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
SPOTLIGHT ON: 7th Grade Language Arts

In the high honors ELA program, 7th grade students in Ms. Pohlig's class are being exposed to classic literature, including "The Hobbit" by J.R.R.Tolkien (a text typically found in tenth grade English classes), and are conducting in-depth character analyses of such texts. Their daily assignments include reading 20-30 minutes, creating vocabulary lists for themselves from the text, and developing creative writing strategies so as to create their own adventure stories. In addition, students are daily exposed to the analysis of nonfictional texts and challenging questions through the use of CommonLit.org.

Most excitingly, however, are the hour and a half-long Socratic Seminars in which students sit in a circle and debate various facets of a text, challenging each other to look more deeply at the symbolism and the way authors convey messages through their written works. Students come prepared with about twenty open-ended discussion questions and facilitate the conversation themselves, carefully learning how to listen and engage in an academic conversation without raising hands or interrupting each other. It's an exciting time to be in high honors!

8th Grade Math

AIG students in Math II this past quarter have enjoyed learning about Trigonometry and Triangle Congruence and Similarity. SOHCAHTOA now has a new meaning, not as a strange sounding word, but as a hint to the relationships in a right triangle. Knowing the sine, cosine and tangent of angles has allowed students to analyze house blueprints, conclude angles of elevation and depression to solve problems, and determine the length that sides of a right triangle would need to be, given a specific angle.

The concept of a two column proof and a paragraph proof have stretched students' minds greatly! Perhaps they will NEVER have to complete one of these exact questions outside of a math classroom, but the reasoning skills gained from these problems are essential in all jobs in the future. To go from a given amount of information or resources, and conclude with a goal, with no steps in between provided, is a challenge for all of us. These students have successfully maneuvered from a Given to a To Prove with amazing strategy, analysis and precision.

6th Grade Language Arts

Several 6th grade ELA scholars are reading the second book in the series of *The Wednesday Wars* titled *Okay for Now* by Gary D. Schmidt. Our classes have accepted Mr. Blair's challenge of testing online 100% by the end of the school year. Scholars wrote 30 minute research papers on Shakespearean plays: The Tempest, MacBeth, Romeo and Juliet and Hamlet. Scholars analysis of traditional stories reveals diverse cultural values.
