CORE BODY OF KNOWLEDGE

GLOBAL STUDIES ACADEMIC Grade 9

For each of the sections that follow students may be required to analyze, recall, explain, interpret, apply, or evaluate the particular concepts being taught.

COURSE DESCRIPTION

This Academic Global Studies course will provide students with the content and the skills necessary for analysis of other cultures along with the skills needed for creating a foundation for further courses in social studies. The course includes basic social studies skills, basic geography skills, and elements of culture of Africa, the Middle East, South Asia and East Asia, along with the major world religions. This course builds the framework for understanding the importance of each region's geography, history and traditions, economics and daily life, and literature and the arts, as well as the role of the region in the world today. The Course will also include practice with reading/writing skills, narrative vs. expository reading, and analyzing how to approach reading/writing from a historical perspective.

- Develop skills and strategies to understand and address current global issues.

- Evaluate political, economic, and social challenges as well as the current issues facing the modern nations of the Middle East.
- Compare and contrast developments in the Middle East to other regions of the world.
- Examine the global influence and significance of modern nations in the Middle East.

• Investigate the historic, political, economic, religious and social development of the African continent from the earliest civilizations through World War II.

- Analyze the factors that contributed to the formation of modern sub-Saharan African nations.
- Evaluate political, economic, and social challenges as well as the current issues facing modern African nations.
- Compare and contrast developments in African nations to other regions of the world.
- Examine the global influence and significance of modern African nations
