Photo Alphabet- Summative Description


- Students will take 26 photos or make 26 drawings/arrangements resembling or referencing all of the letters of the alphabet
- Students may reference a letter by photographing things that relate to it without actually depicting it, BUT they must stay conceptually consistent, either reference or resemble the letter, don't mix the two try to create a similar "font" unity.
- Students may photograph anything that resembles a letter, or can be cropped to form a letter, there are no repeats allowed, and no photographs of actual existing letters will be allowed, students may create their letters out of drawings of objects.
- Students must then take all 26 photos and edit and stitch them together in google slides
 or try photoshop if possible. (create one image of the whole alphabet and then put letters
 together to make your name and then a name of a loved one)
 one document/slide per a word.
- The objective of this lesson is to observe, map, collect, and create successful photos/representations of objects resembling the letters of the alphabet.

Photo Alphabet- MAKE SURE

- 1. The Letter should fill the frame, avoid cropping.
- 2. Vertical or Horizontal Keep the photo composition the same orientation (vertical or horizontal).




- 3. Pay attention to Backgrounds- keep it simple and uncluttered. avoid confusion.
- 4. Stay focused: if possible try different lens, apertures and depth of fields.
- 5. Lighting is alway important! Create and adjust your lighting situation as needed.
- 6. Create one document/slide with your whole alphabet and then create one with your name



Notice they're a mix of found objects, printed letters, and arranged objects. Not thematically or conceptually consistent.


