Conferences are this week, and the kindergartners are showing off everything that they have learned so far. They have come such a long way from the first conferences back in the fall. They have learned all their letter sounds, plus all the digraphs! (Sh, Ph, Ch, Wh, and Th). They are using their knowledge to read words that back in September they never thought they would be able to read!

We also went on a Field Trip! We went to the children's museum and did so much exploring. The kindergartners got to play pretend in a kid-sized city, they got to explore a jungle gym, visit Thomas the Tank Engine, and so much more! They had an amazing time, and we are so thankful that we were able to give them this experience.


Students learn about musical form

Students in third grade music have been learning all about musical form. Musical form is labeled using letters and creates the patterns that most music follows. Students have been able to get up out of their seats and move in different patterns to represent musical form. Third graders are having a ton of fun learning about musical form visually, audially (through sound), and kinesthetically (through movement)!



Comparing and contrasting in second grade


Students in second grade learned all about comparing and contrasting this week in literacy. Venn Diagrams can be used to demonstrate comparing and contrasting. They had an "indoor snowball fight" and worked to fill in Venn Diagrams to reflect the similarities and differences between different things from M&M's and Skittles, to apples and bananas, to story characters.



Figuratively speaking, third grade is fun


Third graders are using all kinds of fun, new language! We are learning about figurative language this week. Figurative language includes similes, metaphors, alliteration, onomatopoeia, and idioms. One project for alliteration was to read the book *The Z was Zapped* by Chris Van Allsburg, and then students drew their own alphabet letter and wrote an alliteration about it (see pictures).

NOTE: The winner of the traveling trophy this week for Read to the Final Four is Ms. Matheson's class!! Way to go!!



First graders and bossy r vowels

First grade students have been working on reading and writing words with r-controlled vowels. An r-controlled vowel is any vowel followed by an r. The r changes the sound that vowel makes (which is why we sometimes refer to them as bossy r vowels). The er, ir, and ur all make the same sound /er/ as in her, bird or fur. We have done a variety of activities to become familiar with this vowel pattern and to have practice reading and writing it. One fun activity we did was to create treasure maps using ar words, we call it the "pirate sound". Students then wrote directions to get to their treasure using ar words. We will continue to work on recognizing these words in our reading and writing.



Fourth grade is as hard as rocks

Rocks and Minerals is the current science unit in 4th grade. Students have been exploring various properties of rocks and minerals. Also, students discussed the difference between a mineral and a rock. Students will be conducting three tests on the mineral samples; luster, hardness, and streak. Students will then use that knowledge to identify the three types of rocks: Sedimentary, Igneous and Metamorphic from our kits. If you are traveling out of state and notice different or unique rocks in an area, see if they can identify them!
