










To make a prediction means to say what you think will happen. You can use clues from the title, picture or text (written words) to make a prediction.

To fetch means to get. A pail is a bucket. Jack's crown is the top of his head. Tumbling means falling.



Little Miss Muffet



We're going to read a nursery rhyme about a spider. Listen carefully to find out how the little girl in the nursery rhyme feels about spiders.

Little Miss Muffet

We're going to read a nursery rhyme called Little Miss Muffet. It has some words in it you might not have heard before.

In the poem, the little girl is eating curds and whey. Curds are white clumps of cheese and whey is the liquid they are in. It is like cottage cheese.






