Get ready for Veterans Day.

Thank our **veterans!** They are people who have served in the **armed forces**. The armed forces keep our country safe. They serve in times of war and peace. Five main groups make up the armed forces. They are the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps (pronounced "Kohr"), and Coast Guard.

Featured Text Structure: Descriptive – the writer explains, defines, or illustrates a concept or topic

Passage Summary: "A Day for Veterans" describes who veterans are and what they do. It discusses the different types of veterans and how we celebrate and honor them.

To the Teacher: Read the passage aloud to the class [TIP: while reading aloud, show the passage on a whiteboard or give each student a copy of the passage so they can follow along].

Then, use the text-dependent questions 1-8 to facilitate a whole class discussion to ensure students comprehend the key details from the passage.

Finally, use questions 9-10 to deep teach one important vocabulary word [TIP: you can use the model provided for teaching additional vocabulary].

1. What are the five main groups that make up the armed forces? [Important Detail]

Suggested answer: The five main groups that make up the armed forces are the Army, Navy, Air Force, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard. [paragraph 1]

2. According to the passage, what is a veteran? [Important Detail]

Suggested answer: A veteran is someone who has served in the military. A veteran's job is to keep our country safe. [paragraph 1]

3. The passage states that "many kids have parents or other loved ones who are veterans." Why might having a parent who has served in the military be hard for a kid? [Inferential]

Suggested answer: Having a mother, father, or loved one who is or has served in the military may be hard at times because they may have to leave the country to fight in a war. However, it might also be an honor to look up to a loved one and to be proud that they helped to defend our country.

4. What is the main idea of this passage? [Main Idea]

Suggested answer: The passage primarily describes who veterans are and how people in the United States celebrate and honor veterans on Veterans Day.

To the Teacher: ReadWorks recommends that you teach this vocabulary word to the whole class out loud using the four steps listed below.

Vocabulary Word: **hero** (he · ro): someone who has done something brave or good.

Step 1: Introduce the word

- a. Teacher writes the word on the board and divides it into syllables: (he \cdot ro)
- b. Teacher says: "This word is hero. What is the word?" [All students reply together out loud: "Hero."]

Step 2: Provide a child-friendly definition

- a. Teacher says: "A hero is someone who has done something brave or good."
- b. Teacher says: "In the passage, veterans are people who protect our country. Serving in the armed forces takes bravery, therefore, a veteran is often considered a hero."

c. Teacher says: "What is the word?" [All students reply together out loud: "Hero."]

Step 3: Practice the word

Teacher provides examples and additional opportunities to repeat the word. Read the first sentence out loud to your students. Begin reading it again and when you come to the vocabulary word prompt students to say the vocabulary word out loud. Then, finish reading the sentence out loud to your students.
