





3 Main Steps to APPLY to college:



3 Steps to the College Application Process

1. Student <u>completes application</u> online and <u>submits</u> the application. Many have an application fee. Contact your counselor if you qualify for free/reduced lunch, or have other financial circumstances and need help covering the application fee.

2. Student creates an account at <u>www.parchment.com</u> and requests a <u>transcript</u> to be sent to the colleges applying to. The transcript will include the student's senior year schedule. These will not be sent to the college until after school starts.

3. Student's should **send ACT and/or SAT** scores to the colleges directly from the testing agency. You can send your SAT score to 4 colleges for free when you register for the test. If you wait to send your score, it can take several weeks for the college to receive the score and it costs money. Check to see if your college is **test optional**.

Test Optional Policies

You can **<u>check college websites</u>** to see if a college requires the ACT or SAT.

Please note: **Colleges may still require a test score to consider you for a <u>merit</u> <u>scholarship or other scholarships</u>. Please check with the college directly.**

Future test dates:

SAT -- <u>https://collegereadiness.collegeboard.org/sat/register/dates-</u> <u>deadlines</u>

August 26th is the next date you can register for. Register by July 28th.

ACT -- <u>https://www.act.org/content/act/en/products-and-services/the-act/registration.html</u>

July 15th is the next test date you can register for. Register by June 16th.

When to Start the Application

- Most applications are updated and available starting August 1, but double check with your college on their website.
- Look at the college's admissions page or call them with any questions.
- The 'Common Application' updates August 1. Please do not apply before then. Only a small number of you will need to apply using the 'Common Application.' In most cases, don't use it if there's another option. This application is very long.

• Although it's good to START your applications, you **do not** need to rush to SUBMIT your applications in August. This is because your application will not be "complete" until your transcript is sent - which cannot happen until September. Also, you may want to make changes to your application after talking with counselors/friends at school when senior year starts. Additionally, many colleges, like MSU, do not start reviewing applications until early September.

Common Application

New application is available starting August 1. Use this if the college you are applying to requires it. There is usually more than one option of application type.

You will need to invite your teachers and counselor to your Common Application. This should be one of the first things you do. From the My Colleges tab select a college and open their "Recommenders and FERPA" section.

- 1. If you have not done so already, you will need to complete the <u>FERPA Release Authorization</u>.
- 2. Invite recommenders using the invite button from each section. You may also use the "Invite Recommenders" button at the top.
- 3. Select the type of invitation you would like to send. For each invitation you will need information like their name and email address.
- 4. After you add a recommender, you can view their info using the Manage Recommenders button.
- 5. Note that teachers, parents, and other recommenders will not receive an email invitation until you assign them to a college. To assign these recommenders, go to their section within this screen. Select their name from the dropdown and use the assign button.

So ... What can I do this spring and summer?

- Explore and review your potential career path. Review the training/programs/schooling/requirements to get there.
- Round out your potential college list and visit campuses.
- Look for scholarships.
- Create a resume.
- If you need a letter of recommendation, ask your teacher now! Follow up in the fall.
- Start working on any available essay prompts (if your school requires one).
- Start your application once the new application is released in August.

- Provide a stamped envelope if necessary. But, most letters are uploaded directly to the application site.
- Follow up with a thank you!
- When you get accepted, let the teacher know:)
- Ask them now!

- Find your admissions counselor and feel free to email them with any questions you have about your perspective college.
- Sign up for mailing lists and receive information via email and snail mail.
- Follow perspective colleges on SnapChat, Instagram, Twitter, Facebook, and YouTube to see what it's like to be a student firsthand. You can also read their blogs.
- Catch live webcasts to hear from current students, faculty, and staff from a variety of majors and programs.
- Check out a Virtual Tour.

Virtual College Visits

College visits are both an important and exciting part of the college selection process. If you're going to move away to college, be sure to investigate your new home where you'll be investing your money.

Get answers to your questions!

- Does the college have the program you want to study?
- What type of job could you get with this program/degree?
- Does it feel like it could be your home?
- Will you have enough to do outside of class?
- Is it the right mix of support and challenge?
- Living conditions, food, facilities, etc.
- What internship or study abroad options do they have?
