The Troy School District has been extremely busy orchestrating Series 1 of the bond, totaling an investment of \$190 million. These projects encompass a range of improvements, from athletic upgrades to playground enhancements, reflecting our commitment to providing worldclass facilities for our students. Athletic Upgrades at Troy and Athens High Schools: If you have visited Troy High, you may have seen some of the improvements already underway. Troy stadium has a new cutting-edge synthetic turf field, and the gymnasium boasts a new floor and bleachers. Synthetic and natural turf fields, new and updated outdoor restroom facilities, and a new concession stand are also part of the upcoming plans. Athens will also receive a new synthetic turf field and new tennis courts this summer. Innovative Furniture: Recognizing the importance

of adaptable and modern learning spaces, we have introduced furniture pilots at all elementary schools. Once feedback and recommendations have been collected, Baker Middle School, IA East, and Costello, Hamilton, Schroeder, Leonard, Wass, and Wattles Elementary Schools will obtain new furniture this summer. The remaining elementary schools will adopt new furniture in the summer of 2025. Elementary Playgrounds Redesign: Ensuring that our youngest learners have safe and stimulating play areas is a priority for TSD. We are in the process of redesigning elementary playgrounds, beginning with Barnard, Bemis, Hill, Morse, Troy Union, and Martell Elementary Schools in the summer of 2024. The remainder of the elementary school playgrounds will be completed in the summer of 2025. Smith Middle School Construction: The centerpiece of Series 1, Smith Middle School, is scheduled for groundbreaking in the spring of 2024. This endeavor is part of our commitment to providing a conducive and modern learning environment for our middle school students. Athens High School Design Phase: Looking ahead, the design phase for Athens High School is slated to begin in January 2024. While the building won't commence until 2027, this project reflects our forward-thinking approach to education, ensuring that our facilities align with the evolving needs of our students. As we embark on this exciting chapter, we thank you for your continued support and partnership in creating an educational environment that empowers our students for success.

The Board of Education trustees had the opportunity to engage with students K-12, districtwide to witness some of our newest curricula and most innovative teaching techniques in action. We continue to be impressed with our learning community—our administration's vision, Teaching and Learning staff's commitment to deepening the learning of our students, principals' ability to build strong learning communities, and our teachers' enthusiasm for constant refinement of their craft. These elements contribute to the remarkable intelligence, insight, and joy we witness in our students. Our entire organization is working diligently to provide children with a world-class education, and that makes our role as a governing body extremely rewarding. Previously, the Board shared its actions around the process of defining a district-specific "Portrait of a Graduate," an endeavor to translate the strategic plan into observable traits in students. The board embarked on interviews with students, parents, and community members to understand the type of education they valued most. The input culminated in a report, providing common language and an organized framework for Board trustees that can be used when evaluating curriculum, observing teaching techniques, and assessing student work. The Board identified 12 traits expected in Troy students if the strategic plan is executed effectively. Since discussing our report, our Teaching and Learning team has carefully integrated these 12 traits into our districtwide deep learning standards commonly referred to as the "6 Cs of 21st Century Learning": Character, Citizenship, Collaboration, Communication, Creativity, and Critical Thinking. Aligning these traits with the district's day-to-day actions in the classroom ensures coherence between overarching goals and daily practices. The Board's identified traits have been aptly renamed the "Portrait of a Learner" by the Teaching and Learning team, to emphasize the ongoing effort required at every grade level. It is not a state achieved solely at

graduation but an evolving process throughout a student's academic journey. Thank you again to all the students, parents, and community members who shared their input toward this effort —our kids are already benefiting from your efforts!

Article 7 / Page 3: Troy School District National Merit Scholar Semifinalists

Sixty Troy School District students from three of our High Schools (Athens, International Academy East and Troy High) were named National Merit Scholar Semifinalists by the National Merit Scholarship Corporation and TSD recognized them at a reception on November 16. This honor is bestowed on less than one percent of students nationwide based on their scores on the Preliminary SAT. Over 1.5 million juniors in about 21,000 high schools take the PSAT every year, and only 16,000 students across the country have been designated Semifinalists for 2024. From the approximately 16,000 semifinalists, about 15,000 (nearly all) are expected to advance to the Finalist level where these academically talented high school seniors have an opportunity to continue in the competition for some 7,500 National Merit Scholarships worth nearly \$30 million that will be offered next spring. To be considered for a Merit Scholarship award, Semifinalists must fulfill several requirements to advance to the Finalist level of the competition. About 95 percent of the Semifinalists are expected to attain Finalist standing, and approximately half of the Finalists will win a National Merit Scholarship, earning the Merit Scholar title which will be announced in the Spring.

Sharon MacDonnel shared congratulations as students demonstrated the latest manufacturing technology including computeraided design, robotics, and 3D Printing. Manufacturing jobs are the lifeblood of Michigan's economy. Unfortunately, the United States is projected to have 2.5 million unfilled manufacturing jobs by 2030. SME PRIME® provides a non-traditional pathway to lucrative careers in the automotive industry by connecting students with manufacturers and suppliers for high-paying high-tech jobs. According to Troy High Automotive Technology Lab teacher Adam Warner: "Students can now earn ASE certification and Michigan Mechanic credentials upon graduation—and they do not have to leave their own high school to do it."
