Grade Level: 3-6th Grades

Time Allotted: 2-3 40 minute art periods (40-60 minutes)

Materials Needed: Found objects (Nature: sticks, leaves, rocks, et Cetra) or household items(legos, silverware,

crayons/markers) & a camera

Lesson Objective:

Students will learn about artist Andy Goldsworthy and create a temporary art installation utilizing the art principals of Pattern and/or Rhythm.

Step by Step Directions:


Step 1:	 Review/Introduce Pattern & Rhythm A. Pattern: When art elements(lines, shapes, colors, space) are repeated B. Rhythm: Patterns that are repeated and create visual rhythm/movement 1. Rhythm can be regular: patterns are created by regularly repeating elements (AB AB AB AB) 2. Rhythm can be irregular: patterns are created by irregular or randomly repeated elements (A B ab A b AB)
Step 2:	Look at images of artwork by environmental artist Andy Goldsworthy and identify patterns/rhythms.

Step 3:	Consider and collect items that you have multiples of that you could arrange to create a temporary installation that utilizes the principle of pattern/rhythm. I. These items can be items found in nature or household items that you have a number of around the home. IIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIIII
Step 4:	Consider your background surface and arrange your found items into a composition using pattern/rhythm I. You may want to try multiple ways of arranging your items and select the layout that you like best as your final installation piece.

Step 5:	Use your camera/phone to take a photo of your installation and share the image with your teacher with a statement describing one or more of the patterns/rhythms in your work.
Step 6:	*If you have used items from around your house, make sure that you have returned them to the appropriate places. *If you have used found items in nature, you could leave your work for others to enjoy as long as it does not create any safety problems for others who share the space (<i>If you put rocks on the grass at a park, return them so that they are not a safety hazard for a mowing crew</i>)
