

Alex Vocab: pages 9-16

Crude-A rude or vulgar action.

"It was a very crude thing to do, in a chapel and all, but it was also quite amusing." (Salinger 17)

The use of this word sets the tone of the passage by describing a rude action that took place in a place of worship.

Qualms-Uneasiness or concern about something.

"Do you have any particular qualms about leaving Pencey?" (Salinger 14)

The use of this word advances character development by demonstrating Mr. Spencer's attempt to empathize with Holden.

Compulsory- Required by rule

"He didn't say anything then, but the next night he made us have a compulsory study hall in the academic building..." (Salinger 17)

Using this word shows that the character who issued the study hall had authority and power.

Emma Vocab 17-26

qualm (n)- an uneasy feeling of doubt

"Do you have any particular *qualms* about leaving Pencey?" (Salinger 17)

The use of qualm, an unusual and somewhat pretentious word to use, shows the high status of the school and how the teachers are highly educated.

compulsory (adj)- required by rule

"...but the next night he made us have compulsory study hall in the academic building..." (Salinger 20)

Because the study hall was compulsory, or mandatory, it showed the stringency of the rules at Pencey.

chiffonier (n)- a tall chest of drawers

"...picking up your personal stuff off your desk and chiffonier." (Salinger 23)

The addition of the description chiffonier helps the reader visualize the setting of the dorm room.

What does this section reveal about Holden's character? Is there a certain tone being used to convey this? Explain.

What does Holden's use of words such as "goddam" and "crap" show about the maturity of Holden? Why is his maturity so important to this part of the story?

How does Holden relate to modern day teenagers like ourselves? Explain using similarities and differences.

Matt - Thought Questions pages 9-16

What does Holden becoming annoyed at old Spencer after he repeats some phrases multiple times show about his character? (Page 10 last paragraph)

Even though Holden and old Spencer seem to have a good relationship (Holden sprints to his house and Mrs Spencer greets him like a friend), why does Holden seem like he hates old Spencer during Holdens' final meeting with him, and then becomes emotional when he leaves? (Page 11- bottom of page 15)

How is balance of contradictions shown in this section? Holden acts sophisticated and kind when he talks to his professor, but is also very annoyed when Mr. Spencer calls him "boy" and wants to leave soon after his arrival.

Ariel - Thought Questions pages 17-26

How is a balance of contradictions shown between the narrator's school work and his love of reading? What does this contradiction show about the narrator? (Page 18, connecting back to page 10)

The narrator is not a great student. His teachers feel he doesn't apply himself and he is failing most of his classes, yet he loves to read. Reading is an activity typically enjoyed by sharp minded people who would not so adamantly hate school work and would not do so poorly in school. This balance of contradictions shows that the narrator's problem in school is not a lack of intelligence, but something else.

What is/are the of tone(s) of the narrator's comments to and about Robert Ackley? Do the tones of his different comments ever create a balance of contradictions? (23-24)

What is the tone with which Stradlater is speaking to the narrator? Is this tone strange considering the narrator will be leaving the school? Why or why not? (25-26)

Robert

The passage I choose was on page two and it is the last half of the page. It begins with "Anyway, it was Saturday".

The concept is: Outcast/Fitting In

The narrator is acting as an outcast by standing alone over watching the football game from the top of Thomsen Hill. If he wanted to fit in with the others at Pencey he would have been down on the bleachers with "Practically the whole school" (Salinger 2) cheering alone with them.

Reading Due – 26 to 52

Annemarie Horn Vocab pg. 26-35

Exhibitionist (29): a person who behaves in an extravagant way in order to attract attention

"All I need's an audience. I'm an exhibitionist" (Salinger 29).

Holden has a sarcastic sense of humor because he was joking about being a good tap-dancer, when, in reality, he is not.

Liberate (30): to set (someone) free from a situation

"Liberate yourself from my viselike grip" (Salinger 30).

Since Holden is weak and Stradlater is strong, Holden may have wanted to feel strong and powerful for just a few seconds.

Conceited (34): excessively proud of oneself

"You couldn't rile him too easily. He was too conceited" (Salinger 34).

Due to Stradlater's arrogance, it is difficult to make him irritated. Stradlater rarely listens to insults because of his excessive pride.

Ben – Vocab 36-44

Psychoanalyzed: To be tested for mental health

"they were going to have me <u>psychoanalyzed</u> and all, because I broke all the windows in the garage" (Salinger 39).

It lets us understand that even Holden's parents felt like there was something wrong with their son, and they thought he needed help.

Unscrupulous: Not right; bad

"I know what I'm talking about. He was Unscrupulous (underlining just stopped working here). He really was" (Salinger 40).

Since Holden think's Stradlater was a bad person because of his tone and words, we can make an inference that he is jealous and wants Jane to be his girlfriend.

Linoleum: Shiny material you put on floors

"Anyway, the corridor was linoleum and all, and you could hear his goddamn footsteps" (Salinger 40).

Holdens attention to detail is a very interesting topic. Instead of being insane or messed up, he may be a very short-attention spanned person who likes to look at random details.

Rey 45-52

Page (46): "I'm not too tough. I'm a **pacifist**, if you want to know the truth" (Salinger 46). (A person who believes in Pacifism or is opposed to war or to violence of any kind). A person who hates to fight or doesn't like violence of any kind.

Page (47): "Listen I said do you feel like playing a little <u>Canasta</u>" (Salinger 47). (A variety of cards in which the main object is to meld sets of seven or more cards). A card game for two to six players who seek to a mass point's by declaring sets of cards.

Witty (48): "Ackley said what a <u>Witty</u> guy. How about turning off the light" (Salinger 48). (Clever in speech and writing; amusingly clever in perception and expression). An Intelligent and clever writer. As good as his own writing.

Pages 1-8

What does Holden's use of words such as "goddam" and "crap" show about the maturity of Holden? Why is his maturity so important to this part of the story?

Holden is 16 yet very immature. He appears to have no regard for his future or anybody or anything around him. This is shown when Holden says, "I wasn't supposed to come back after Christmas vacation, on account of I was flunking four subjects and not applying myself and all." Holden explains his expulsion very relaxed as though he is not bothered that he has been kicked out of school. This shows that he is unable to grasp the severity of his consequences and is not mature enough to look after himself and make good decisions.

Matt

How is balance of contradictions shown in this section? Holden acts sophisticated and kind when he talks to his professor, but is also very annoyed when Mr. Spencer calls him "boy" and wants to leave soon after his arrival.

Holden shows a contradiction of being both sophisticated and immature during this section of the reading. During Holden's conversation with Mr. Spencer, he is kind and polite when he answers Mr. Spencer's questions, despite being very irritated with Mr. Spencer, especially when he calls Holden "boy" and talks about Holden's essay about the Egyptians. Even though he thinks childish in his head during his conversation, Holden responds to Mr. Spencer's questions with logical, polite answers. In other words, Holden was able to keep his composure despite

desperately wanting to perhaps yell at Mr. Spencer for calling him "boy" and storming out of his house. In this way, Holden shows that he can be both immature and sophisticated.

Vocab p. 53-65

Conscientious- Take care in what you do. Do things with purpose opposed to just getting it done. Do a good job.

"Some of the faculty are pretty conscientious" (Salinger 55).

It shows how much pressure is being put on Holden at school. If the teachers were more laid back, he might not have been failing 4 of his 5 classes and still be in Pencey.

Crumby- Disgusting

"It's really too bad that so much crumby stuff is a lot of fun sometimes" (Salinger 62).

To say something is crumby is nicer than saying it's disgusting. It shows that although he uses a lot of slang and curses a lot, he's still innocent. Even when talking about things such as sex, like in this scene, Holden still tries to act as innocent as possible which is contradictory to the way he normally speaks and acts.

Peculiar- Strange, uncommon

"This is certainly a peculiar time to call a person up, though" (Salinger 65).

It shows that Holden doesn't care much about others. If he wants to go out for a drink in the middle of the night, he will find someone to go with him. It shows he has determination. Merritt Shelton

Group 3 vocab pgs. 66-72

Putrid (adj) - Very unpleasant, repulsive

"The band was putrid." (Salinger 69).

The use of this word shows how Holden felt about how badly they were playing.

Suave (adj) – charming, confident, and elegant

"I didn't ask them crudely or anything. Very suave, in fact." (Salinger 70).

Using suave really emphasized that the character tried to act confident while

asking the girls to dance.

Immaterial (adj) – unimportant under the circumstances; irrelevant

"It's immaterial to me," she said." (Salinger 72).

Because the girl thought it was immaterial of her to dance with him, it shows that

she thinks she is better than him.

Leora

Concept: Loneliness vs. Accompaniment

Within the first ten pages (from 53-80) you can see how lonely Holden is. He is standing in Penn Station in the phone booth and can't think of anyone to call for "support". Then Mrs. Morrow didn't want to spend anymore time with him and his driver didn't want to get drinks with him. Yet he didn't want to stay at any hotel on the upper east side because he was afraid that he would see someone that he knew. Holden not only realizes his loneliness, but he points out other people's loneliness, "I saw one guy, a gray-haired.../ He was all alone, too" (Salinger 60). And finally when he decided to call someone it was a friend of a friend and she couldn't go out with him. If you think about a rich, prep school guy you might assume that he has lots of company and being at a boarding school Holden still finds ways to be lonely.

Sydney

How is not being able to decide who to call on the phone similar to the rambling on the first page? What does this show about Holden? (page 59)

It is similar because in both instances Holden wants to do something, whether it was calling a friend or family member, or deciding how to start a story. Holden is not an extremely committed person because he decides to do something, but then backs out after he started. He does not have the will to accomplish a task, shown both with the phone and with his school subjects. He has done this multiple times throughout the book, including when he explained the entire backstory behind the baseball glove.

Fefe

What is the tone when Holden describes his sibling's behaviors and mindsets? How do these behaviors and mindsets compare to that of Holden?

Holden describes his siblings as almost to the point the exact opposite of him. He makes sure to point out his sister's intelligence, Allie's kindness, and D.B.'s success. Each of these traits are ones he greatly lacks, resulting in a resentful, jealous tone.

Jordan

What tone is shown when Holden is being very judgmental and critical of everything the 3 women do?

It shows that he is lost and he doesn't know what to do with his life because he is alone- this is also shown when he was going to call his sister, but he doesn't because he is afraid that his parents would pick up the phone. This shows that he feels uncomfortable talking with many people and that there is only one person he would want to talk to, and now he is trying to distract himself by finding problems of others rather than focusing on his own.

Reading due 81-104

Robert Britto 81-87 vocab

1) **Hoodlumy** - A thug or gangster looking person most likely part of a gang

"Now and then you saw . . . a bunch of hoodlumy - looking guys and their dates" (pg 81).

This shows how Holden views the neighborhood he is in and the people who live there.

2) **Puke** - Throw up, vomit

"You should've heard the crowd, though, when he was finished. You would've puked" (pg 84)

This shows his feelings towards people when they think about something differently than he does.

3) Flitty - Something thats looks homosexual

"This Joe Yale - looking guy, in a . . . flitty looking Tattersall vests (pg 85)

This shows how he has an instinct to judge people in what seems to be in homophobic way and based on their material goods like clothes.

Vocabulary: 88-95

Matt

Galoshes: a waterproof overshoe that protects a shoe from rain. (page 88)

I'd have gone to his closet and found the gloves somewhere. Hidden in his goddam galoshes or something.

Holden said that he would find his stolen gloves in someone's galoshes because it is an unlikely place to find a pair of gloves, but Holden wants to believe that he has outsmarted the thief by looking in the most unexpected places. Similar to other places in the story, Holden thinks or plays out scenarios in his head in which he his better than the other person he his thinking about or talking to.

Chateau: a country estate, especially a fine one, in France or elsewhere on the Continent. (page 93)

He had this big <u>chateau</u> and all, on the Riviera, in Europe, and all he did in his spare time was beat women off with a club.

Holden used this word because he wanted to associate rich men with being violent towards women. He does this because he is somewhat biased against rich, snobby people, which he has shown in previous parts of the story. When he mentions that the man was rich, it reassures himself that rich people aren't as perfect as they seem.

Conversationalist: a person who enjoys and contributes to good conversation. (page 96)

She was a lousy conversationalist.

Holden saying that Sunny is a lousy conversationalist shows his experience with conversing with other people, and he believes that his conversing skills are superior to Sunny. He says this while he begins to doubt Sunny and starts to find all of her unfavorable characteristics after he had just been complementing her. This relates to Holden's earlier encounter with Mr. Spencer, which at first he was optimistic about the meeting but then became irritated with his teacher and started pointing out all of his flaws and wanted to leave his home.

Ariel Goldman Vocab 96-104

Chisel: to obtain something using unfair or shrewd methods

"You're trying to chisel me" (Salinger 101).

This word shows that Holden believes Sunny and Maurice are morally unjust in trying to intimidate him into giving him another five dollars.

Plugged: an informal term for shooting someone or something

I sort of started pretending I had a bullet in my guts. Old Maurice had <u>plugged</u> me" (Salinger 103-104).

Holden fantasizing that Maurice plugged, in other words shot, him shows that Holden wishes it had taken more to take his money.

Rubbernecks: an informal term for people who turns their heads to stare at something in a manner that is foolish

"I felt like jumping out the window. I probably would've ... if I'd been sure somebody'd cover me up ... I didn't want a bunch of stupid <u>rubbernecks</u> looking at me when I was all gory" (Salinger 104).

Holden worrying about rubberneckers looking at him after he commits suicide when he is thinking about committing it shows how his mind works. He thinks about little details others would not think about, in this example the rubberneckers, but thinks less about the big picture, in this example losing his life.

Matt – he feels alone – feels everyone against him – takes it out doing certain things – bad stuff happens and nobody to turn to – internal anger he can't get out

Ariel – H is cynical – all of the movies mainstream culture is bad and annoying – does not like any of it

Caroline – life is full of bipolar emotions – when something good happens something bad happens to it – suicide cowardly – does not want to deal with his responsibilities…runs away from the school…

Sydney – most of his issue – he lives in his head – seems like a coward but he thinks it later – thinks about what he should have done

Melissa – adding on to Caroline – reason he hired prostitute – he wanted someone to talk to – spill out what he was feeling to somebody – he knew she would listen –

Alex – H's character – he is a loner and a jerk – making fun of these other people – shouldn't listen to other people's conversations

Emma – pretty evident that H is a loner – judgmental at jazz bar and those three girls – at the same time – exhibitionist and keeps trying to get other people's approval – how would he look as a dead body on the sidewalk?

Annemarie – p104 – he gets carried away with his imagination and over-exaggeration – always trying to be someone he is not – the people in the movies seem perfect – he tries to be like them but he can't.

Sherman – trapped anger – trapped in an endless loop of depression – more confused than depressed does not know what to do with his life.

Emma

How does Holden's need to get to know the prostitute before he sleeps with her relate to his relationship with Jane?

Before Holden ordered the prostitute, he was felt upset about the fact that Stradlater went on a date with Jane, and he reminisced about the time that he and Jane spent together. He liked Jane for her personality rather than her looks. He earlier described her by saying that he "wouldn't describe her as strictly beautiful...sort of muckle-mouthed" (Salinger 77). However, he was still infatuated with her. He cared more about the way that she played checkers and the conversations that they had together than something as superficial such as the shape of her mouth. He felt as if she were unlike other girls in that they could be together without him having to flirt with her or tease her to gain her attention. Instead, they could talk easily and without sexual pressures. At some level, when he ordered the prostitute, he wanted to feel as though he were spending time with Jane once again. He later realized that the prostitute would not fill the void that the absence of Jane left, and this devastating reality caused him to want to send her away. In stark contrast to Jane, the prostitute was pretty, but she was unsurprisingly not a fantastic conversationalist.

Alex

What does Holden's confession on page 92 show about him? Is Holden an honest guy? Holden's confession on page 92 shows that despite his negative past, he can still be very honest and trustworthy at times. However, earlier in the book and up to this point, Holden has also pointed out and admitted to being a liar and being very good at it. So, Holden might not be a completely honest guy, but he can be trusted and honest.

Jealous vs Content

When Holden is in the cab driving to Old Ernie's he feels lonely and understands that he is lonely, however, when he sees and hears other men walking with their dates and laughing together he gets jealous of the fun they are having. He tries to make himself seem like he is not jealous by downplaying their laughing and calling their fun fake and stupid to make himself feel better about the fact that he is lonely and not content with that fact. Holden can't stop himself from being jealous of the guys he sees with their dates.

Dough: Money (pg.118)

"I took the cab up to the park. I should've taken a subway or something, because I was getting slightly low on <u>dough</u>..." (Salinger 118).

Holden is going to eventually run out of money and if he does run out he might have to go home and get some more. Holden should be careful with the rest of his money and he should not waste it on anything such as a prostitute.

Phony: Fake, deceiving fraudulent (pg.116)

"I went over and bought two orchestra seats for I know My Love... I didn't much want to see it, but I knew old Sally, the queen of the <u>phonies</u>, would start drooling all over the place when I told her I had tickets for that,..." (Salinger 116).

Holden wants to hang out with Sally even though he knows that she is the "Queen of phonies." It doesn't seem like he cares that much about her bad characteristics.

Witch doctor: a magician credited with powers of healing (pg.120)

"There was one very spooky guy in the back of the canoe, with a mask on. He was the witch doctor. He gave me the creeps, but I liked him anyway" (Salinger 120).

The witch doctor helps the reader understand what Holden find creepy. Normally Holden takes good situations and figures out a way to make them seem bad but in this case he is making himself feel better by doing the opposite.

Spendthrift (Noun)

Definition: a person who spends money in an extravagant, irresponsible way. Sentence: "I', a goddam spendthrift at heart. What I don't spend, I lose" (Salinger 107)

He is talking about himself as a spendthrift. He wanted to act mature and try to become an adult. But he is being irresponsible by spending his money on places. This helps us understand more about his character and his intentions of wanting to change. But he is becoming an irresponsible adult by acting like that. Sentence: "they never went anywhere swanky for lunch. It made me so damn sad what I thought about it" (Salinger 114)

Holden puts a price on many things, and when he saw the nuns and said they never went anywhere swanky for lunch. It made him sad, which he couldn't live a life without his luxury feelings. He is very delicate when it comes to money because he worries too much about other people as well and how people look at him.

S: Holden? Holden are you still there?

H: What?

S: Have you been ignoring me this whole time?

H: No. I- I wasn't. I was just... lost in thought.

Another pause

S: What's going on it that head of yours Holden?

Holden doesn't respond. He sinks to the floor and clears his throat.

H: So you want to meet me under the clock at the Biltmore at two o'clock?

Sally doesn't seem to notice anything wrong

S: Grand.

She hangs up and Holden lets his head drop into his hands

Why did you chose that scene as important?

It's a perfect example of one of Holden's many contradictions. He wants to go out with Sally mainly because he doesn't know who else to call and/or doesn't want to call the people he does want to talk to. So Holden sets up this date and even before he gets off the phone, Holden is having second thoughts. He wants to tell Sally to forget it but doesn't say anything. By the end of the reading, Holden wishes that he never made that date with Sally.

What does it show about the characters?

It shows that Holden is lonely and wants some companionship but he over complicates everything. He could have called Jane, the one he really wants to go out with, but he's too worried about talking to her mother. Holden doesn't consider that Jane's mother will just pass the phone to Jane with no questions. He always see the bad side of things and it just makes life more difficult for him.

Why did you chose to act it out the way you did?

I wanted to show both sides of Holden. There's the side that he presents himself as, the mature, polite, fun-loving, and social Holden, and then there's the lonely, depressed, approval seeking Holden that he doesn't want anyone to know about. I wanted to show what both sides would do in this situation and the internal struggle that Holden faces. It also gives the audience a look at what's going on inside of Holden's mind because sometimes the most outgoing people are also the most miserable.

Vocab: pages 123-133

Raspy: page 123

"He was one of the biggest bores I ever met. He had one of those very <u>raspy</u> voices, and he never stopped talking" (Salinger 123).

Definition: harsh or grating

This word is used to describe the kind of voice Holden's roommate used to have. Holden put up with Harris Macklin, the roommate, for two months because he was a good whistler. Harris Macklin was a boring person who had nothing to talk about, but he talked anyway. By describing his voice as raspy, it shows that Holden did not enjoy listening to him speak. By creating a character who enjoys talking, but does not have a voice that is enjoyable to listen to, it shows a balance of contradictions.

Nauseating: page 127

"You should have seen the way they said hello... Old buddyroos. It was <u>nauseating</u>" (Salinger 127)

Definition: causing sickness of the stomach

This was used to describe Holden's reaction to Sally and her old friend saying hello. They talked as if they were old friends who had not seen each other in years, even though they barely knew each other. This kind of behavior made Holden sick to his stomach.

Oodles; page 133

"No, there wouldn't be. There wouldn't be oodles of places to go at all." (Salinger 133)

Definition: large quantity of

Holden is trying to convince Sally to run away with him. He says there are so many places for them to go, but Sally wants to wait until after college. Holden believes that after college everything would be different and there would not be a lot of places to go. Sally is a more proper, by the book, kind of character, while Holden does what and when he wants.

Jordan

p. 137-151

Conceited- vain

"It's a funny thing about girls.... a bastard- very mean, or very conceited and all- and..." (Salinger 135).

This shows that since Holden is very jealous of this man that went out on a date with Jane, he makes fun of him to try and convince Jane that he isn't special, and he calls him cocky and a show off.

Sacrilegious- profane and sinful

"...fancy costumes and all. Sally said I was a sacrilegious athiest" (Salinger 137).

Holden is recalling a time that Sally called him a sinful atheist, which shows that he might be thinking about why Jane won't go out with him and pick up his calls- he is doubting himself.

Furlough-leave of absence

"I was practically a child at... on furlough and all, all he ever did was lie on his bed,..." (Salinger 140).

After the movie, Holden is once again admiring his brother by noting that he was in the army for 4 years, showing that he is down on himself and he's trying to detract himself on his own problems by admiring his brother's accomplishments.

This concept relates to the passage because there is a distinct and sudden change in tone in the passage. At first, Holden is nonchalant and well behaved, speaking to Sally about trimming the Christmas tree. The story takes a sharp turn when he gets extremely excited about school, and his hatred of it. He begins to scare Sally as he steps over the boundaries and takes it too far. Holden seems to have a knack for getting himself into these types of situations, and seems to continuously get to a point where he can't help but take a conversation too far and scare off those closest to him.

Caroline

The Catcher in the Rye Concept (pgs 132-133)

For my <u>Catcher in the Rye</u> concept, I decided to do acting like a coward and acting brave. When Holden asks Sally to run away with him he is not only being selfish he is also being a coward. Holden does not want to face his problems. He does not think how this will affect Sally and her family as well as his. Holden becomes upset with Sally because she tells him the non-sugar coated truth; she says his plan is insane. Holden does not want to think that he wants to think that there is an alternative other than facing his problems and the messes he has created.

Another <u>Cather in the Rye</u> concept shown in this scene is recklessness and responsibility. Holden asks Sally to run away with him yet he has no plan or money. He also does not have a full education or real life experiences. Running away from his problems will lead him into sinking deeper in the quick sand of messes he creates.

Art of Persuasion is also shown in this passage. Holden fails to come up with acceptable reasons as to why they should run away. He has no money nor a plan and shelter to live in.

Leora

Why do you think that Holden got so jealous when Sally and George started talking? To what extent do Holden's judgments about other people cloud his own judgements from right and wrong?

I think that Holden has a tenancy to not realize what he has until it's gone, so the second something of his is "threatened", so to speak, he steps in and puts his guard up. Holden constantly criticizes and mocks other people and then looses sight of what is truly important which effects his grades, relationships, etc...We have seen this before with Odysseus because he never realized how much he had until he had nothing, no wife, no son, no palace. holden also focuses a lot on the bad and not too much on the good which effect your attitude and perspective because results depend on what you make of it.

Reading Due 157-180

Emma - Vocab **Plastered**: drunk

"...I broke it on the way home...I was plastered" (Salinger 163).

Holden mentions to his sister that he was drunk the other night. This shows that they are extremely close, and that she is his confidant. Also, the casual way that he mentions his drunkenness shows how it is not out of the ordinary for him to get drunk.

Grippy: sick

"...Alice had a cold, and her mother kept asking her the whole time if she felt grippy."

Both Phoebe and Holden use slang words, which is a similarity between the two of them. The slang words and small vocabulary are a sign of her "age appropriate immaturity", which at times Holden seems to have as well.

Ostracize: to exclude someone

"She was ostracizing the hell out of me" (Salinger 166)

Phoebe was upset with Holden because he constantly was getting into trouble. His trouble making was putting a strain on their family, so she was ignoring him as a form of punishment. This shows that even though they were close, Phoebe realized that Holden shouldn't continue to act out, and that he needed to start to try harder

Why does Holden wait to wake up Phoebe, when she is the only reason he is there? Does Holden consistently saying "old Phoebe" show him not wanting her to change? Is the ranch in Colorado that Holden might go to after New York the same place as the place in the start of the book?

Why does Holden connect the nuns with the boy who killed himself James Castle? Why does Holden think about Allie even when with Phoebe? Does this show the connection between Allie and Phoebe considering Allie died when he was 10. What does Phoebe and Holden's chat on page 177 show?

Sneaky vs Honest

After Holden gets really drunk, he finally decides that he wants to visit Phoebe even if it means getting caught by his parents. It has already been two days since Holden left Pencey and he still hasn't even told them that he is in New York. He devises this plan to sneak into his apartment and talk to Phoebe without letting his parents know. Instead of sneaking around, he could have just told his parents that he got kicked out because they were going to find out sooner or later, so he could have saved his money and just slept at home instead of at a bad hotel. In this passage it shows how cowardly he is because he is too scared to face his parents and tell them the truth. Even if they did get mad at him, they would have respected him more if he told them the truth rather than trying to hide it from them. This not only shows sneaky vs. honest, but it also shows coward vs. brave and mature vs. immature

Trust vs. Distrust (pg. 65) (165?)

The concept of trust vs. distrust relates to this section of the story because Holden trusts his little sister, Phoebe, more than anyone in the world, yet he hardly trusts his own parents. He shows his trust in her when he acknowledges the fact that he got kicked out of school, because Holden has failed to let even his own parents know his recent dismissal from Pencey.

My Catcher concept is shown in the passage on pages 176 through 177 from the words "You cross your legs" to "my heart was beating like a bastard" (Salinger 176-177). My concept is escape vs. reality. When Holden is indulging Phoebe in her belief that she can do silly things to make her forehead hotter he is demonstrating escape, because he is escaping from the reality that he was kicked out of school and is hiding from his parents with the temporary diversion. This

"escape" provides temporary relief from Holden's "real life" problems, but it does not solve them. When Holden's parents return and he has to hide from them he is brought back to the reality of his situation and becomes nervous as he hides from them, contrasting the joy he had just felt with Phoebe. Why did you chose that scene as important?

I believe that Holden just needs someone who he can talk to about his life. It seems as though Holden trusts Mr. Antolini because out of everyone he could have called, he picked Mr. Antolini. There must have been some other reason that he called Mr. Antolini other than for a place to stay. Maybe Holden thought that he would understand. What does it show about the characters?
