- Regents and Final exams

Diploma Types & Requirements

- Diploma Types:
 - ▶ Regents Diploma with Advanced Designation
 - ► Regents Diploma
 - ► Local Diploma (still available in special situations)
- <u>Requirements Credits & Examinations</u>
 - 22 credits (minimum) specific subject areas
 - Exams ELA, Math, Science, Social Studies (1) plus one
 - Exams Advanced Designation, variety of options

Regents Exams

- ► NYS Required Exams
- Annual, based on individual student schedules
- ▶ June 2020 exemptions in Algebra & L.E.
- ► June 2021- courses ending in an exam
- August 2021- for students who fail or wish to receive a higher grade

GPA Calculation

- Calculation is based on all grades with the exception of physical education
- All Honors and Advanced Placement courses are weighted by a factor of 1.1
- ▶ GPAs are rounded to the hundredth (ex: 3.68)
- Accelerated courses are NOT weighted.
- ► GPA vs. weighted GPA

SAT and ACT Exams

- Standardized entrance exams used by colleges for admission purposes
- All colleges accept either SAT or ACT exam
- Some colleges are test optional <u>www.fairtest.org</u>
- SAT/ACT results are only part of the application package and often not the most important
- SAT <u>www.collegeboard.org</u>
- SAT special testing accommodations (844) 255-7728
- ACT www.actstudent.org
- ACT special testing accommodations (319) 337-1332

SAT Subject Tests

- Required by only some colleges and often depends on major
 Those that require, usually ask for 2-3
- Best taken in May or June of the year you take the subject
 Always consult with your teacher to ensure proper preparation
- Ideal score: 700 is the general benchmark, but may vary depending on exam taken and/or college applied

Developing a Testing Schedule

Most Students

- May or June 9th Grade: SAT Subject Test (optional, uncommon for 9th Grade student spe to counselor before registering)
- ▶ Fall 10th Grade: PSAT (optional)
- May or June 10th/11th Grade: SAT Subject Test (optional, also available on other dates)
- Fall 11th Grade: PSAT (required for National Merit consideration)
- Winter Summer 11th Grade: Take 1 SAT, 1 ACT, and either SAT/ACT a second time (3 total)
- Sept. and/or Oct. 12th Grade: Retake SAT or ACT (which ever exam is best for you)
- Oct. and/or Nov. 12th Grade: Last chance for SAT Subject Tests (may not get results for EA, ED, ED II Deadlines - check with colleges)
- NCAA Recruited Athletes
- Recruited athletes may want to begin this process a full year early (speak to the college coach to understand their expectations)

NCAA Information

- ► Core Course GPA helps you track your NCAA GPA
- ► Grades and SAT/ACT scores matter!
- Understand the recruiting process for your sport
- ▶ Talk to your coaches and counselor!
- ▶ Register with the NCAA at the conclusion of 11th Grade
