Honors English I Summer Reading Assignment

1. Tuesdays with Morrie by Mitch Albom

You must purchase this book, as PCHS does not provide it for students.

This year, Honors English I is required to read *Tuesdays with Morrie* for the summer reading assignment. We will begin our semester focused on this book, so I am asking you to read and reflect on it over the summer. Part of the reason we read is to learn more about others and ourselves. Many of the stories we read tell about individuals who have transformed their lives due to the impact of a special person. *Tuesdays with Morrie* is a nonfiction book, written by Mitch Albom, a columnist and radio host in Michigan. Albom tells the story of a professor, Morrie Schwartz, who taught Mitch and impacted his life through their "classes" together. It was in the last class that the author learns how to live. This book will give you an opportunity to learn what Morrie had to teach while also giving you an opportunity to reflect on your own life. You may shed tears and laugh, but this is not a depressing story because Morrie teaches us how to live. He helps us to see that it is what we do without life that is important.

2. Assignment Requirements

As you finish the summer reading, please complete the following assignments.

- I. Reader Response Journal

- III. Aphorism Assignment Worksheet

The book is short, but the message is large. Do not put off the assignment for this book until the last minute. All assignments require a great deal of writing and thought. If you wait until the last minute, you will risk turning in low quality work.

Assignment 1: Tuesdays with Morrie Reader Response Journals

Directions: Answer each of the following prompts on a separate sheet of paper. Each answer should be at least one well-written paragraph long. This means you should have about 8-10 sentences minimum including:

- 2 a topic sentence,
- ② one sentence to introduce each of your three details,
- at least three comment sentences for each detail,
- 2 a concluding sentence.

Note: You must label and type each response in 12pt, Times New Roman font, and make sure each paragraph is double-spaced.

- 1. During one of Mitch and Morrie's first Tuesday visits, Morrie asked Mitch several pointed questions: "Are you giving to your community?" "Are you at peace with yourself?" "Are you trying to be as human as you can be?" (p.34) How would you respond to these questions?
- 2. Morrie says, "There's a big confusion in this country over what we want versus what we need...you know what really gives you satisfaction? Offering others what you have to give." (p. 126) Morrie is quite critical of the cultural emphasis on consumption and wealth. How do you respond to his thoughts about our culture?
- 3. "Devote yourself to loving others, devote yourself to your community, and devote yourself to creating something that gives you meaning and purpose." Morrie repeats these concepts multiple times during his conversations with Mitch. Reflect on how you are already, or could be, fulfilling this mandate.
- 4. Shortly before he died, Morrie described for Mitch his perfect day. What would a perfect day look like for you?
- 5. The relationship between Mitch and Morrie was important to both of them. In many ways, Morrie was a mentor someone Mitch looked up to and respected, someone who was willing to help Mitch think about his own life, values, and purpose. Who is a mentor for you? What are some life issues facing you now? How might a mentor be helpful to you with those issues?
