to their current teachers in the selected subject areas.

Full Diploma Candidates

 - a. You must take one course from each Group (an IB elective can be used to satisfy group 6)
 - b. You must take at least 3 HL courses
 - c. You may not take more than 4 HL courses
 - d. You may only take up to 2 SL exams during your Junior Year
