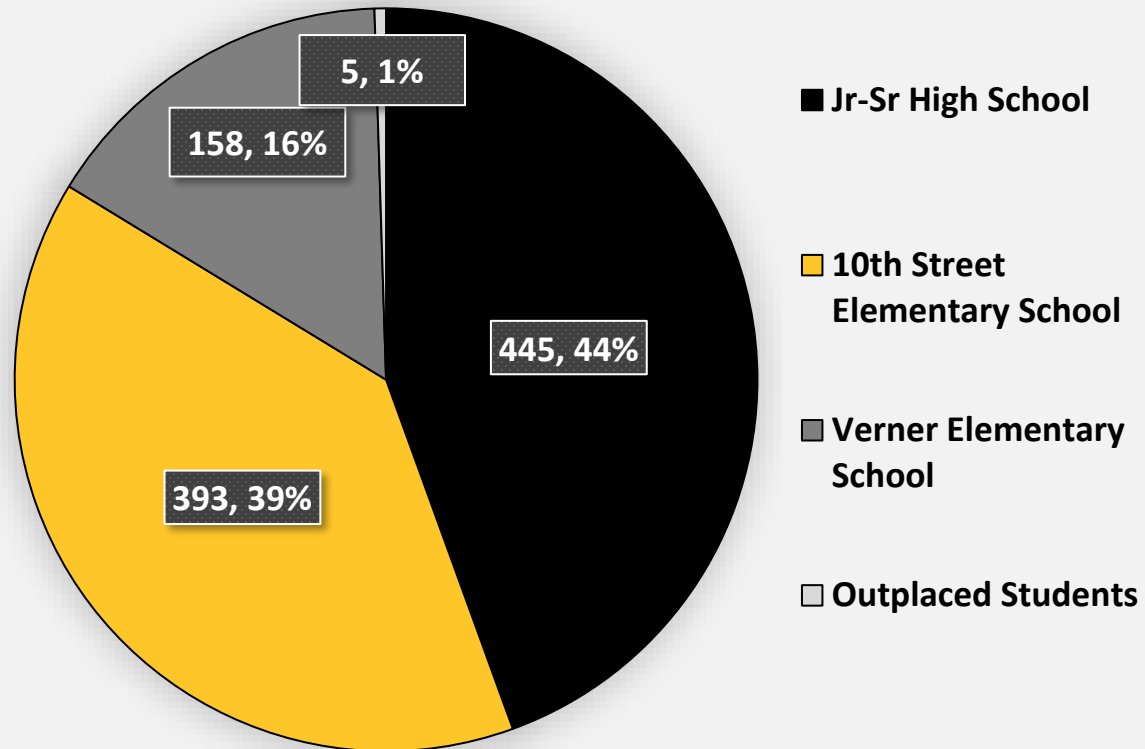

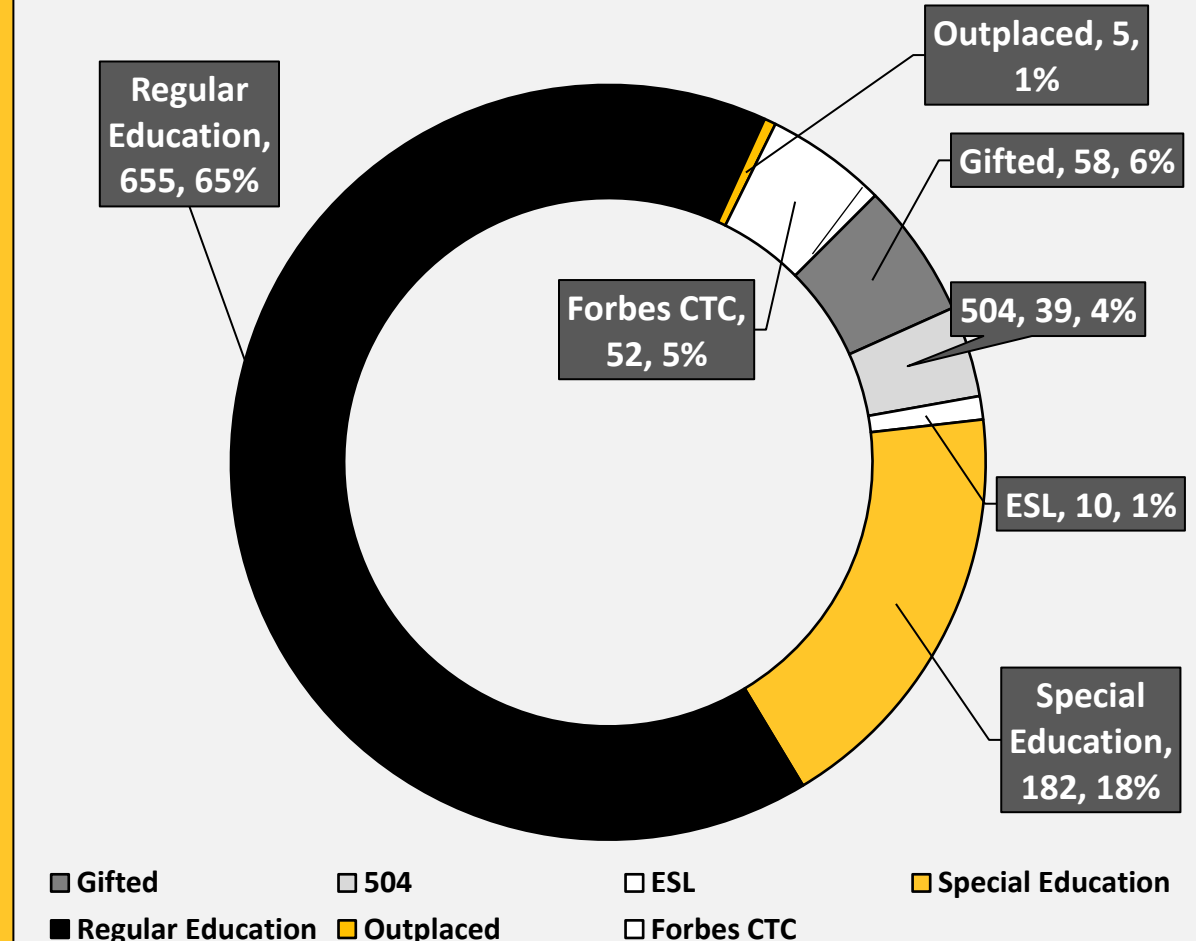
2024-2025 STUDENT DEMOGRAPHICS

Registered Riverview Students as of 9/6/24



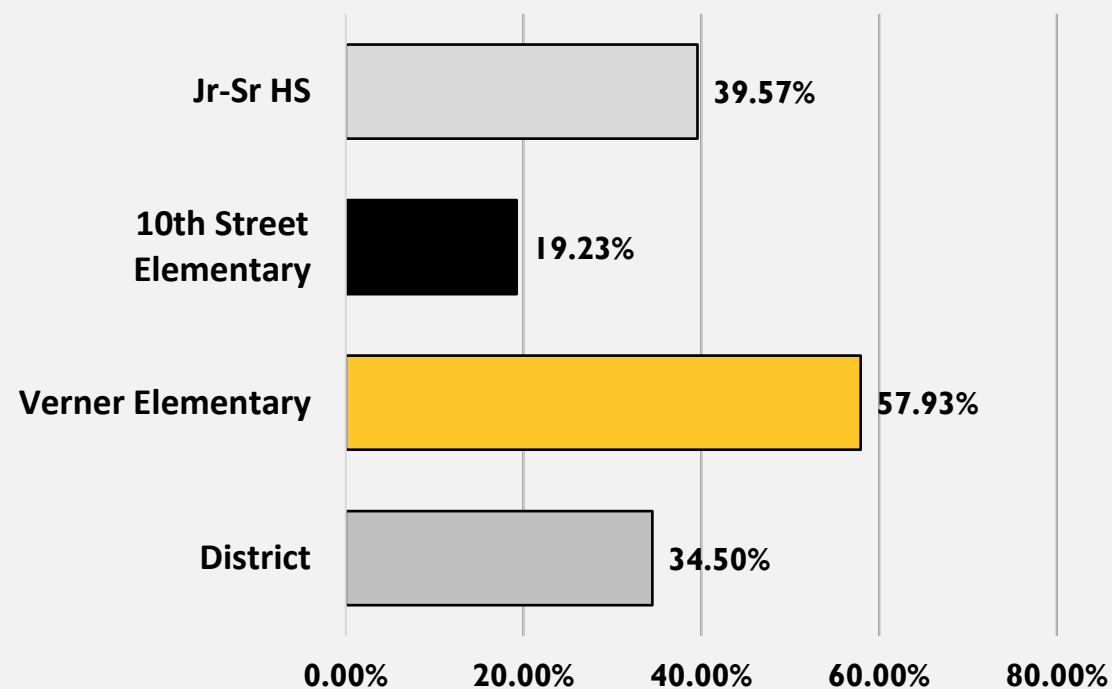

Riverview Student Populations



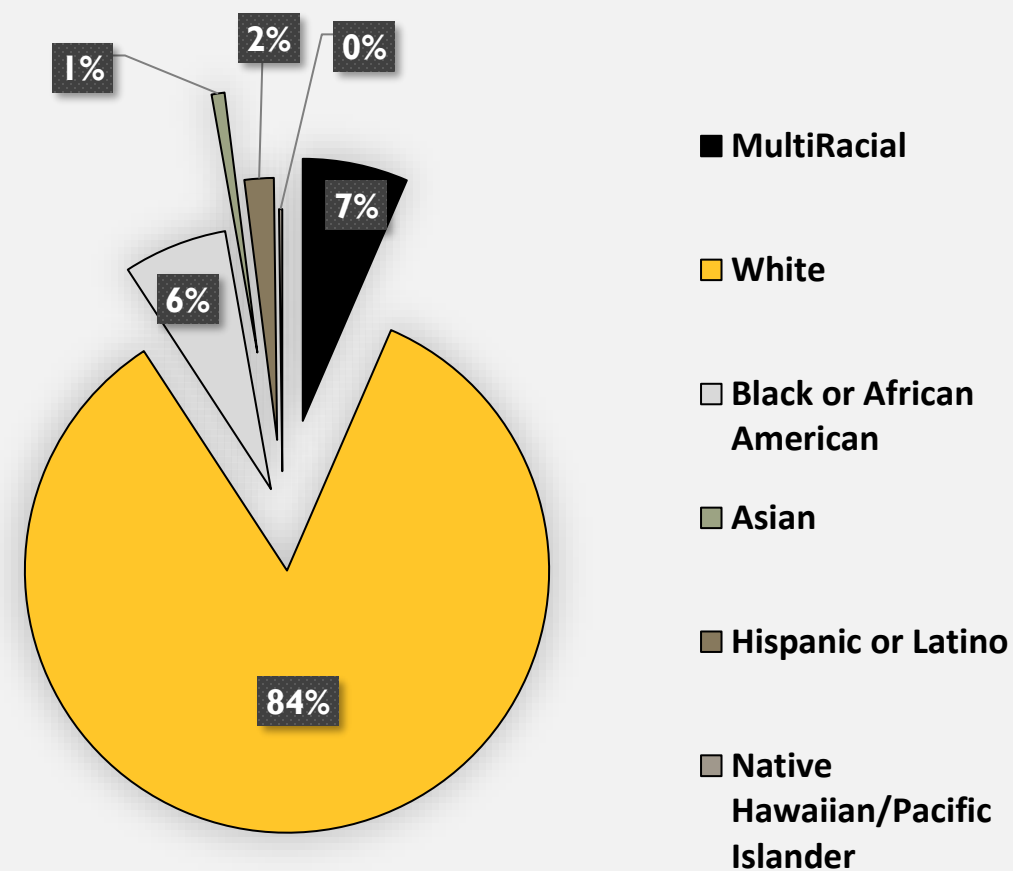

2024-2025 Economically Disadvantaged Identified Student Demographic

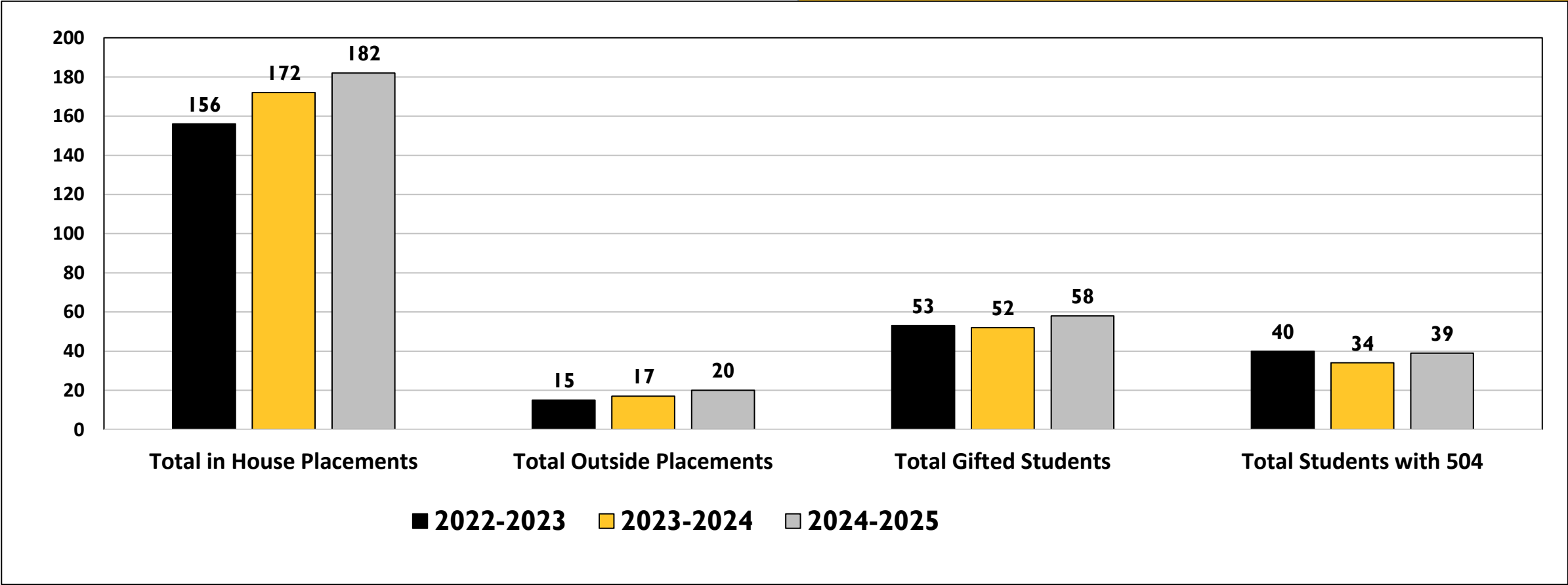

Race and Ethnicity Demographics

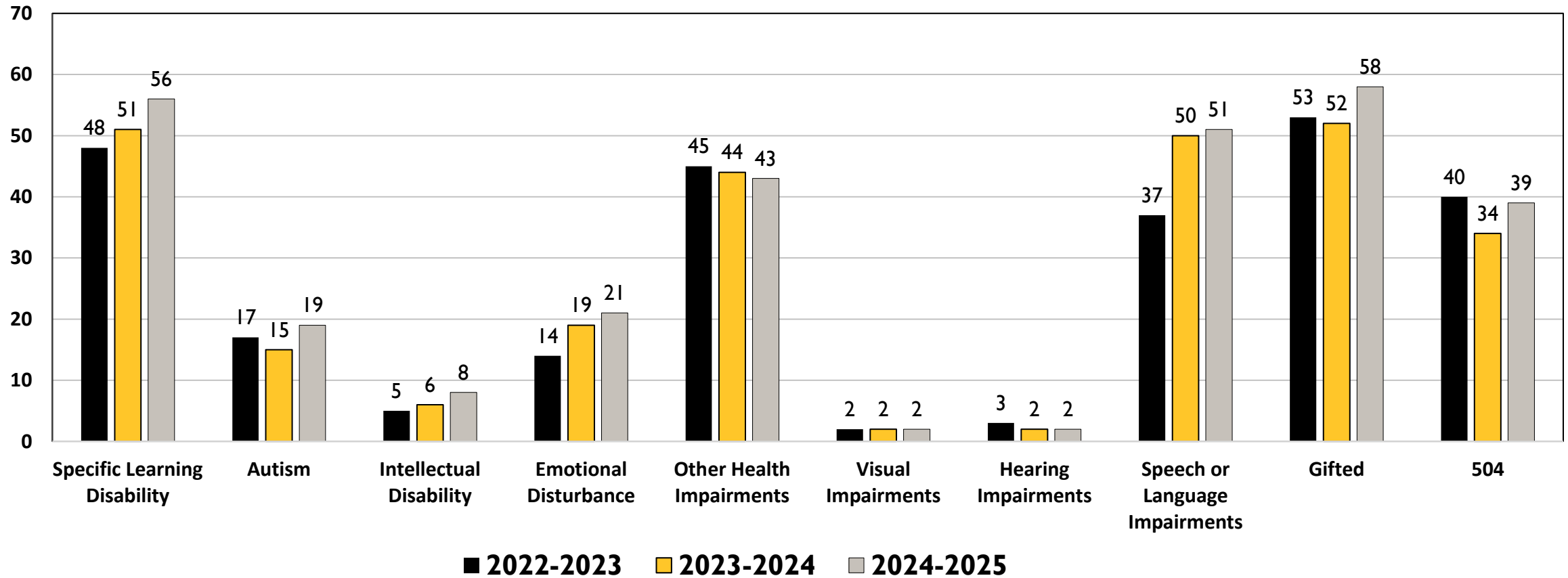

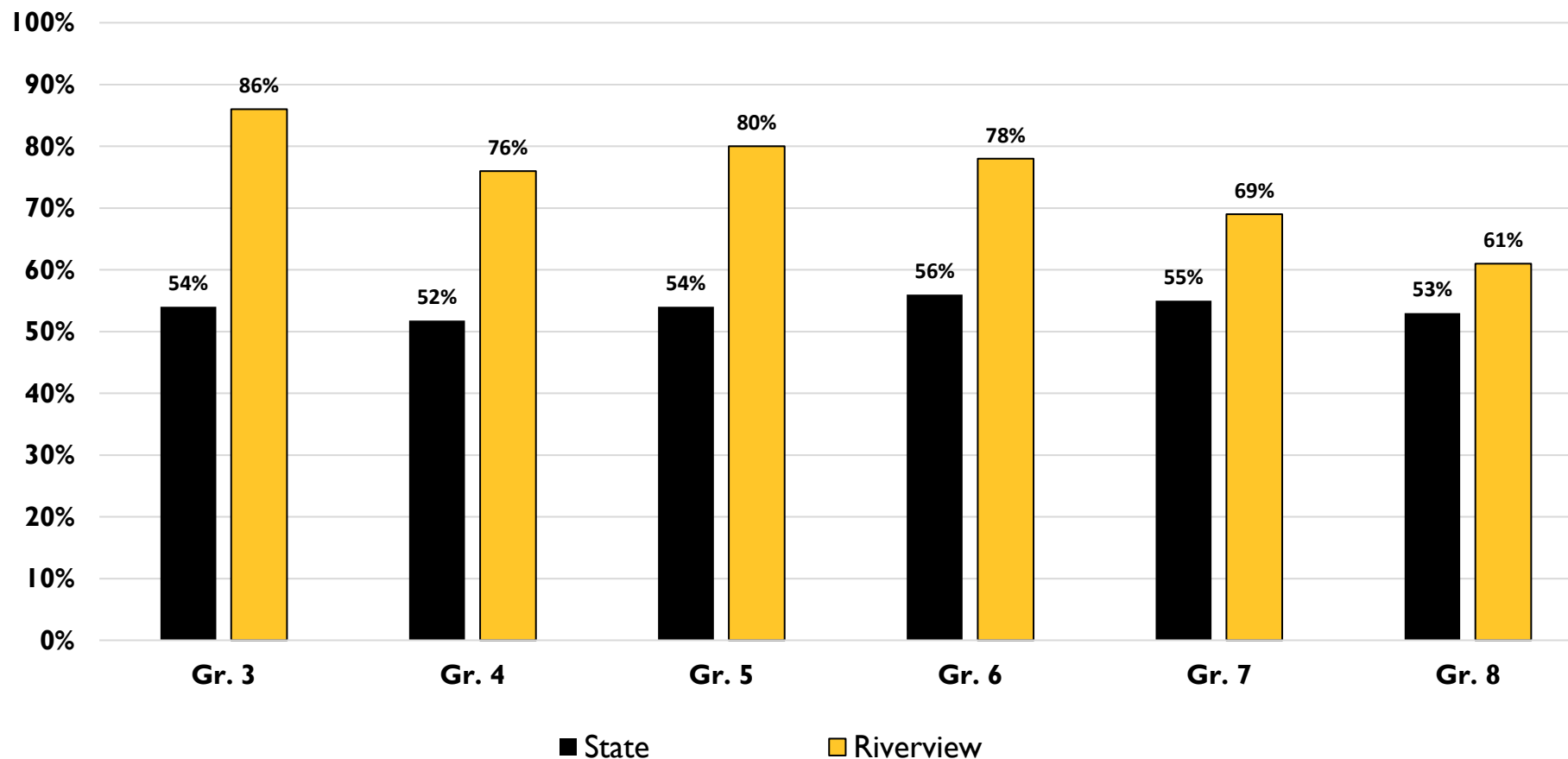
SPECIAL EDUCATION QUALIFYING EXCEPTIONALITIES

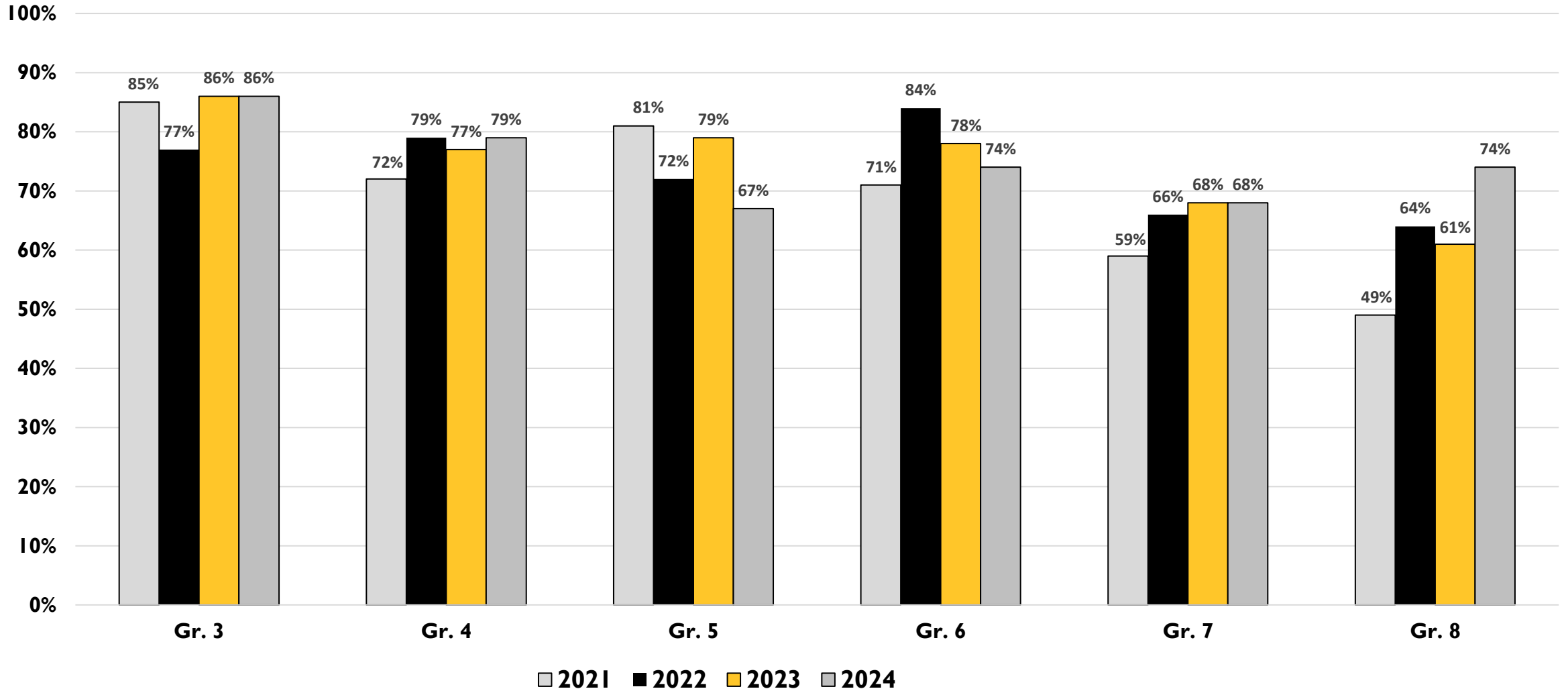
2023 PSSA ELA Scores Vs. State



- Riverview overall Proficiency scores are consistently above state averages and comparative school districts
- Statewide decreases in ELA between grades 3-8; especially since the pandemic
- Finalized 2023 State PSSA scores are released in October
- District has purchased diagnostics for ELA and Math to assess and diagnose learning gaps related to the pandemic and growth looks impressive
- New standard-aligned resources implemented this year (CKLA) devoted to growth in ELA and growth on an individualized student basis
- Data growth is incorporated into building level and teacher level Continuous Improvement Plans (CIPs)
- A focus on student growth and personalized learning pedagogy for students in 2023-2024

% Proficient and Advanced – 5 Year Summary



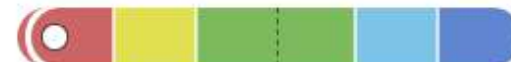

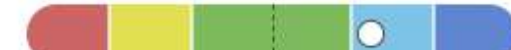
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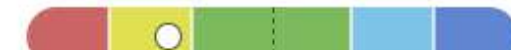
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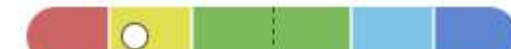
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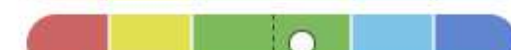
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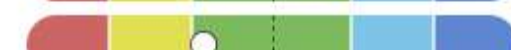
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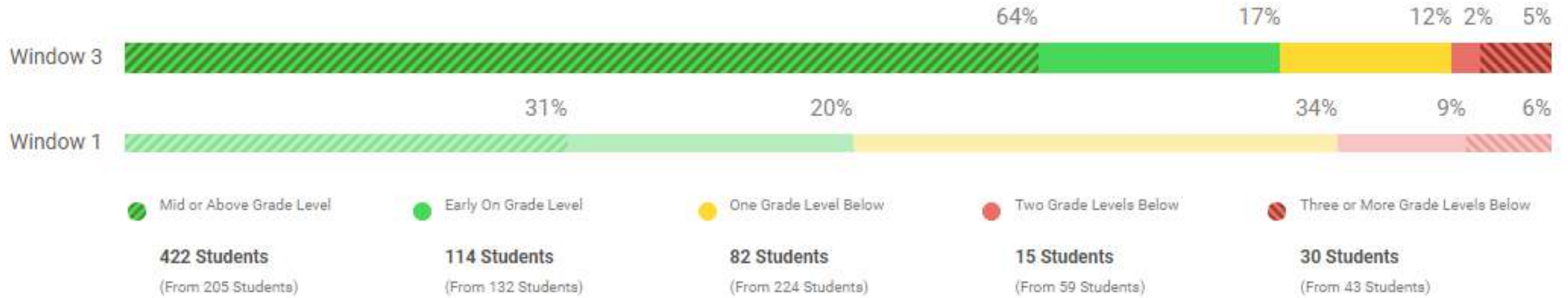
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- PVAAS growth scores have shown improvement each year, although has room to grow
- Most students making stretch growth on iReady diagnostic scores (10th Street Elementary top of the State – 57% reaching stretch growth)
- PVAAS scores for iReady are improving, but still need a tighter correlation to the iReady scores
- Growth is a target area for all ELA teachers as a part of their Continuous Improvement Plans (CIP)
- Last year was Year 1 of a more rigorous ELA curriculum with extensive training for teachers - in Year 1 – Amplify CKLA; hoping to see additional growth, especially in PVAAS data

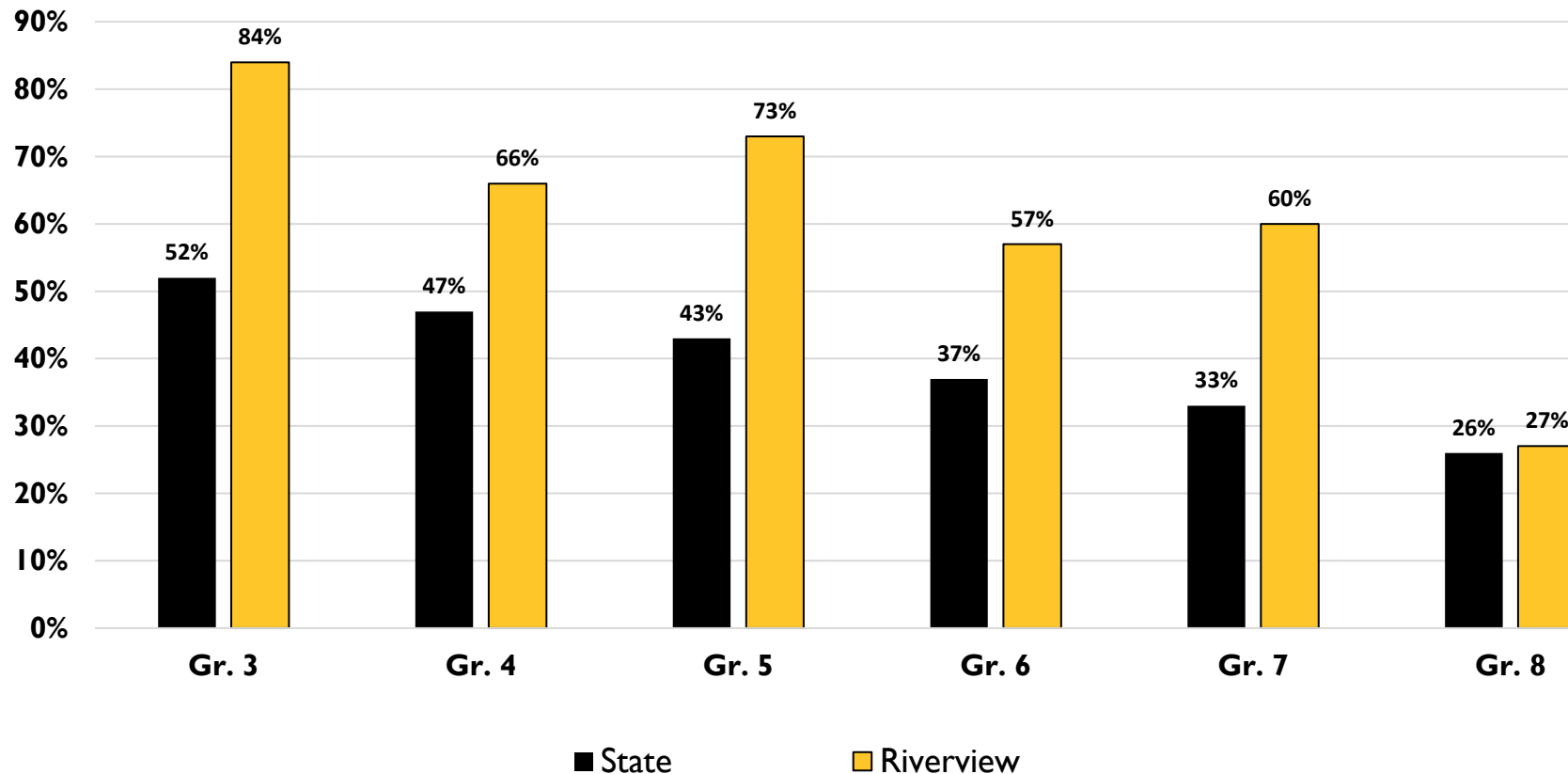

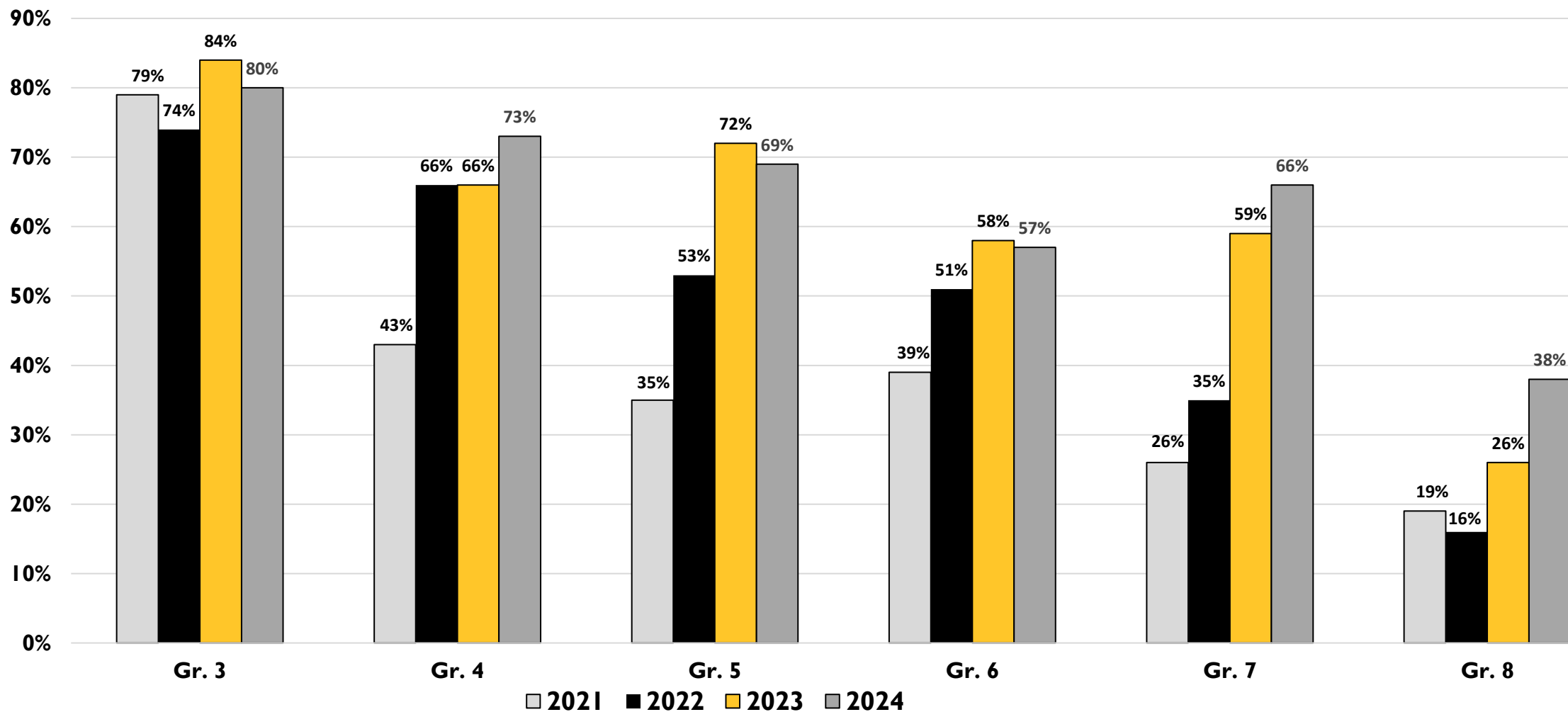
- iReady - Individualized reading education for every student K-8 based on diagnostic results (3 times a year)

- Significant improvement on reading proficiency across at all three schools in the District
- Students complete at least 2 online lessons of individualized instruction per week in reading
- High stretch growth rates across the District (34% at Verner, 37% at the Jr-Sr HS, and **56% at 10th Street**)
- Anxiously awaiting upcoming PVAAS scores (expecting an alignment between iReady and PVAAS)
- Continued focus on student growth, as per the Riverview Strategic Plan

ACADEMICS – PSSA MATH

2023 PSSA Math Scores Vs. State



- Riverview overall Proficiency scores far exceed State scores, except grade 8
- Major improvements from the prior year in terms of overall proficiency in math in 2024 year results, however
- Strong iReady improvement scores, showing significant improvement and student growth
- Eureka Math – Highly Measured and rigorous math program
- Math exploration committee considering new math curricular resources, more rigorous and appropriate for Riverview students (Reveal Math, Ready Math)
- Math is a focus area for administrators and teachers across the District and is addressed in continuous improvement plans (CIPs)

- PVAAS growth scores have been a continued focus for Riverview, and have shown improvement in many grades, grades 4 and 8 remain a focus area
- iReady scores show **SIGNIFICANT** growth last year, including growth in grades 4 and 8, and across the District
- Anxiously waiting for PVAAS scores to see a tighter correlation between PVAAS and iReady
- Student growth is a target area for all Math teachers as a integral part of their Continuous Improvement Plans (CIP), as per Strategic Plan
- Currently in the fourth year of full implementation of Eureka, but exploration team looking at Ready and Reveal, which are both more rigorous and appropriate for Riverview students

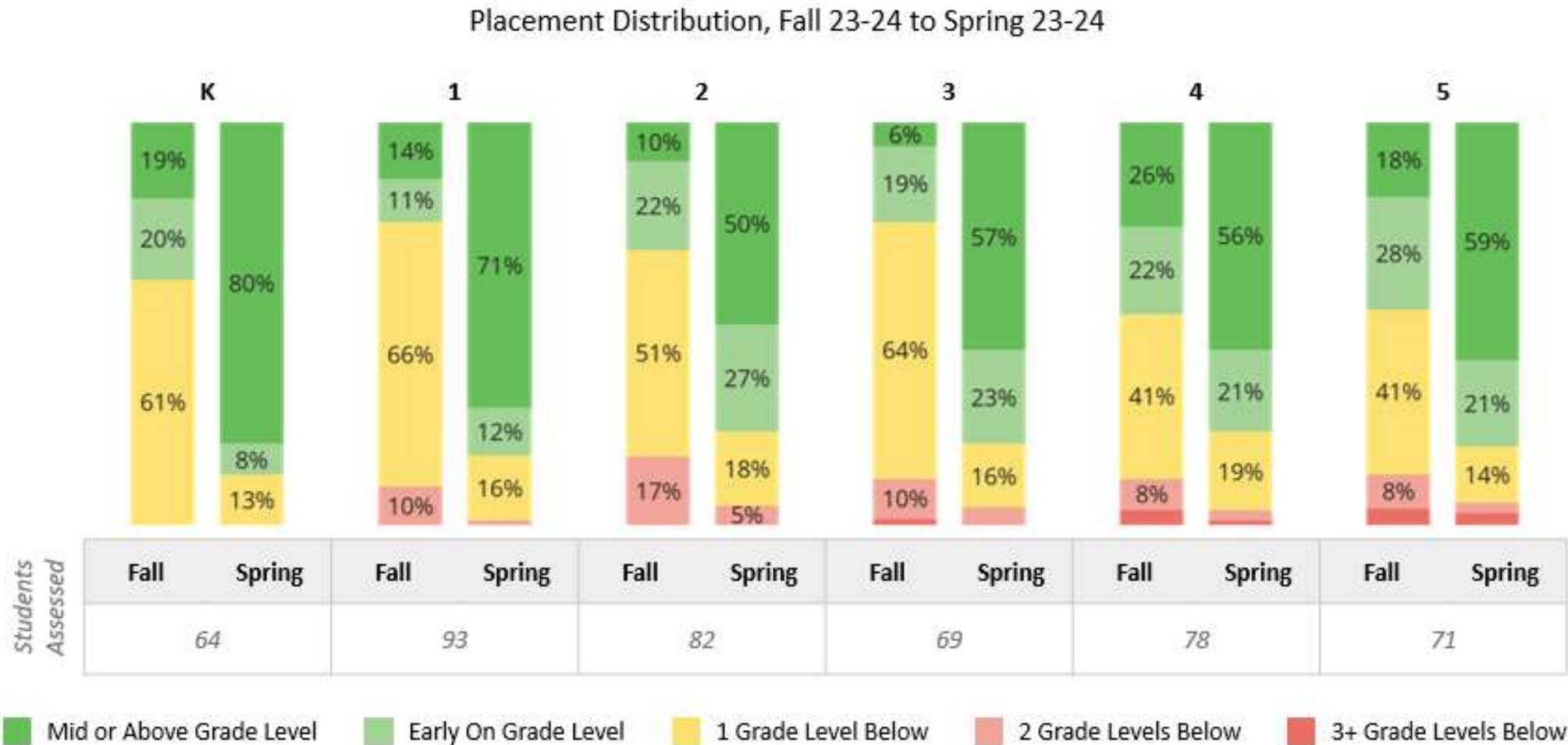

How Have Relative Placements Changed From Fall to Spring?



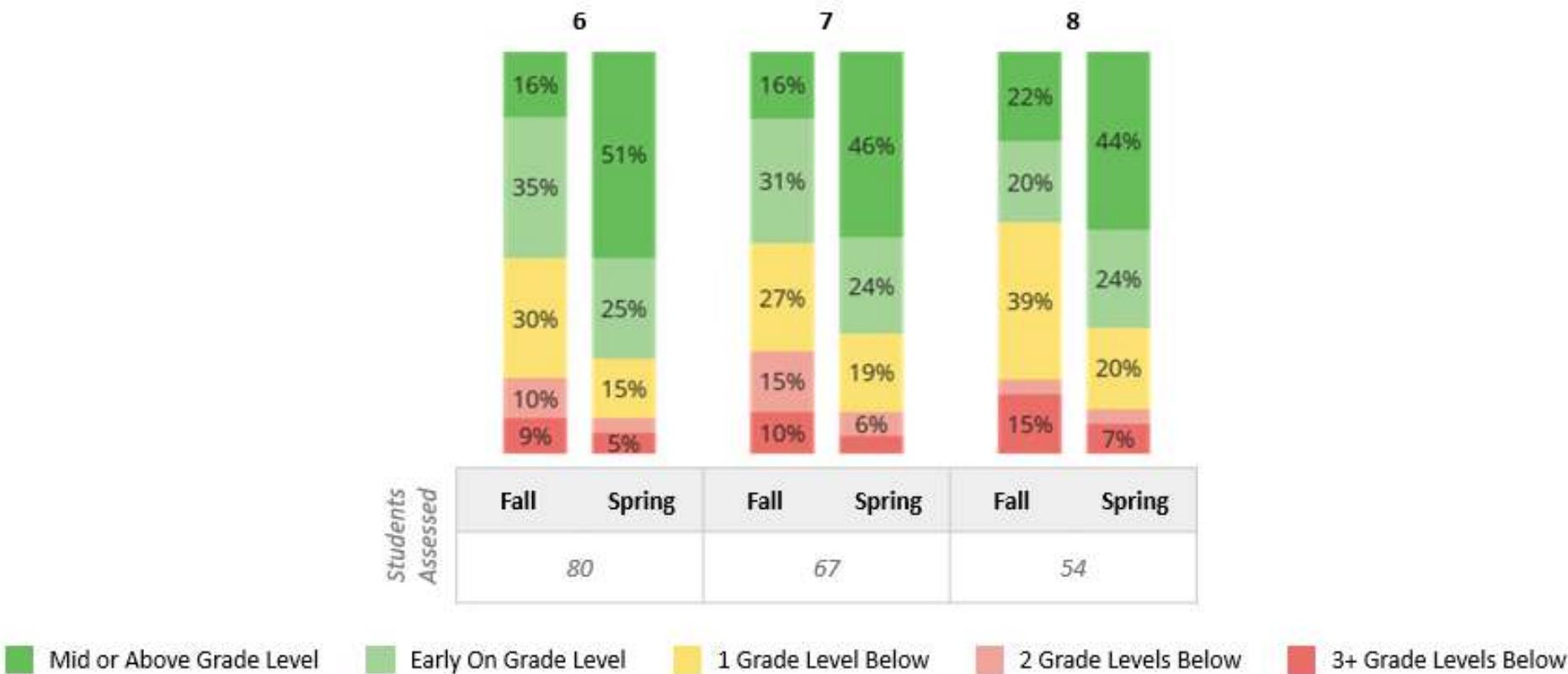

Placement Distribution, Fall 23-24 to Spring 23-24



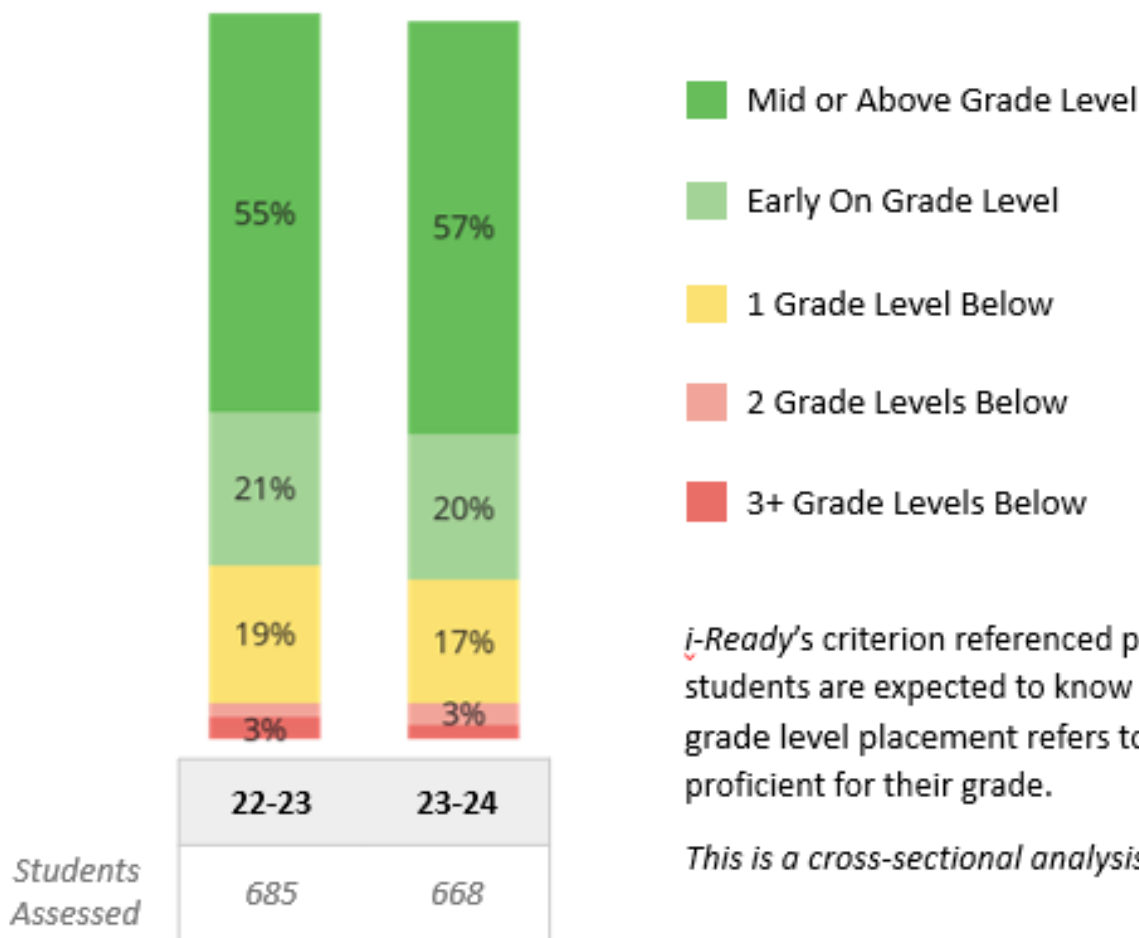

Placement Distribution, Spring 22-23 to Spring 23-24



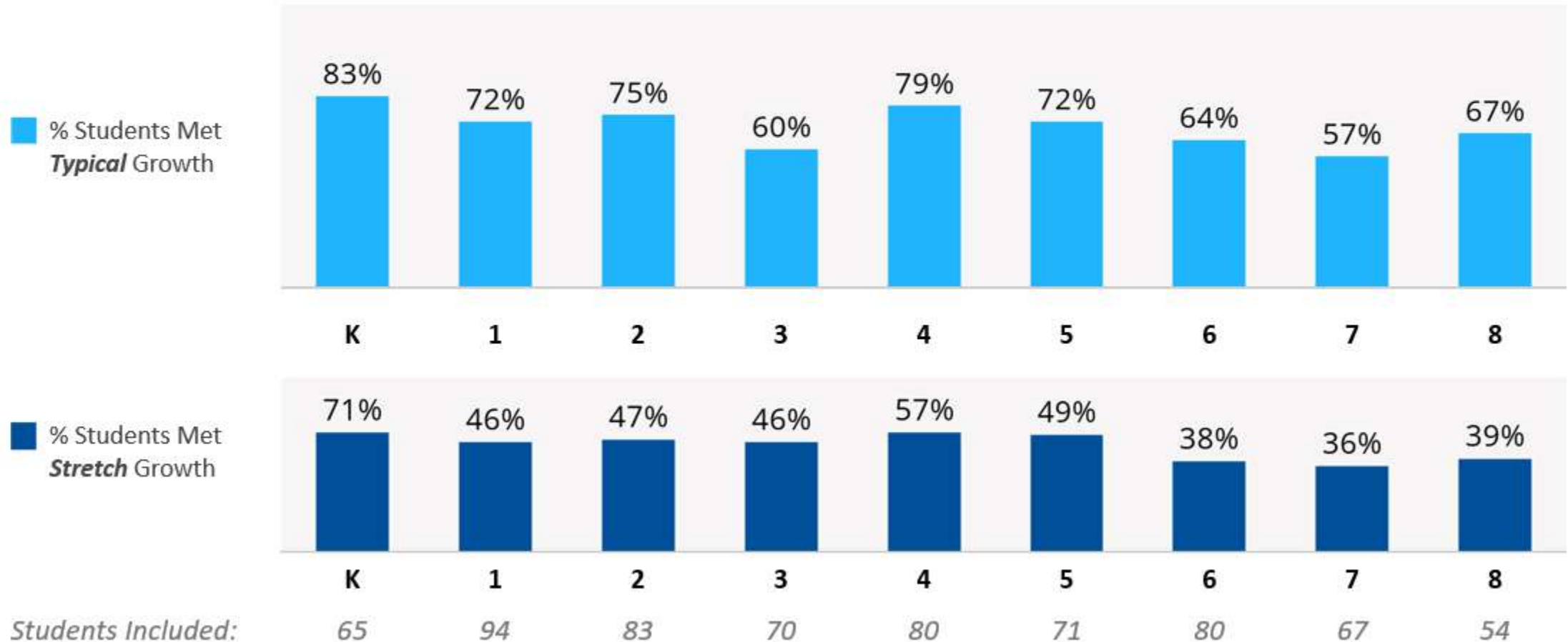

How Are Students Progressing Toward Typical and Stretch Growth?

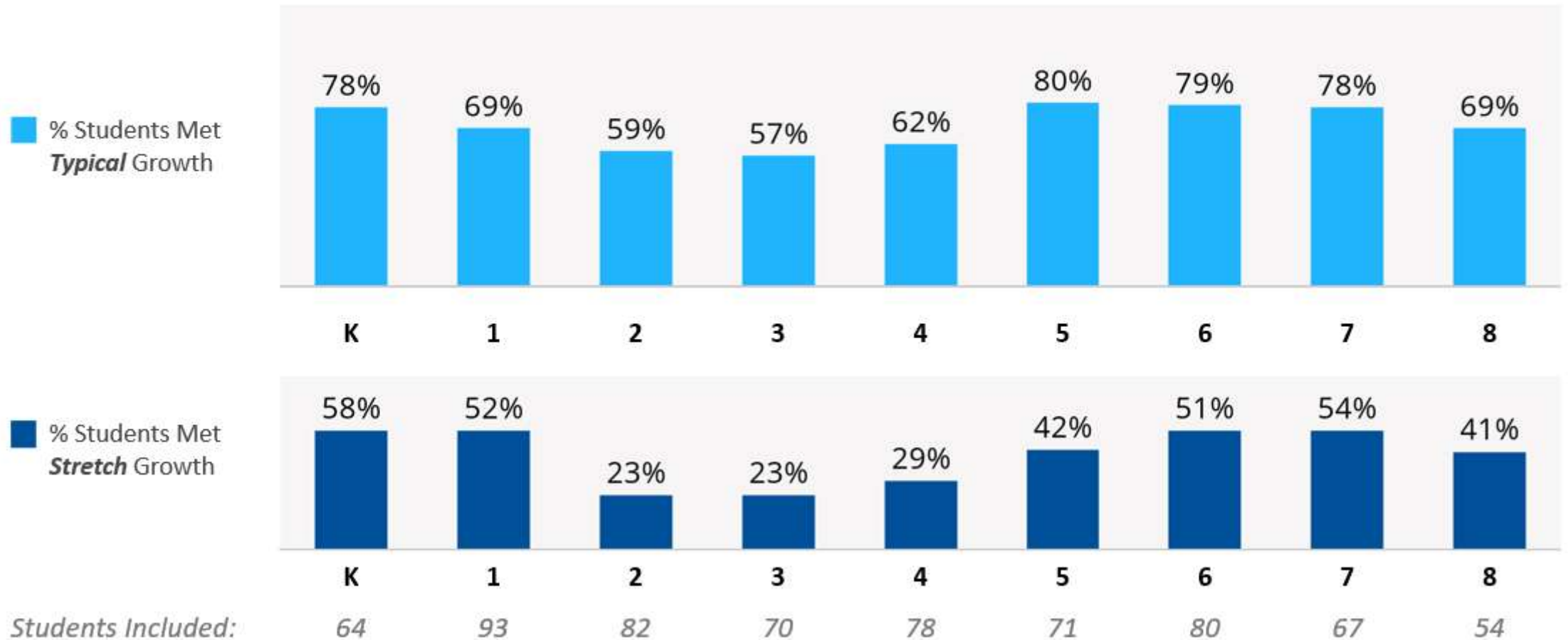
% Students Who Met Typical and Stretch Growth

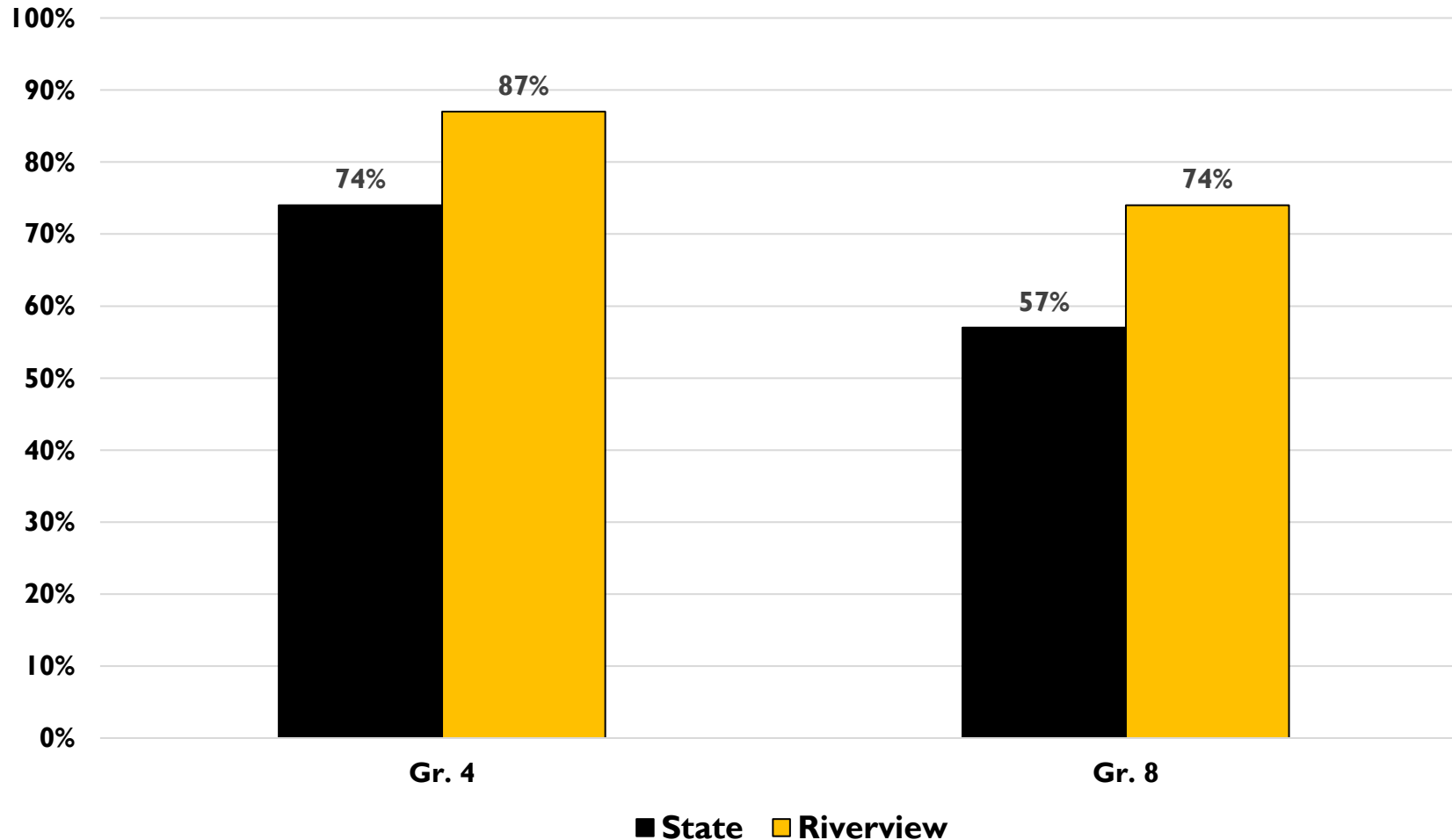
How Are Students Progressing Toward Typical and Stretch Growth?

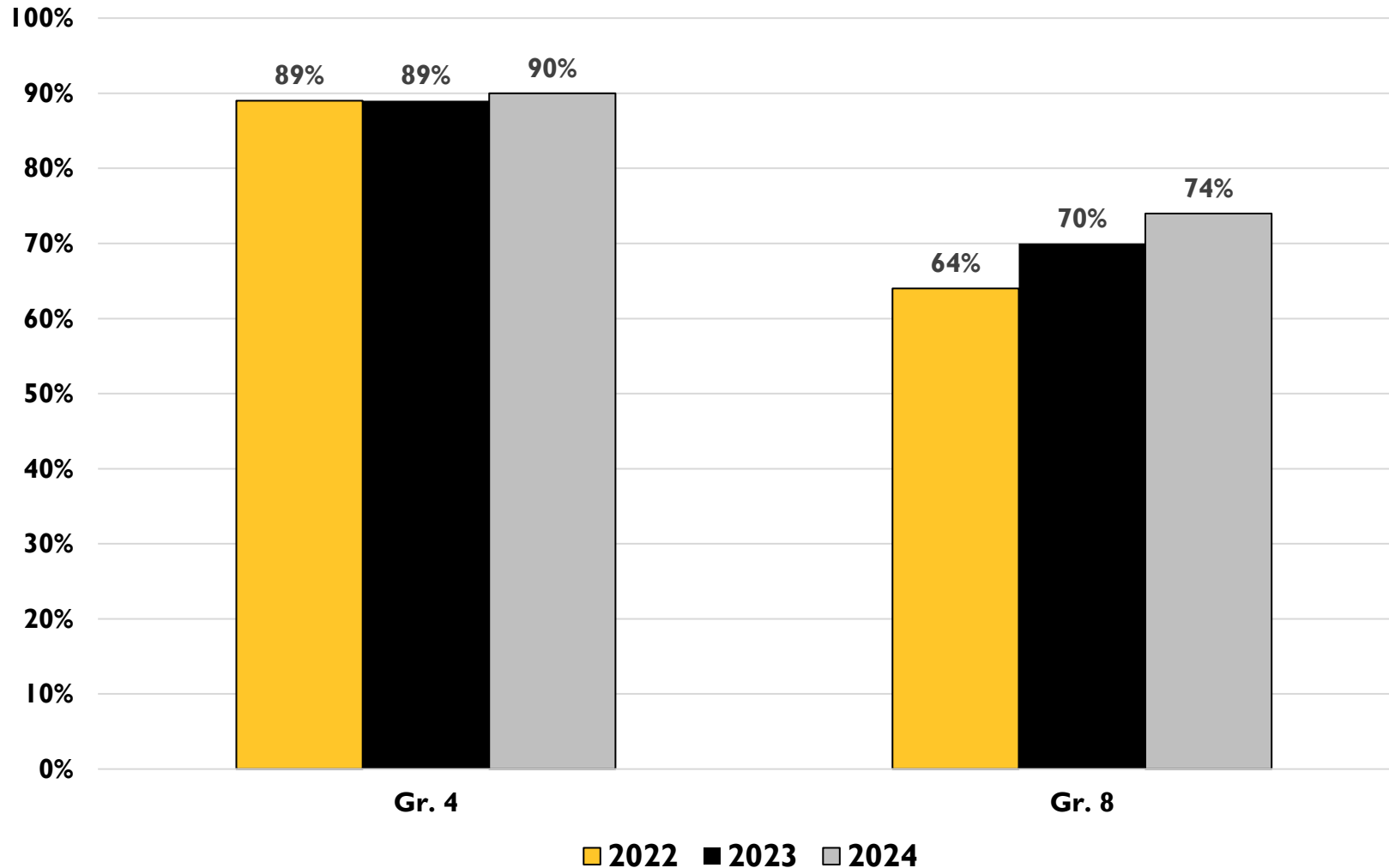

% Proficient and Advanced – 3 Year Summary



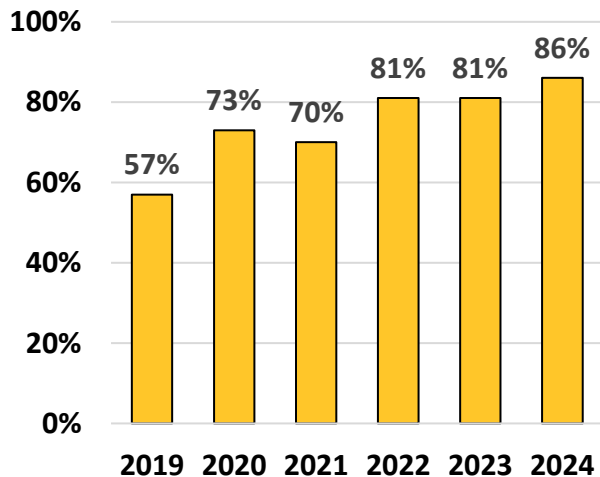

- **86% of all students pass** (receive a 3 or better) on AP exams. Higher than most schools in Allegheny County (PR – 78%)
- **8 AP Scholar Awards** given to a student who scored 3 or more on at least three AP exams.
- **4 AP Scholar with Honor Awards** given to students who averaged a minimum of a 3.25 on the AP exams they took and scored a 3 or more on at least four of those exams.
- **5 AP Scholar with Distinction Awards** given to students who averaged a minimum of 3.5 on all their AP exams and scored 3 or more on at least 5 of these exams.

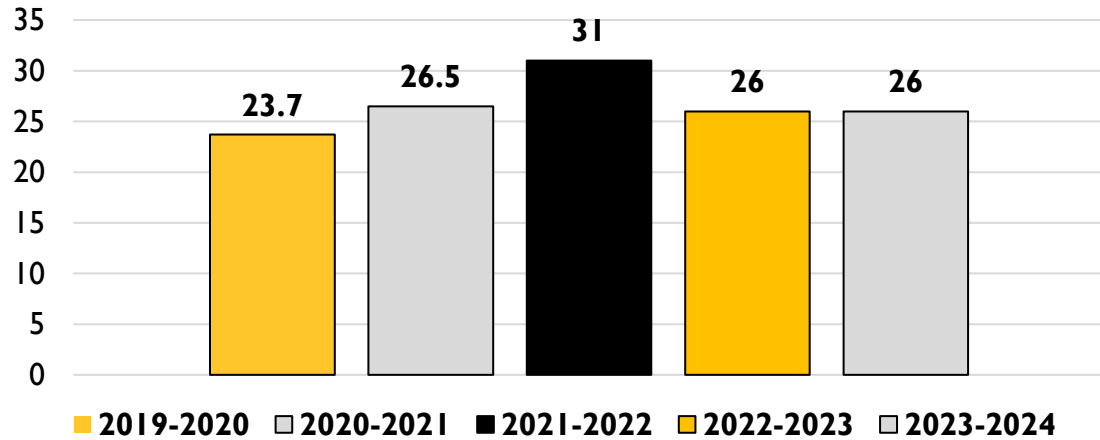

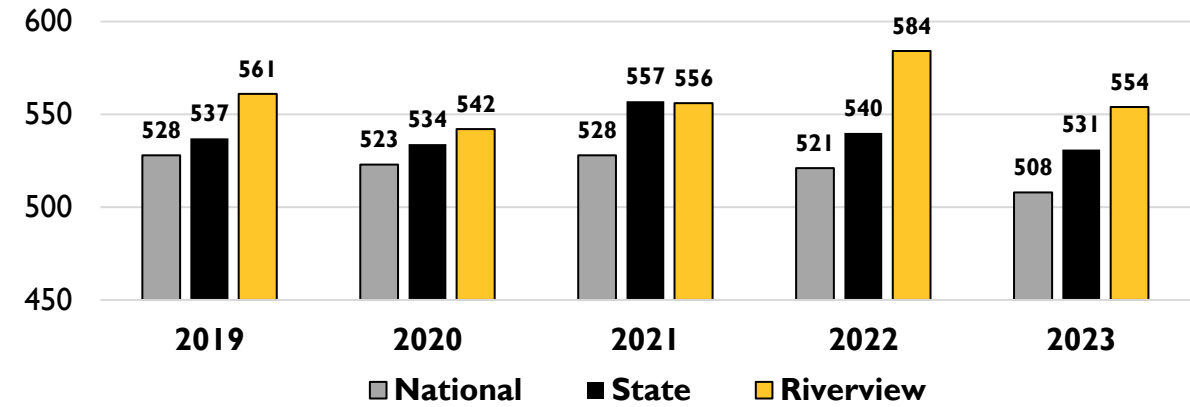

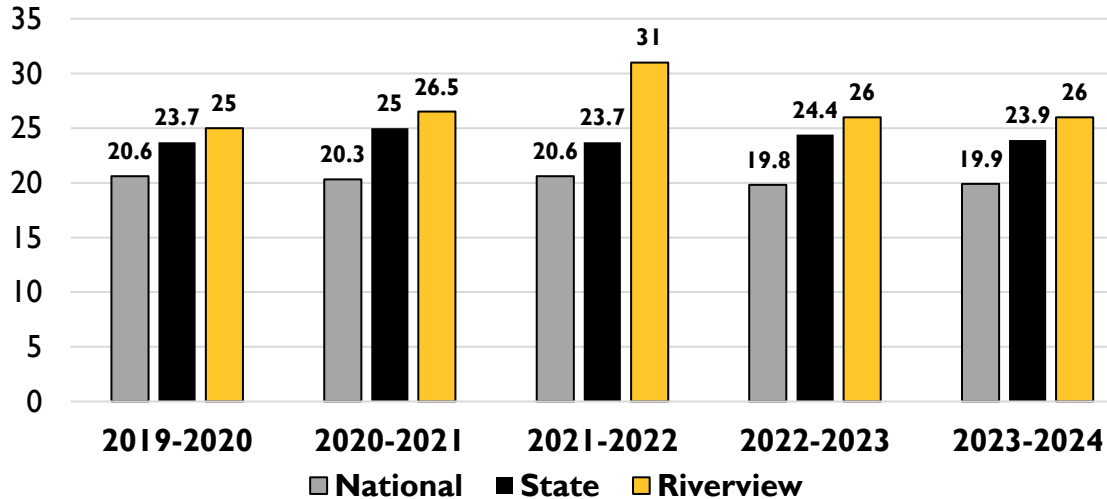
Five Year ACT Composite Summary Riverview HS



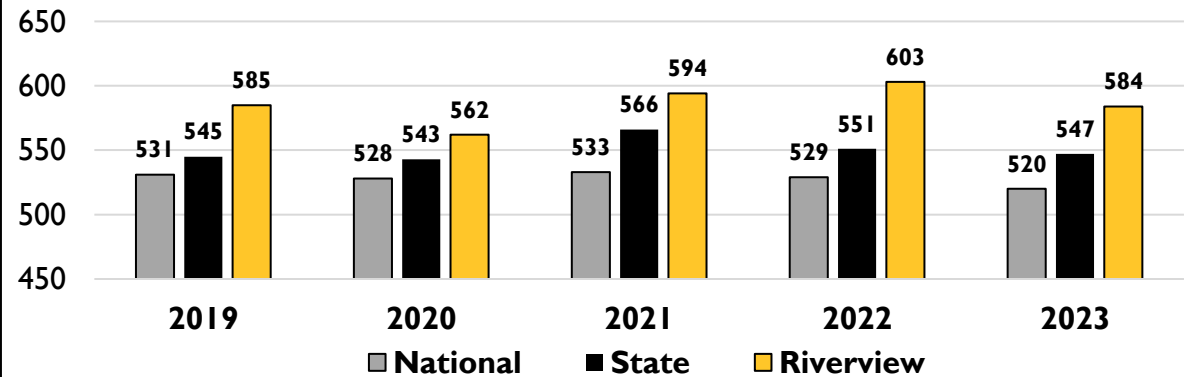
5 Year Math SAT Summary Riverview HS Senior Class vs National and State Trends



Five Year ACT Composite Summary Riverview HS vs State and National Trends

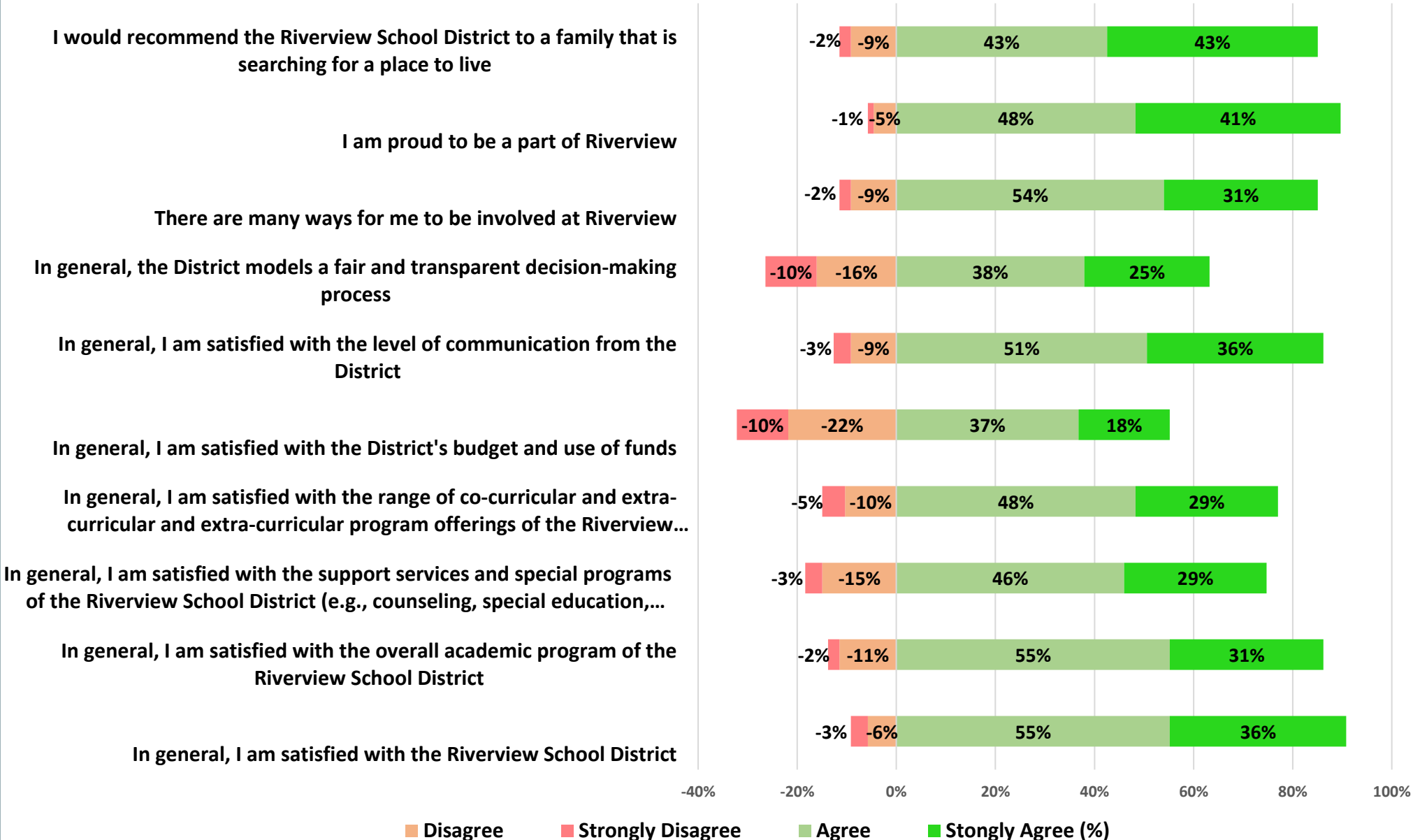


5 Year ERW (English/Reading/Writing) SAT Summary Riverview HS Senior Class vs National and State Trends

SAFETY AND SECURITY / BUILDINGS AND GROUNDS ACHIEVEMENTS AND GOALS

2023-2024 Highlights

- Updated the emergency boxes at all three buildings, to work in collaboration with our emergency responders
- Explored the purchase of additional trauma kits for each school
- Held a real-life evacuation drill for the Jr-Sr HS and made adjustments to the emergency plan
- Upgraded the phone system to ensure emergency communication is responsive and efficient across the District
- Transitioned the new Buildings and Grounds Director to successfully add safety and security to their job responsibilities
- Upgraded our District-wide emergency communication systems
- Worked collaboratively with first responders in all fire, lockdown and evacuation drills
- Hosted a comprehensive police training on response to school tragedies
- Upgraded the boiler at the Junior-Senior High School
- Upgraded the Junior-Senior high school athletic entrance
- Installed safety decals on all exterior doors at all three schools
- Painted and installed safety features to curbs
- Updated sound systems at all three buildings
- End of life upgrade to Riverside park scoreboard to adhere to new PIAA standards
- Installed a full gas line replacement at the Junior-Senior high school, adhering to strict safety guidelines
- Made significant progress on the athletic field lighting project, including grant funding and work with our current partners
- Tree trimming at all three buildings
- Bench installation at all three buildings

2024-2025 Goals and Focus Areas

- Work with the Oakmont and Verona police departments to meet the security requirements that the law has set forth for 2025-2026
- Analyze and set a path toward a more permanent solution to the elementary playground grass areas
- Complete end-of-life upgrades to the main cooking kitchen in the District at the Junior-Senior High School
- Work in collaboration with Oakmont Borough to make upgrades to the Junior-Senior HS baseball fields
- Work with the Borough to continue to explore funding sources to fully fund and complete the light project at Riverside Park
- Continue to install safety decals to the Junior-Senior high school entrances
- Update the locks and swipe systems in the District through grant funding
- Continue to hire custodians that support our District initiatives and establish and maintain a custodial substitute pool that is available and reliable
- Continue to update our District safety and evacuation plans
- Work with the Oakmont Police Department to train and update teachers with active shooter training
- Research and consider trauma kits through grant funding to be housed in classrooms across the District
- Work with District architects to analyze 10th Street and Verner Elementary school entryways to assess for safety and efficiency
- Upgrades to the 10th Street gym floor
- Replace Verner windows
- Replace walkie talkies and emergency plans
- Exterior doors reinforced and replaced at the Junior-Senior high school

EDUCATION ACHIEVEMENTS AND GOALS

2023-2024 Achievements

- Completed action steps to achieving the District Strategic Plan
- Successfully negotiated a multi-year teacher contract
- Began the creation of a K-12 social and emotional learning scope and sequence in order to focus on student mental health, soft skills, and career readiness initiatives
- Utilized iReady diagnostic results to focus on remediation, acceleration, and growth in reading and math K-8
- Made improvements to PSSA, Keystone and iReady scores across the District, especially in terms of student growth
- Explored and purchased standards-aligned K-12 science resources, with full implementation and training to occur in 24-25
- Continued to partner with regional STEAM consortiums to continue to bolster STEAM activities for all K-12 students
- Utilized PCCD grant monies to supplement mental health support to students and staff, with implementation to occur in 2023-2024
- Made major iReady growth score improvement, especially in the area of “stretch growth” (10th St. Super Stretch Growth award)
- Moved to iReady lesson completion, which resulted in greater student stretch growth
- Implemented grant funded weekly Yoga and Mindfulness classes for students and staff across the District
- Continued with an iterative and comprehensive curriculum writing process, K-12
- Explored and purchased aligned curricular materials for the business, consumer education and tech departments
- Analyzed the Health and PE curriculum materials
- Offered the Calm App through grant funding for staff social and emotional health
- Made significant progress in hiring employees that represent the diverse backgrounds of our student population

2024-2025 Goals and Focus Areas

- Introduce and train staff to the standards-aligned K-8 science resource (Savvas Science)
- Continue with our first trimester math pilot (iReady Math and Reveal Math), including piloting and choosing a primary math K-8 resource in the first trimester for full training and implementation in 2025-2026
- Continue our focus on curriculum writing and moving toward a digital repository for lessons, assessments and curriculum, K-12
- Continue utilizing PCCD grant money to support the creation of a K-12 scope and sequence for teaching students the soft skills needed for today's job market. Specifically, lessons and experiences focused on citizenship, collaboration, resilience, critical thinking, etc.
- Continue to focus on student growth in all subject areas, and specifically, primary testing subjects such as math, ELA and science; utilizing data from the state and iReady to guide our work
- Continue to build on the stretch growth scores and successes of the iReady diagnostic and individualized lesson pathways for all students K-12
- Continue to research and build relationships with local colleges in order to build on our college in high school experiences
- Create a K-12 history and social studies exploration committee to assess and consider primary resources for implementation in the 2026-2027 school year
- Provide additional professional development in science and ELA; to continue to strengthen pedagogy and efficacy
- CIP plans for every staff members, utilizing data to support student growth and goals; to include the distribution of data to all staff to support efforts

BUSINESS AND FINANCE ACHIEVEMENTS AND GOALS

2023-2024 Achievements

- Completed a master planning study, considering enrollment, finances and infrastructure to address future projections and cost-effective options for the short and long-term sustainability of the District
- Built a budget that is focused on the current and future sustainability of the district while being cognizant of the impact of tax increases on the public
- Spent the remaining bond funds to address priority needs to the District
- Hired and trained a new Business Manager and transitioned them into the District
- Partnered with the AIU to move to a new payroll system for the District and trained staff on the new system
- Established new budgetary practices for the administration and staff with the addition of a new Business Manager
- Procured a \$20,000 grant award for lead and radon testing for the district

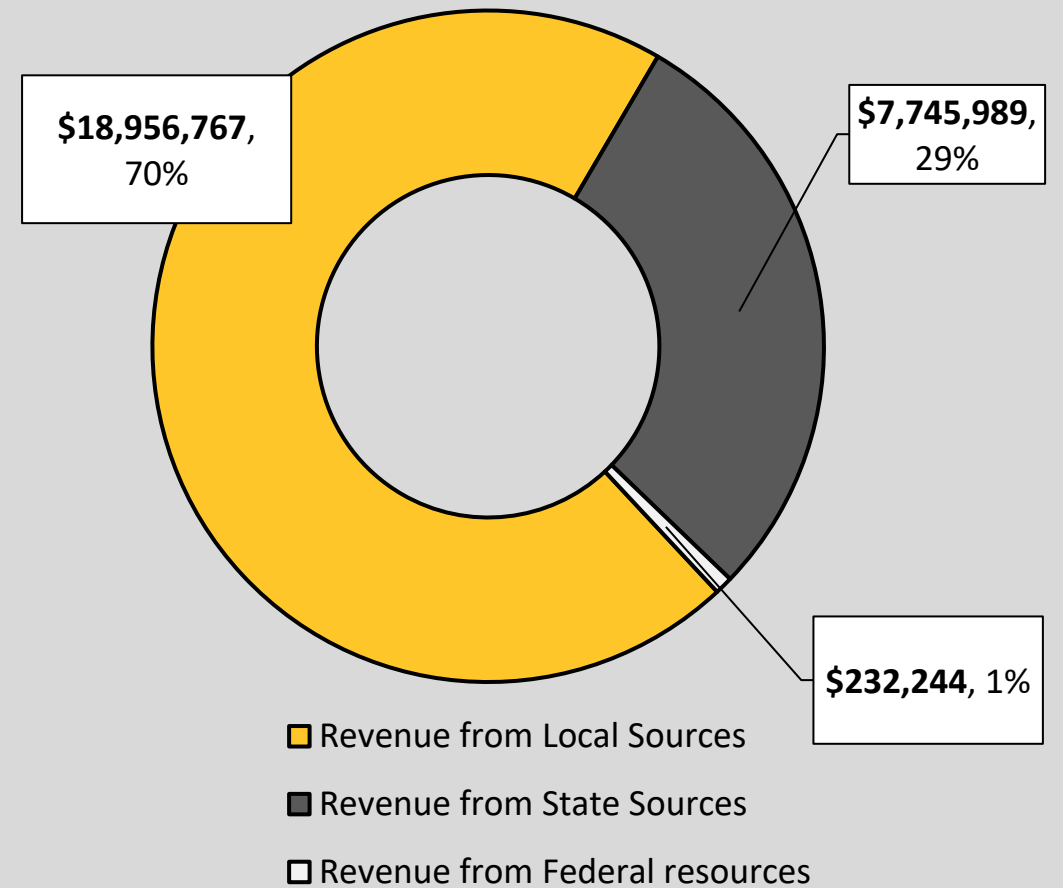

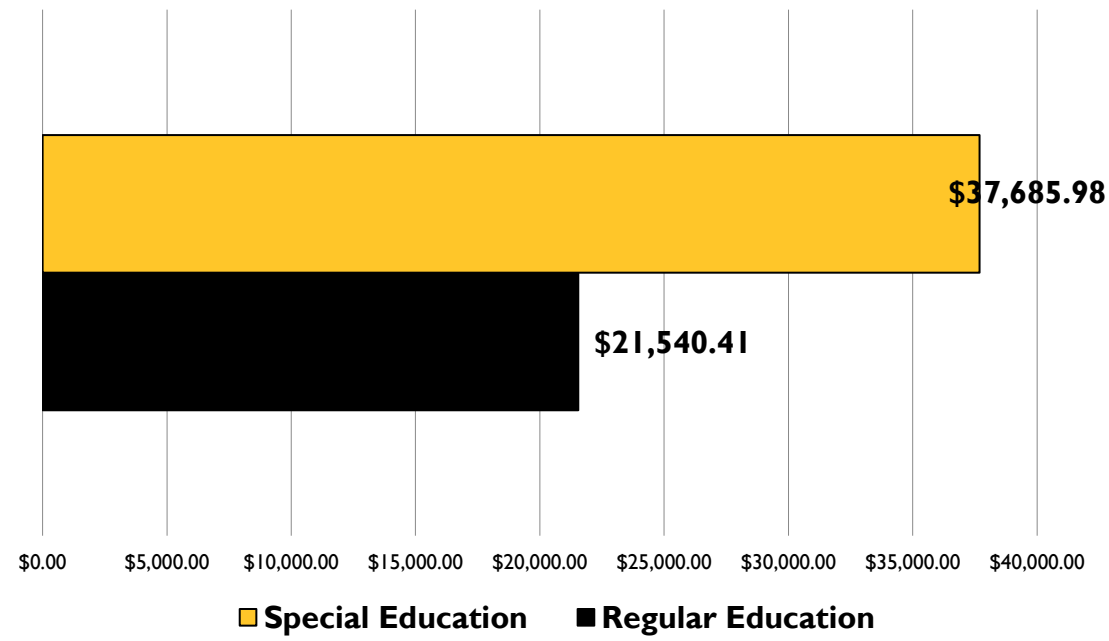

CHARTER SCHOOL TUITION COST IMPACTS

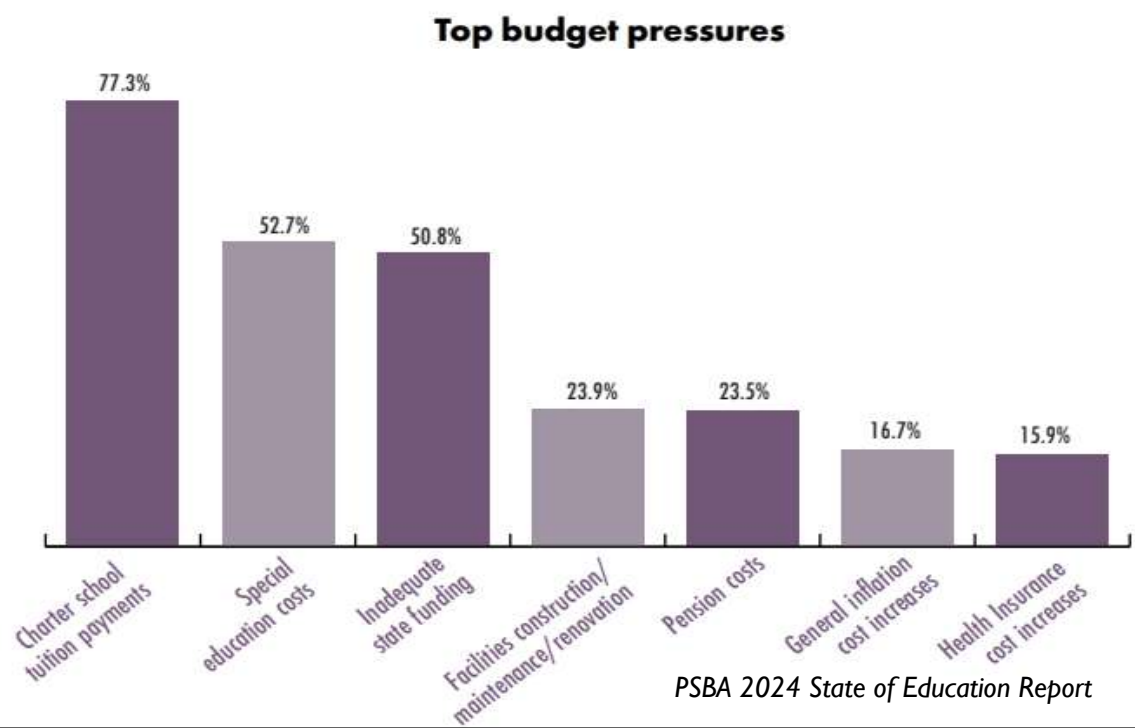
2024-2025 Estimated Riverview School District Charter School Per Pupil Costs



- We have an estimated 25 students that attend charter schools (19 reg, 6 SPED)
- In 2023-2024, Riverview charter school costs were approximately \$660,000!
- Should see a slight reduction in costs in the second half of the school year, due to the January 2024 Charter Reform
- Riverview has its own cyber program

Top budget pressure for fifth straight year is charter tuition

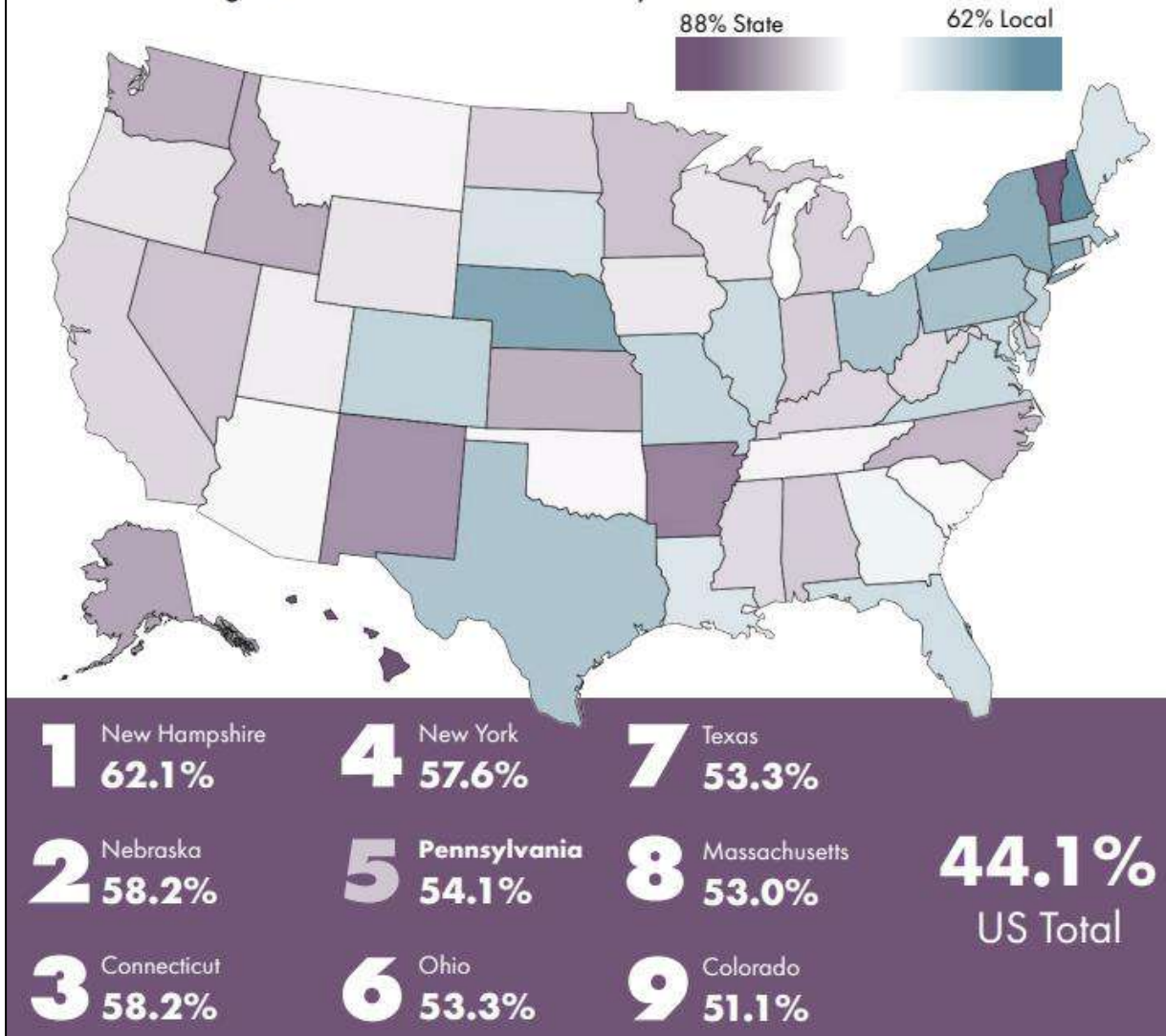
The most identified sources of budget pressure for school districts have remained consistent over the eight years of surveying school leaders for this report, highlighting the impact of mandated costs (charter school tuition payments, special education and pensions) and the need for additional state education funding. However, this year facilities costs have replaced pension costs in the top four budget pressures.



- Charter school funding continues to be a significant pressure on school budgets (amongst other unfunded mandates)
- Special education and regular education costs for students attending cyber charter schools continue to increase
- Some reform has occurred, we will report on its efficacy

Pennsylvania among highest in local share of education funding

From a national perspective, only four other states receive a higher proportion of public education funding from local revenues than Pennsylvania.¹⁰



PA EDUCATION FUNDING SHORTFALLS

- Despite increases in the state education budget this year, Pennsylvania remains among the lowest-ranked states in the United States for education funding
- Only four states receive a higher proportion of public education funding from local revenues than PA
- Insufficient state funding places a heavier burden on the local tax base to support school budgets
- This trend has remained consistent over the years
- PA state funding significantly lags behind rising costs (including staffing, pensions, and charter school tuition)
- Pennsylvania ranks 43rd out of 50 states in school funding, placing it as the 7th worst in the U.S.

SPECIAL EDUCATION FUNDING SHORTFALLS

Special education expenses outpace revenues

Public schools have experienced a 74.8% increase in special education costs over the last 12 years. State and federal funding for special education has only increased 9.9% in that time.¹⁹

State and federal special education funding vs expenditures

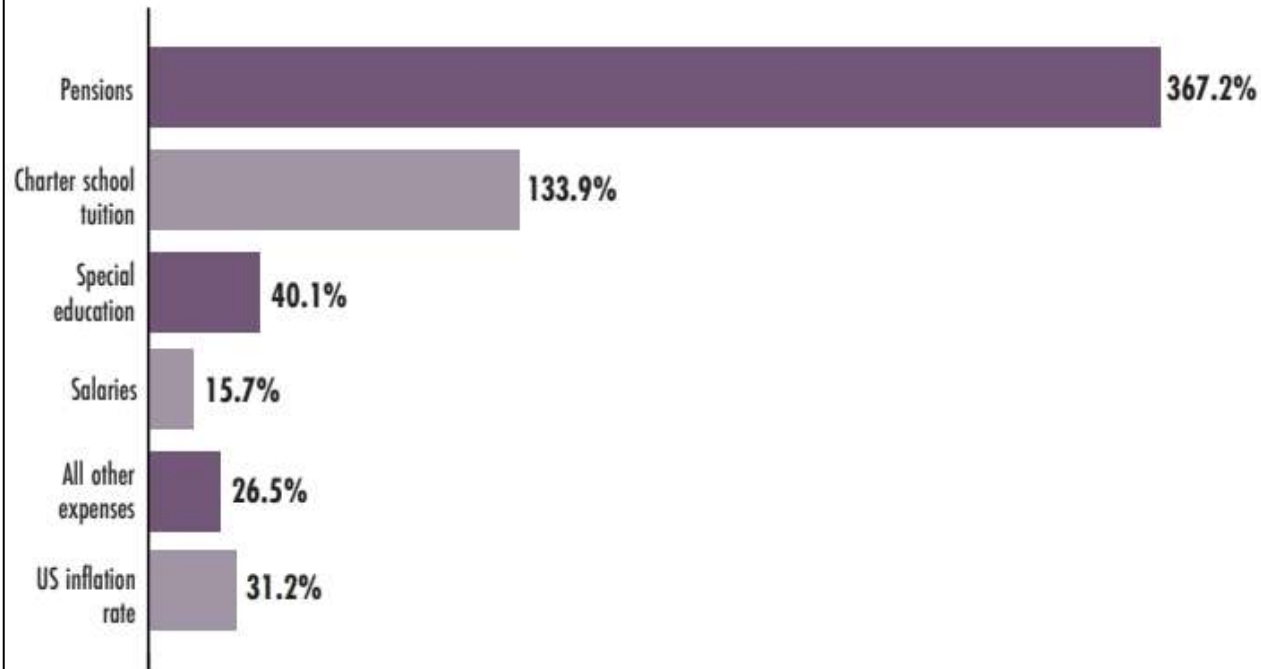


- This graph illustrates the significant gap between state and federal funding for special education compared to rising costs
- While there have been modest increases in special education funding this year, overall funding has remained relatively flat for the past two decades
- The number of special education students at Riverview (18%) and across Pennsylvania continues to grow, with nearly 1 in 5 students receiving special education services
- These percentages increase annually, yet funding remains consistently stagnant
- In 2023-2024, Riverview faced approximately **\$1,700,000 in underfunded special education costs**

School districts are controlling expenses

The growth in mandated expenses, particularly pension costs, charter school tuition payments and special education over the last decade, have drastically outpaced the growth in all areas of school spending.¹⁵ Yet, districts have kept the growth in other areas of spending well below the rate of inflation.

Growth in expenses from 2011-12 to 2021-22



- Each year, mandated employer contribution rates for state pensions increase, significantly impacting school budgets
- Approximately one-third of all human capital costs must be allocated to obligations for the PA Public School Employees' Retirement System (PSERS)
- The State has underfunded this system for many years, shifting the financial burden onto school districts, and subsequently, our taxpayers
- Pennsylvania ranks 11th nationwide in current expenditures per student, at \$17,884 per student, with \$5,948 (33%) allocated to employee benefits. Only Illinois (35.9%) and Michigan (33.4%) dedicate a higher percentage to benefits, including pension costs
- There is no foreseeable end to the increasing contributions required from districts, as the State continues to pass these costs onto local school districts and taxpayers.

2023-2024 RIVERVIEW HIGHLIGHTS AND ACCOLADES

Riverview School District and students received numerous awards and accolades in 2023-2024, including but not limited to:

- 10th Street Elementary was 1 of 2 schools in the State to receive the iReady Super Stretch School Award, demonstrating a high percentage of students making significant growth in reading and math
- Nine Riverview students were nominated for the American Legion Award from Post 600 of Oakmont (pictured above). The winners are Sophia Leasure and Sophie Yahnke
- Riverview students came in 6th place nationwide in the National History Day competition in Baltimore
- Students at Riverview were provided access to mindfulness and yoga classes in partnership with Homegrown Yoga
- Verner students collected 1,147 food items as part of the Verner Student Council's 6th Spread the Love Food Drive
- Sitting Pennsylvania Auditor General Timothy DeFoor visited Riverview this past school year to speak with Mrs. Kvortek's personal finance classes and discuss financial literacy
- Students from both elementary schools participated at our first-ever Elementary Science Fair this past year
- More than a dozen Riverview students participated in this year's Phipps Fairchild challenge with third grader Piper Machen winning first place in the "Sea Creature Creations" category
- A new scoreboard was installed this spring at Riverside Park to align with new WPIAL and PIAA standards
- A new, renovated fitness center will greet Riverview Jr-Sr High School students as the room was renovated in June
- New safety decals were installed across Riverview facilities in a show of both Raider spirit and school security

- There were many athletic accomplishments throughout the 2023-2024 school year, including:
 - Boys Cross Country came in second place at the PIAA Class A championships last year. The boys team WON the WPIAL XC Class A Championship for a second straight year.
 - Riverview girls' cross country team finished 2nd in Class A at WPIAL last school year and 13th at PIAA.
 - Gwyn Fichte ran her third PIAA race, becoming one of only 14 Riverview girls' runners in school history to do so.
 - The Riverview Girls Soccer Team reached the PIAA Final
 - Riverview '24 Graduate Lola Abraham won the 2023 Moe Rosensteel Award Most Outstanding Player of the Year as well as the 2024 Gatorade Pennsylvania Girls Soccer Player of the Year
 - Girls Basketball Lady Raider Elizabeth Loughren was named a recipient of the GREEN 13 Leadership Award
 - Riverview 2024 Graduate Callie Harden was one of only three players in all of WPIAL AA to be chosen for a 2023 Sportsmanship Award for Girls Varsity Tennis
