
Documenting the Yellow Fever Outbreak:



Build the Case Because... Were Dr. Lazear's actions heroic or reckless? · Lazear knew the dangers of yellow fever and was willing to test his theories anyway. · He wanted to learn the truth. Then... · He didn't want more people to lf... become infected. He was trying to prevent a yellow Dr. Jesse Lazear ...his actions fever outbreak. intentionally were heroic. · Accidents happen to everyone. infected himself · He put himself in danger and lied about it. · He ignored the pain it would cause Dr. Jesse Lazear ...his actions his wife and family. was infected · He did not consider how this were reckless. accidentally decision could impact his team. · If he believed in the mosquito theory, he should have done more to prevent accidental mosquito bites from entering the experiment, which could negate his results.

Instruct students to imagine that they are Dr. Lazear in the hospital in 1900. Based upon the evidence for either accidental or intentional infection that they determined was stronger, students will write a letter from Dr. Lazear's perspective to Mabel Lazear describing exactly what happened on September 13, 1900, and the motivation behind it.

- Remember, when you write in the voice of someone else, you want to make sure that your style is consistent—so that all your sentences and the words you choose sound as though they were written by Dr. Lazear.
- You also want to think about the emotion—or tone—you want to communicate in Dr. Lazear's letter. Is he regretful, angry, hopeful, full of love for his wife?
