Beliefs

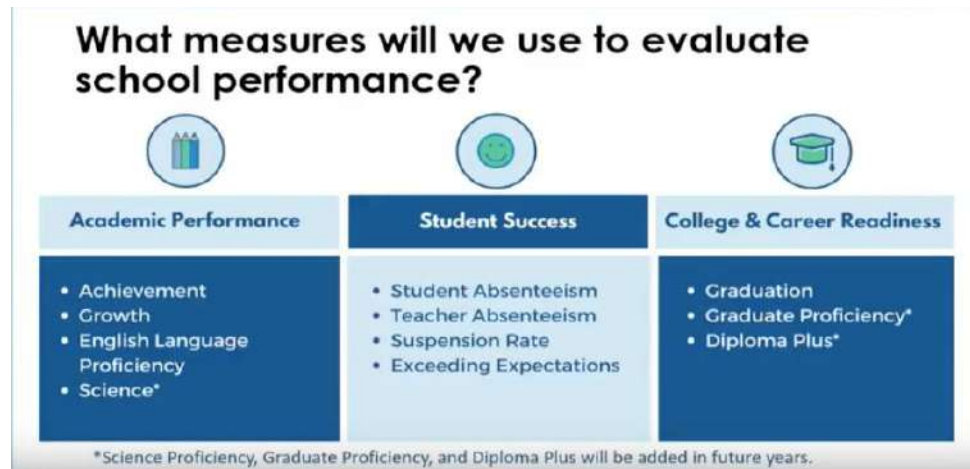
We believe all students can thrive when supported, nurtured, and engaged in rigorous and challenging academic experiences.

Richmond Elementary School began working on the five-year School Improvement Plan in the fall of 2018. The process involved not only the members of the School Improvement Team, but also community members and the staff of Richmond Elementary School as we examined where we are and where we want to be in the next five years. This work set us on the path of redefining our school's Mission, Vision, Values, and Goals.

Goals

1. All students will acquire the knowledge necessary to meet the increasing demands of a globally-influenced world.
2. Richmond will be rated as a 4 or 5 "star" school.
3. All families and the community will demonstrate respect for and value education.
4. All students will utilize technological tools to enhance and expand opportunities to learn.

Priority 1: Striving for Excellence

Action Steps	<p>Kindergarten Screening Assessment, STAR, and other district measures.</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Increase and maintain vertical alignment in curriculum by planning for transitions from grade 4 to 5 (World Language, Reading, Writing, Math and SEL needs) for both students and their families. ● Offer rigorous instruction that is culturally affirming and accessible to all students through the integration of social-emotional and academic learning. ● Provide families with examples of rigorous and personalized learning (examples of student choice and voice in their learning.) ● Explore formal summer applications of learning at all grade levels focusing on intervention (math, reading “Summer Slide”, World Language- new to district students) and extension (STEM, Arts, Health and Wellness). ● Reduce chronic absenteeism and increase attendance. The student attendance rate will be 98%, with a reduction in the chronic absenteeism rate to 5% or less.
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Priority 2: Infrastructure: Healthy, safe and flexible environments

Action Steps	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Provide flexible learning environment at all levels. ● Renovate and maximize exterior spaces surrounding schools for learning and physical activity, ● Explore researched best practices to increase student attendance and support parents/guardians

Action Steps	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Continue to provide opportunities for students to participate in blended and personalized learning. ● Increased number of Richmond teachers actively leading and/or participating in decision making committees (SDLT, SIT, District Assessment Writing Teams, District Health and Wellness subcommittees, etc.) ● Create career exploratory opportunities for students. ● Provide opportunities for students to set learning goals and reflect on their progress. ● Implement System of Personalized Professional Learning for educators to help them grow based on their self-identified needs, the needs of the district, and the needs of their students.

Priority 5: Global Citizenship

Measured By	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● 100% of students increasing language proficiency. ● Increasing global and cultural opportunities for students in the classroom.
Action Steps	<ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Create regional, national and international partnerships with schools, businesses, and community organizations that further global and cultural opportunities for all students (i.e., sister schools). ● Increase access to diverse cultural experiences and perspectives at the regional, national, and international levels. ● Instructional resources and materials reflect cultural diversity.
