

## **How American Is Baseball?**

Americans play many sports, but baseball is known as our national pastime. In the early 1800s, townball was popular in the United States. It was like a British game called rounders. To play, two teams took turns hitting and fielding a ball. In 1845, Alexander Cartwright made up a new set of rules for the game. He called it baseball.

People loved the game. Many towns formed their own teams. The first professional league appeared in 1871. At that time, immigrants were arriving from Europe. Playing ball helped them adapt to their new country. Into the early 1900s, baseball was a way for ethnic groups to prove themselves as Americans.


Baseball spread. People played in Japan and Latin American. In the mid-1900s, players came from countries such as the Dominican Republic, Cuba, and Puerto Rico. Among them is the great right fielder Roberto Clemente.

Roberto grew up in Puerto Rico. He was from a large family. As a boy he did odd jobs to earn money. But he loved playing baseball. In 1954, major league scouts discovered him. The next year he joined the Pittsburgh Pirates as a right fielder. In 1960, he helped his team win the World Series.

Clemente had a strong arm. He was also a dynamo at bat. In his career he had more than 3,000 hits. Off the field, Clemente was dedicated to helping others. On December 31, 1972, he was on his way to Nicaragua to deliver supplies for earthquake victims. His plane crashed, and he was killed. Clemente was the first Latin American player named to the Baseball Hall of Fame.

Today, baseball is popular in many nations. Players come to American baseball from all over the world. Major league baseball isn't just for Americans, anymore. It's just as easily the all-world sport as the all-American sport!
