First grade Artist in Residence - life cycle of a frog

First grade students were learning with Karla Nweje, a dance artist in residence, this past week. First graders connected their learning with the artist to the life cycle of a frog, one of the first-grade science standards.

When working with the guest artist, students used their bodies and imaginations for movement by re-creating the stages of a frog's life. In addition, students will learn the basic principles of dance: body, action, space, time, and energy. Learning with the use of their bodies, or kinesthetically, is a natural fit for first graders. Kinesthetic learning is a style in which learning takes place by the students carrying out physical activities, rather than listening to a lecture or watching demonstrations.







Kindergarteners and fairy tales

This week our study was all about Fairy Tales. Kindergartners heard familiar stories not only told from different points of views, but also different versions from different places around the world. We talked about why fairy tales are important and why we still tell them today. In reading we have been practicing breaking up words into syllables to make them easier to read. Students were so excited when they realized they could read the word "Fantastic" without any adult help! We are so proud of how they are working, and their confidence is growing!

Minnesota author visits REAMS

Sponsored and fully funded by the Great River Regional Libraries author Mary Casanova visited REAMS. With a PowerPoint program including images of Northwoods animals and book covers and illustrations, Mary recounted her journey growing up in a family of ten, struggling with reading, and discovering that books are a window into the world and writing as a way to "have a voice." Mary introduced students to Little Otter in "Utterly Otterly Day," the trouble-making dogs in the "Dog Watch" series, and with help from students, the silly animals of "One Dog Canoe."









Third grade MCA testing- homerun

Third graders knocked it out of the park with MCA testing! They had their first exposure to MCA testing last week for reading and this week for math. Third grade teachers used a baseball theme for strategy posters, review was called "spring training," encouraging notes that looked like baseballs were sent from parents, and we will have a celebration when testing is finished. It was an opportunity for them to "show what they know." They were all able to use their own Chromebooks and take the test in their classroom. Way to hit a homerun, third graders!



Second grade digs deep

Mrs. Hammer's class has been learning about the research process. They have selected an animal to research and have been using WIN time to look up information about the animal's body, habitat, food, life cycle, and fun facts. They will be working to put their research into a nonfiction animal book throughout the next few weeks. We are excited to learn more about animals we don't already know a lot about!

Students in Physical Education this week worked on CORE strength and balance along with Focus and Cooperation in groups. Our tumbling and pyramid unit is always one of the most fun times in the gym and the noise level of laughter is joyful!
