WHAT IS A TITLE I SCHOOL?

- Schools that have 40% or more students that from low - income families
- In 2021-2022, there was 63% of traditional public schools identified as a Title I school
 - Not all schools identified actually participate in Title programs for additional funding


WHAT IS THE SCHOOLWIDE IMPROVEMENT PLAN?

The Schoolwide Improvement Plan includes:


- The identification of the school planning team and how they will be engaged in the planning process;

- Prioritized (S.M.A.R.T.) goals, strategies, and action steps to help address the academic and non-academic needs of students;
- Teacher and staff professional development needs; and
- Budgets and the coordination of resources.

The school <u>must</u> include family representatives on our school planning team.


ELA 4 YEAR GROWTH, PROGRAM EVALUATION RESULTS

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WHAT ARE OUR SCHOOLWIDE PROGRAM GOALS?

HOW DOES OUR SCHOOL USE TITLE I FUNDS?

- In 2024-2025, our school was allotted approximately \$1,043,530 in Title I funding from the Bureau of Indian Education and \$3,816,178.55 from State Title I.
- We developed a Schoolwide Program, which means we plan to spend our funds on the following:
 - Professional Development/Trainings:
 Staff in the areas of ELA, Math, and SEL
 - Staff Salaries/positions:
 - Teachers, Social Workers, Education Technicians, Security Guard, Counselor, Curriculum Coordinator
 - Programs/Materials/Supplies:
 - After school Tutoring, Saturday School/a variety of evidence-based teaching materials/supplies/ equipment & technology
 - Parent and Family Engagement activities:
 - Parent Nights Scheduled Monthly,
 - McKinney-Vento required set-aside:
 - .5% Education for Homeless Youth and Children

OPTIMIZING BRAIN POWER FOR STATE TESTING, WHAT CAN FAMILIES DO

- You can contact your child's teacher for their score if they do not contact you


HOW IS PARENT AND FAMILY ENGAGEMENT FUNDED?

- Any school with a Title I allocation exceeding \$500,000 is required by law to set aside 1% of its Title I allocation for parent and family engagement.
- You, as Title I parents and family members, have the right to be involved in how this money is spent.
- In 2024 2025, we allocated \$38,161.78 from the State Title and \$57,017.03 from the BIE in parent and family engagement funding because we received approximately \$4,859,708.55 in Title I funds. We plan to use these funds for:
 - Parent and Family Engagement Meetings and Events
 - September 17th, October 21st.. PAC members decide which day of the Month works best for them. IF YOU WOULD LIKE TO PARTICIPATE CONTACT ANNA ROSS OR KAYLA JETTY
 - PAC members decide the date for the Family Nights and pick activities
 Tentatively 5 family nights will be held in November, December,
 February, March, April/May
 - Materials/Supplies/Resources
 - Materials for all Family / Parent Nights (each will depend on the activity for the night)

WHAT IS A SCHOOL-PARENT-STUDENT COMPACT?

- A school-parent-student compact is a written commitment that outlines how the entire school community—teachers, families, and students will share the responsibility for improved academic achievement.
- The compact must describe how the school will:
 - Provide high-quality curriculum and instruction;
 - Hold parent-teacher conferences, annually in elementary schools (best practice is at all school levels)
 - Provide parents with reports on their child's progress;
 - Provide parents reasonable access to staff;
 - Provide parents opportunities to volunteer; and
 - Ensure regular two-way meaningful communication between family members and staff, to the extent practicable, in a language family members can understand.

WHAT ARE MY RIGHTS?

- The families and parents of Title I students have a right, by law, to:
 - Be involved in decisions made at the school and district level;
 - Provided with information on your child's level of achievement on tests in reading/language arts, writing, mathematics, and science;
 - Request opportunities for regular meetings to formulate suggestions and to participate, as appropriate, in decisions about the education of your child. The school is required to respond to any such suggestions as soon as practicably possible; and
 - Request and receive information on the qualifications of your child's teacher and paraprofessionals who are working with your child. This information can be requested by contacting TMMS.
