On March 6th the 6th graders were able to perform two Reader's Theaters. We were even lucky enough to have some parents in the audience!



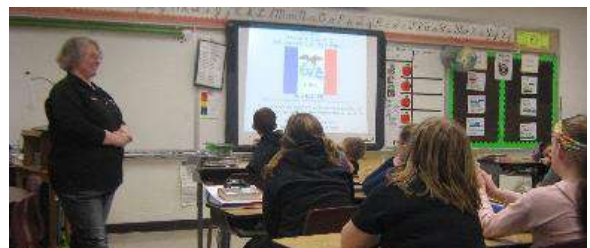

From Superintendent Rob Busch

Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP)



Dear Families,
Students in the Ed-Co School District, as well as students in other districts across the

state have been assessed on an annual basis with the Iowa Assessments to measure student progress and to gather data necessary to inform our school improvement efforts. This spring, students in grades 3-11 will be taking the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). The ISASP replaces the previously administered Iowa Assessments. All 3-11 grade students will be assessed in reading, language and writing, and math. Additionally, 5, 8 and 10 grade students will also be assessed in science. The ISASP will also be administered online. Taking the new statewide assessment online will be a new experience for our students. However, online testing is not new to our students. As early as 2nd grade our students begin taking online assessments in Math and Reading through the Measurement of Academic Progress (MAP) tests.

Last spring, the Iowa legislature determined that all students in Iowa would be assessed using the new test called the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP). The new assessment is developed and delivered by Iowa-based Pearson Education, Inc. The assessment is aligned with the Iowa Core standards and is intended to provide a clear and accurate assessment of student learning outcomes.

Student growth, proficiency and readiness indicators will be reported.

The new assessment is required to be administered statewide between March and May 2019 and will be given in an online format. Teachers have begun to orient students to the new testing environment, but we invite you to look at these assessments with your student as additional support in their preparation for the ISASP.

If you choose, there are training tutorials and practice tests that you, as a family, may experience. These tutorials and practice tests help familiarize the education community with the general process of the online test. You can find these resources at:

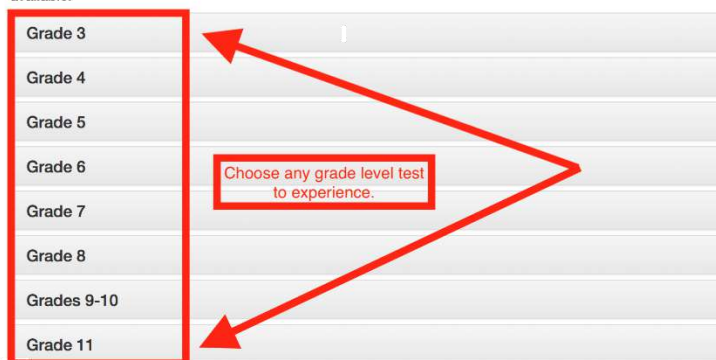
ISASP Reading Practice Tests

As with any new experience there will be mishaps along the way, however, we will strive to create a quality testing experience that maximizes opportunities for students. To help your child do his/her best on the Iowa Statewide Assessment of Student Progress (ISASP) we ask that you:

- Ensure your child arrives at school on time each day of testing
- Ensure your child gets a full night's rest before each test day
- Provide your child a nutritious breakfast each morning of testing
- Ensure 7-11 grade students bring their computers fully charged on testing days
- Encourage your child to give his/her best effort

During this first year of administration, it is anticipated that results may not be available until early fall of 2019.

Use of Recording Device Notice

The Edgewood-Colesburg Community School District Board of Directors has authorized the use of recording devices on school premises and district buses. The recording devices will be used to monitor student behavior to maintain order and to promote and maintain a safe environment. Recordings of students in the classroom will also be used to improve educational practices. Students and parents are hereby notified that the content of the recording may be used in a student disciplinary proceeding. The content of the recording are confidential student records and will be retained with other student records. Recordings will only be retained if necessary for use in a student disciplinary proceeding or other matter as determined necessary by the administration. Parents may request to view the recording of their child if the recordings are used in a disciplinary proceeding involving their child. A parent may view the recordings without consent from any student or parent of a minor student also shown in the recording if the other students are bystanders. But if there is an altercation between multiple students, then all parents must give consent in order for the recordings to be viewed by parents.
