Cold Weather

Now that the cold weather has arrived, I'd like to share a few reminders. Children play outside on the playground before school and at lunch recess, unless the temperature is below 20 degrees, or raining hard. It is important to make sure children are properly dressed for the weather, and this is especially important for students who walk to school, or who wait at the bus stop.

My second grade son would wear shorts every day if he had his choice, so I understand how tough it can be to convince your child to dress for the winter cold. Winter jackets, hats, and mittens are appropriate for cold days. Sweatshirts, fleeces, and light jackets that are worn inside will not keep children warm enough to prevent cold injury. Please be sure your child has the correct clothing so that recess can be enjoyed safely. Many children keep an extra pair of mittens stuffed inside a hat in their backpack just in case.

Remember to label everything with your child's name. Labeled clothing is always returned to children when it arrives in Lost and Found. If you need assistance with financing winter gear, or you know of a family in need, please contact Mrs. Cronin. Financial assistance will be handled respectfully and confidentially.

Teacher Gifts

As we approach the holiday season, many parents ask about gifts. Teacher gifts are optional and no one should feel obligated to participate. However, if you are considering a teacher gift, or contributing to a class gift, please note that public employees, including teachers, are not permitted to accept personal gifts with a value of \$50 or higher. Class gifts up to \$150 may be given if the gift is identified as only being

from the class and the identity of individual givers and/or amounts are not identified to the recipient.

The Grade 5 Chorus Winter Music Performance will be Fri., Dec. 16th at 2:00PM in the Gym. This performance is for parents and families of grade 5 students, as well as students in grades K-4.

Lunch Cards

All students are provided with a lunch card beginning in Kindergarten. Families who choose to use the school lunch program, can set up their child's lunch account using the myschoolbucks website linked through the district page. For students who don't regularly purchase lunch, these cards can be used "in a pinch" on days that children forget to bring a lunch. A bill will appear on a monthly statement. Teachers do not eat with students, thus parents and guardians are responsible for communicating lunch plans to their children. Some families may decide that they do not want their children to have access to the lunch card at all, so that their children do not make unapproved lunch purchases. If this is the case, please email your child's teacher and ask them to remove your child's card from circulation. We cannot remove cards on a day by day basis, so removal of the card is an "all or nothing" option. Feel free to contact Mrs. Cronin if you have any questions.

Tech Tidbits from Mr. Goguen

December 5 - 11 is Computer Science Education Week! CSEdWeek is held in recognition of the birthday of computing pioneer Admiral Grace Murray Hopper (December 9, 1906). I also <u>wrote</u> about this topic on 2/26/16.

Why is it important for students to learn computer science?

Computer science is a foundational field for every 21st century career or field of study.

Learning the basics of computer science prepares students for a world that is increasingly dominated by technology. Research shows that students who study computer science also perform better at math.

Besides, computer science is where the jobs are. More than 50% of all jobs in STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math) are computing jobs. Some other stats:

- Computer science is one of the highest-paid college degree for new graduates.
- Computer programming jobs are growing at two times the national average -- but there aren't enough graduates to fill these jobs.
- Nine out of 10 K-12 schools do not offer computer programming classes.
- In 35 out of 50 states, computer science does not even count toward high school graduation.
