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COURSE OVERVIEW

AP Human Geography is a year-long course that focuses on the distribution, processes, and effects of human populations on the planet. AP Human Geography is a rigorous, interactive course that teaches students how to think geographically. Students will develop excellent thinking and problem solving skills and gain a new perspective on the world in which we live.

COURSE GOALS

Upon successful completion of the course, students will be able to:

- Use and think about maps and spatial data.
- Recognize and interpret patterns of spatial organization and material character of Earth's surface.
- Assess the nature and significance of the relationships among phenomena that occur in the same place.
- Understand how events and processes at different scales influence one another.
- Define regions and evaluate the regionalization process.
- Characterize and analyze changing interconnections among places.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS/PROCEDURES FOR SUCCESS

Participation/Attendance- Constructive and respectful participation is REQUIRED. All discussions/activities will be graded. Please do not pack up your stuff before we have finished for the day. Please do not wait by the door at the end of the class period.

School Tardy Policy: 4 tardies= referral, and later than 10 min late to class in an unexcused absence.

Homework- Students will be assigned homework on a weekly basis to supplement lesson content, and students will be responsible to complete homework **on time**. There will be a 10% deduction for all LATE HOMEWORK, and late work will not be accepted after the unit in which they were assigned.

Geography Quizzes- There may be weekly map quizzes testing basic geographic knowledge, such as major oceans, major cities, countries, and continents.

Unit Exams- Each unit exam will be crafted to reflect the AP Exam. It will consist of two sections- A multiple choice section and a Free Response Question (FRQ) essay response.

AP Exam- The AP Exam will be on Friday (May 15, 2015). The exam will consist of 75 multiple choice questions and three Free Response Questions essays. There will be plenty of review sessions throughout the course prior to the exam.

CLASS EXPECTATIONS
