8th Grade Language Arts Syllabus

Rationale: The goals for this course are to improve oral communication skills, to improve written communication skills, to develop techniques of a successful reader, to grow in the ability to translate text into real-life occurrences, to gain the ability to read critically, and to develop vocabulary skills.

Course Description: Four divisions of language are explored within this course: grammar, composition, vocabulary, and text. Grammar study includes parts of speech, parts of sentences, word usage, and mechanics of writing. Composition study includes developing the writing process through writing responses to literature, as well as writing informative (expository) texts, fictional narratives, personal narratives, and opinion (persuasive) pieces. Vocabulary includes correct spelling and sentence usage of commonly used words. Textual study includes basic knowledge of literary devices along with reading, comprehending, and analyzing literary and informational text.

Objectives: The learner will

- identify and use different parts of speech correctly.
- form a sentence correctly, punctuate appropriately, and use proper subject-verb agreement.
- write and edit an informative piece, fictional narrative, personal narrative, and opinion piece correctly.
- spell commonly used words correctly.
- successfully apply vocabulary skills.
- successfully apply thinking and listening skills.
- successfully identify literary devices within texts.
- successfully interpret and analyze texts.

Behavior Policy: The classroom should be a learning environment, and behavior which disrupts the learning process is not acceptable. Possible consequences for disruptive behavior may include detention, notification of parents, conferencing with principal, or other appropriate action. Students should read and be familiar with the Stanberry R-II handbook, which sets forth many guidelines for behavior.

Grading: Quarterly grading will be weighted as follows: Tests - 60%; Homework/Classwork - 40%

Other assessment issues include:

- Written assignments are due at the beginning of the hour on the date requested. Homework turned in within 24 hours of being due will receive 75% credit. Homework that is turned in after 24 hours of being due will receive 50% credit.
- Assignments given before a student's absence and due on the day of the absence, are to be immediately submitted when the student returns to school.
- Students are allowed 2 days to make up work for each day missed, should an assignment be given during their absence.
- Students will not be given credit for assignments on which they cheat or help others cheat. Cheating includes plagiarism.
- One AR test is required each quarter. Test must be taken in Mrs. Kelley's presence.

Classroom Rules:

- No candy or food in the classroom unless you have permission from Mrs. Kelley and have brought enough for everyone.
- You may bring a drink to class as long as it is in a container with a lid. Remember, if you make a mess, you clean it up.
- You will NOT be leaving the room during regular class time. The only exceptions to this rule are to see the nurse or go to the office. This rule is for your own good, my friend!
- The classroom door will remain locked at all times. KNOCK if you need to enter. Do not jiggle the door knob.
- You must be in your seat when the bell rings to end class.
- When a student knows in advance that he or she is going to be late or absent, whether for an appointment or a field trip, it is THE STUDENT'S responsibility to let the teacher know and THE STUDENT'S responsibility to get the assignment BEFORE the event. If an assignment is due on the day of a prearranged absence, it should be turned in BEFORE leaving school. (This courtesy helps both the student and the teacher.)

Tardy Policy

A student arriving late to class disrupts the educational process. Any student who comes to class within fifteen minutes of the starting bell for any class period will be considered tardy for that hour. A tardy report will be run every month. If any student has accrued three tardies or more during that month, they are subject to a 30 minute detention. The detention will be served at a time and date determined by the teacher. 1st- 2nd- Warning, 3rd-5th- 30 Minute Detention, 6+- 1 Hour Detention
