There are approximately 7.3 billion people in the world as of today. Those 7.3 billion people occupy 197 million square miles on earth. The world is a vast and populated place. And yet, somehow, 720 people – 650 students and 70 adults – all ended up at Auburn Middle School at the same time. Whether you believe that is a coincidence or some kind of fate, you have to admit that it's pretty amazing. And, as I remind our students often, when you consider all the space and people in the world, our ending up here together must mean something. It just makes sense that we try to make this place special for one another.

That's just one of the reasons that even as we teach English, Math, Science, History and all the other academic subjects, we strongly emphasize learning to be respectful and kind to one another. In fact, the core values of our school center on treating everyone with civility and respect, actively helping others when necessary and learning to help ourselves when we need it. When students fail to live up to that standard, we take the opportunity to review the situation with them and teach them how to do better next time. Middle school is, after all, very much about learning to be more responsible and sometimes those lessons come via mistakes.

The other major way we emphasize kindness is by putting our students in positions to serve the community. There are very few days in the 180 day school year during which there is no community service project going on at AMS. Among the service activities our students have engaged in this year are:

- A Thanksgiving Food drive that fed multiple local families
- A Holiday Toy drive which, as of today, has collected nearly 100 toys for local children
- Participation in Cradles to Crayons, which annually gathers quality clothing for hundreds of children across the state
- A school program called BRYT in which students receive numerous supports to increase their likelihood of succeeding in school and in life
- Rockets to Rockets, a program in which AMS students engage in fun activities with their classmates who have special needs
- And many more

Truly, AMS is a place where kindness and respect are valued, modeled and practiced. With 650 people between the ages of 11-14, it is rarely perfect, but we really try because if ever there were a time when just teaching academic subjects was enough to prepare students for life, now is not that time. Our kids have been deprived of nearly two years of social skills practice. More than ever, we have to try to make up for lost time. Emphasizing civility, respect, gratitude and generosity is one way we try to do that.

Our vision is to educate and prepare students for the opportunities and challenges of a changing world.


