

Advanced Placement European History

Course Description:

The AP European History course is an engaging and rigorous curriculum designed to increase students' understanding of the main themes in modern European history while helping each student succeed on the AP® European History Exam. What sets this course apart from an "honors" course is extensive reading of college level texts, combined with a heavy emphasis upon analytical skills that include forming and substantiating various historical hypotheses. Emphasis is placed on students developing intellectual and academic skills including (1) effective analysis of primary and secondary sources such as documents, maps, statistics, and pictorial and graphic evidence; (2) effective note taking; (3) clear and precise written expression; and (4) the ability to weigh evidence and reach conclusions on the basis of facts.

The curriculum is divided into four periods:

Period 1: c. 1450 to c. 1648; Period 2: c. 1648 to c. 1815; Period 3: c. 1815 to c. 1914; Period 4: c. 1914 to the present.

Within each period five Major Themes are explored:

• Interaction of Europe and the World (INT)

Poverty and Prosperity (PP)

• Objective Knowledge and Subjective Visions (OS)

• States and Other Institutions of Power (SP)

• Individual and Society (IS)

In addition, the following Historical Thinking Skills are emphasized throughout the course: I. Chronological Reasoning II. Comparison and Contextualization

III. Crafting Historical Arguments from Historical Evidence

IV. Historical Interpretation and Synthesis

In summary, the two primary overriding purposes of the course are:

- 1) to provide students with the opportunity to experience an introductory college European History class
- 2) to prepare students to successfully complete the AP Exam.
