ATTENDANCE

- Be on time in the morning and between classes (4 min)
- Attendance is taken by periods (must be in class for 60 min to be counted present) – GOAL – 96%
- Limit leaving early
- Unexcused Absences > 10 days are considered excessive and could result in loss of course credit
 - Students are responsible for makeup work within 3 days of returning unless assignment due date already given.
- Academic success is more difficult if you miss school (1 absence in a high school class is = to 2 days in a middle school class)

GRADING

- Credit given on a semester basis
- Semester grading periods:
 - 2 nine week terms and an exam
 - Each grading period is worth 40% and the exam is worth 20% of the semester grade
- 10 Point Grading Scale will be used
- GPA starts at the end of the first semester
- Need a strong foundation to build a successful GPA

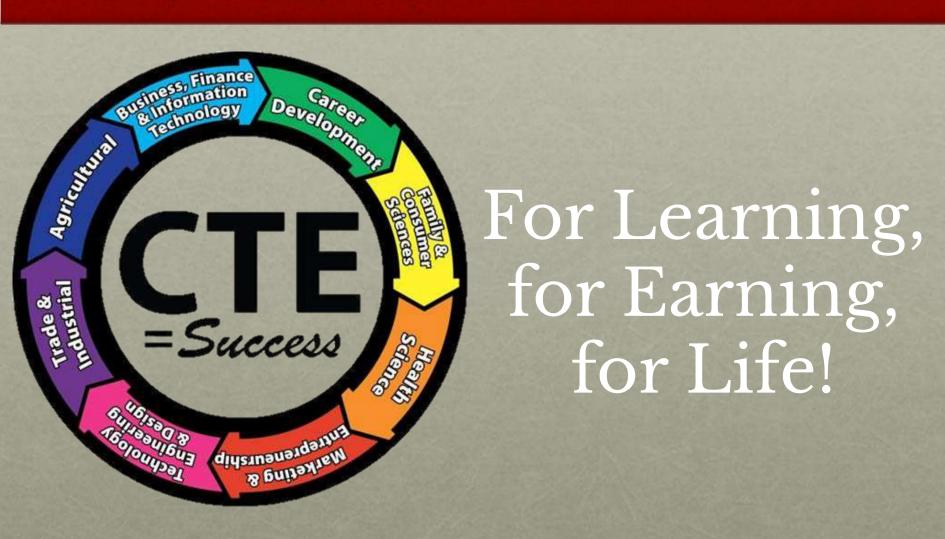
Benefits of Taking CCP

- •Readiness skills for success at the next educational level
- •Earn dual credits
 - •high school (5.0 on a 4.0 scale)
- •Earn college credits that will transfer seamlessly to any of the 16 universities within the UNC system
- •Reduced cost for a two or four year degree; students save up to \$400 per college course in which they receive credit and/or placement, depending on which college they choose to attend at the end of their high school career.

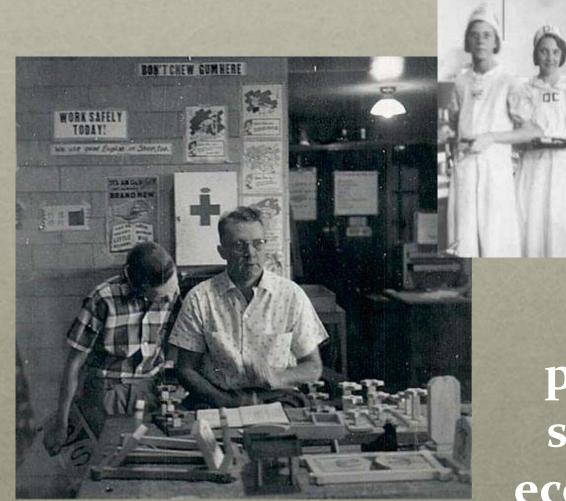
CCP Eligibility

- Must be a Junior or Senior
- Must have an unweighted GPA of 2.8 on high school courses for the College Transfer (CT) pathway or, if a Career and Technical Education (CTE) student, have a unweighted GPA of 2.8 or the recommendation of the high school principal or her designee.
- Meets all existing COA admissions criteria and all course prerequisites.
- Maintains a 2.0 GPA in college coursework after completing two courses.

CTE Works for High School Students

- North Carolina CTE students graduate at a much higher rate than the statewide rate (90% compared to 74.2%)
- 95% of CTE students completed high school on time
- More than 90% secondary CTE students were employed, in the military, or in postsecondary education or advanced training 6 months after graduation

- Combines academic, technical, and "soft"/21st Century skills and learning
- Taught in classes that combine relevance and rigor
- Prepares learners for college and careers

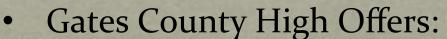

- 1) A student involved in the arts is four times more likely to be recognized for academic achievement.
- 2) Students with high arts participation and low socioeconomic status have a 4 percent dropout rate—five times lower than their low socioeconomic status peers.
- 3) Students who take four years of arts and music classes average almost 100 points higher on their SAT scores than students who take only one-half year or less.
