

## **AECR: Breaking It Down**

**Here are some questions you can ask yourself to help you generate an assertion, locate text evidence, evaluate the strength of your evidence, and provide insightful commentary about your evidence.**

### **Tips for Composing an Assertion (A)**

- Deconstruct the prompt.
- Use/reword the prompt to structure your answer.
- Reread portions of the text to identify relevant information (which may be used later as text evidence).
- Make a reasonable inference based on relevant text evidence.
- Include a general explanation/rationale (if applicable).
- Check to be sure you have addressed all parts of the question.

### **Locating Text Evidence (E)**

- How do I know my assertion is true?
- What in the text helps me to prove my inference (assertion)?

### **Evaluating Text Evidence (E)**

- Does this information help me to make my point?
- Does this evidence explain how/why my assertion is true?
- Is this evidence simply a fact, or does it actually prove my assertion is true?
- Does this evidence *fully* support my assertion, or is it only somewhat related?
- Is this entire quote relevant to my assertion?
- Would another piece of evidence more clearly support my assertion?
- Does this evidence provide an example to illustrate my point?

### **Generating Commentary about Evidence (C)**

- *How* does this evidence prove my assertion?
- How is this idea related to my assertion/thesis? What connections exist between them?
- Why is this evidence interesting? Why should anyone care?
- What does this information suggest?
- Why is this information important? Why does it matter?
- What are the consequences of thinking this way or looking at a problem this way?
- I've just described what something is like or how I see it, but *why* is it like that?
- I've just said that something happens, but *how* does it happen? How does it come to be the way it is?
