#### Advisor

Students meet in Advisory four times per week with their Advisory teacher

Advisory topics include: selfexploration, goal setting, academic and post-high planning, and community building

Advisors will share general information and updates about the Caldera Wolfpack community

#### Counselor

Counselors deliver curriculum to 9th and 10th grade students and parents in regards to: academic planning, college/career exploration and social/emotional development.

Counselors meet individually with every 10th grade student (parents invited!) to discuss/update high school graduation plans and post-high school goals.

Counselors are a source of support for academic, college, career and social/emotional needs and can be easily accessed by students throughout the school day in the counseling office

Each CHS student is assigned an advisor that they will have during their time at Caldera. Every advisor is paired with a counselor that will support those advisory students with academic, social/emotional and college/career development throughout high school.

### **Basic Academic Information**

- Semester courses earn .5 credits each
- Advisory earns .25 credits per semester
- Students at Caldera can earn up to 7.5 credits per year
  - 7 classes per semester (7.0 credits)
  - Yearlong Advisory (.5 credits)

### Honors Diploma Capstone Requirements

- What is a capstone?
  - Advanced Placement (AP) Level Courses
  - Highest Level Course in an Elective/CTE Pathway
- Capstone Classes are generally taken during 11th and 12th Grade
  - Most students decide on honors diploma at the end of their 10th grade year
- 5.0 credits of the 27.0 credits must be earned with a CAPSTONE class
  - 3 of which need to be an AP course







#### SUMMER

- · If planning to participate in team sports, attend summer camp
- · Attend "The Pack is Back" day
- · Rest, relax, and have fun

#### FALL

- · Get acclimated to Caldera
  - · Familiarize yourself with our campus and bell schedule
  - Meet your Counselor and Advisor
  - · Set up and learn how to utilize Student/ParentVUE and CANVAS
  - · Get connected with Caldera High School social media
- Give your best effort in all your classes (all semester grades will be posted on your Caldera transcript; freshman year grades matter for sophomore year course placement and 4-year college admissions
- Get into the habit of utilizing supports and talk to teachers whenever you have questions about class material.
- . In October: Counselor will present in your Science classes
- · Track your grade and progress on Student/ParentVUE and CANVAS
- · See your counselor with any questions/issues
- Get involved with extra-curricular activities (find meaningful activities that you will enjoy for the long term)
- · Evaluate fall semester grade-determine goals for spring semester

#### SPRING

- Spring semester is a fresh start! Now that you have one semester under your belt, continue what
  is working, tweak what isn't and work towards your goals
- · Continue with meaningful extra-curricular activities
- Continue to see teachers with any questions you have about class material that you don't understand
- See your counselor with any questions/issues
- Forecasting Days in April: you will be able to select the classes you want to take the next school
  year based on your interests (elective classes) and graduation/college requirements (see
  counselor with questions)
- If applicable, sign up for summer school to remediate courses for graduation or 4-year college eligibility (see counselor with questions)
- Evaluate spring semester grades and freshman year as whole and determine goals for sophornore year

- Volunteer Student must complete 65 hours of volunteer work. Proof of hours, goal setting and reflection due.
- Internship Students must complete 65 hours of an internship. Completed through Youth
   Career Connect. Larry visits every Monday from 2:30-3:30.
- Job and Volunteer Assistance with finding a job or place to volunteer, and exploring career options.
