Prevention is about the healthy & safe development of children, adolescents and adults

 To avoid or delay the initiation of the use of drugs, or, if started, to avoid progression to drug use disorders such as the dependence.

### • The broader aim is to address drug use by:

- helping the healthy and safe development of children and youth to realize their talents and potential becoming contributing members of their community and society.
- Effective drug prevention contributes significantly to the positive engagement of children, youth and adults with their families, schools, workplace and community.





Substance Abuse Prevention



The Center for Substance Abuse Prevention (CSAP)

• Provides national leadership in the development of policies, programs, and services to prevent the onset of illegal drug use, prescription drug misuse and abuse, alcohol misuse and abuse, and underage alcohol and tobacco use

• Promotes effective substance abuse prevention practices that enable states, communities, and other organizations to apply prevention knowledge effectively

## CSAP Best Practices

## **Approach is based on 5 premises:**

- The earlier prevention starts the more likely it is to succeed.
- Prevention programs should be knowledge based.
- Prevention programs should be comprehensive.
- Programs should include process as well as outcome evaluations.
- Programs should be initiated and conducted by communities and schools themselves



The Goals of Substance Abuse Prevention

### • Create supportive workplaces, schools, and communities

- Produce drug-free and crime-free neighborhoods
- Expand positive connections with friends and family





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What do we mean by *"Evidence-Based?"*  "Evidence Based Practice (EBP) is the use of systematic decision-making processes or provision of services which have been shown, through available scientific evidence, to consistently improve measurable client outcomes. Instead of tradition, gut reaction or single observations as the basis of decision making, EBP relies on data collected through experimental research and accounts for individual client characteristics and clinician expertise."

Evidence-Based Approaches Equals Effective Prevention Approaches to prevention or treatment that are based in theory and have undergone scientific evaluation have been proven most effective. "Evidence-based" stands in contrast to approaches that are based on tradition, convention, belief, or anecdotal evidence."




Effective Substance Abuse Prevention

- "...programs that support the whole person are key to substance abuse prevention. In the world of prevention, we end up addressing the "Drug of the Month"... we have this revolving substance issue and we fail to get to some of the underlying causes."
- "...move past the symptoms and substances...and into the true substance of what is it that makes young people... live happier, healthier lives."
- "...some of the most effective prevention programs never mention alcohol or drugs ...but look to build ... assets that provide a buffer against risk factors."






The Process of Choosing Best Practices

Why Implement Evidence Based Prevention Programs in Schools?

- Today, many foundations, government agencies, and state legislatures encourage or require the use of evidence-based programs in service delivery plans.
- Designed to bring about specific outcomes, for specific purposes or populations.
- Example: program designed and based on scientific principles designed to prevent drug abuse by children
- Scientifically proven effective outcomes for positive change
- Fit into the NJ Core Curriculum Standards
- Builds Character Education
- Develops Life Skills



More reasons to implement evidencebased programs in schools.....

- They need to know you care & give students a reason to care.
- Peer to Peer is effective.
- Classroom teacher is more effective than one-time presenter (consistent messaging)
- Do NOT show methods of drug use or specific products or paraphernalia.
- Address short & long-term consequences
- Girls are more likely to take risk info seriously, and boys are less likely.
- Scare Tactics DON'T work!



## Do's & Don'ts

- Be more than facts (because they probably already know more than you).
- Engaging lessons (leave your speech for another time)
- Assemblies don't work unless they are followed up by reinforcing messages or work to address what was learned.
- Share the NORM e.g. 80% of students have not misused prescription drugs.
- Reflection and commitment are great ways to put a drug free plan into action.



Effective and Ineffective –How do I know the difference?

#### **DOs:** Effective Prevention Program Methods

- Do rely on solid research design
- Do rely on a balance of individual, family, school and community level interventions
- Do appropriately match and consider target audiences (universal, selective, and indicated)
- Do provide cognitive behavioral skill sets
- Do provide a safe environment and a sense of connection to school
- Do provide multiple sessions (typically 6-10)
- Do provide interaction and time to practice learned skill sets
- Do include environmental approaches and address marketing tactics
- Do target multiple strategies at the same time(behavioral health, bullying, violence, substance use)
- Do provide a facilitator who is aware of the human element and is culturally sensitive
- Do reduce overall healthcare costs

#### **DON'Ts:** Ineffective or Harmful Program Methods

- Don't show methods of drug use or specific products or paraphernalia (stimulate or traumatize viewer)
- Don't use scare tactics (proven counterproductive)
- Don't promote people in recovery (<u>not</u> effective deterrent; May normalize the behavior)
- Don't provide one session/Assemblies (follow-up, reinforcing messages or processing transfer of information is needed)
- Don't provide information only. Info can include facts about drug laws and policies, and drugs and their effects. Although drug information is important, it <u>has not been</u> <u>found</u> to be an effective intervention by itself; that is, without additional prevention components.
- Don't only include pre and post tests
- Don't only explain what not to do with no other directions, options or choices on how to make healthier choices

The Environmental Approach: Effective **School Policies** and Practices Needed

- A Comprehensive Multi-Strategy Approach
- Advocate that every school have a qualified Student Assistance Counselor (SAC)
- Trauma Prepared Schools- School staff trained and school policies in place to support children who have experienced trauma
- Understanding that the integration of Life Skills development K – 12 is the best prevention for all substance abuse issues including opiates
- Implementation of Screening, Brief Intervention, and Referral to Treatment (SBIRT) – Universal screening for every 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grader


- In partnership with ASAP-NJ and Legal One

## 2017 Survey Response


Does your school implement Evidence-Based Drug and Alcohol Prevention Programs?





## 2017 Survey Response


In what grades are the Evidence-Based Drug and Alcohol Programs currently being implemented?
