# Math Update

This unit also focused on several ways to organize data, such as a circle/pie graph, line plot, and stem and leaf plot. Were you as confused with the stem and leaf plot as I was the first time Ross brought one home? I hope your fifthgrader was able to explain it to you!

Thanks so much for your help on math homework. That little bit of extra practice on skills each day is important.

#### <u>Math Update</u>

We have now practiced both the partial quotients and traditional (column) division methods, and I hope your child is gaining an understanding of at least one of them. Thanks for your help with homework as we practice these skills!

One problem that I have seen as I helped students with these methods is students not knowing basic addition, subtraction, and multiplication facts. Lack of knowledge of these facts slows students down and makes <u>all math</u> more difficult than needed. You can easily find out if your child knows the facts with instant recall by simply quizzing him or her in the car as you travel. If he has to count on fingers or in other ways, more practice is needed. Students should have all facts down to instant recall by now. It is easy to make flashcards or practice on a computer game to further master these facts.

- plot and character The <u>plot</u> of a story includes a problem, rising action as events build in the story. the climax of the story, falling action, and the resolution or ending. <u>Characters</u> in a story tell about themselves by their actions, the things they say, and the way they treat others.
- cause and effect Discuss things that <u>cause</u> something else to happen, or the <u>effects</u> of a happening. What if you changed something in the story? What would be the effects?
- theme and setting <u>Theme</u> is a difficult skill—finding the underlying meaning in a story. <u>Setting</u> is where and when the story takes place.
- sequence The order of events in a story is its <u>sequence</u>.

#### **Subtraction**

Some students are having problems with subtraction, both with knowing basic subtraction facts and with borrowing correctly when working harder subtraction problems. Please sit down with your child, have him do a few subtraction problems, and see if he is counting on fingers for basic facts or having problems with borrowing. If so, working with some flashcards will help, as will giving him one subtraction problem a day. One good idea is to get an inexpensive scratchpad (like a free one from your bank), fill it up with one subtraction problem per page, and have your child work one every day. He can check himself on a calculator and correct as needed. Subtraction is a skill that should be well-mastered by now!
