


Prepositions

- Show position or direction
- Can be adjectives or adverbs.

Highlight the prepositional phrases



- "Few people are able to enjoy live theater on a regular basis. But we all see movies and watch television. Both movies and TV come out of the tradition of drama... Good readers, however, know that a book can be more entertaining than a movie...
- One reason for this is that watching a movie is passive, while reading can and should be active, like a sport. Good readers bring their imaginations, experiences, and feelings to the text in the same way you bring your experience to another person in a conversation or an encounter."

"Fiction is generally written in paragraphs; the script of a stage play consists of stage directions and dialogue, with labels to show which character is speaking. Italics are often used for the stage directions to distinguish them from the dialogue."

Participles



- A participle is "a form of a verb that is used to indicate a past or present action and that can also be used like an adjective" ("Participle").
- Example:
- In the phrases "the finishing touches" and "the finished product," "finishing" and "finished" are participles formed from the verb "finish."
