Area Eligibility in Child Nutrition Programs

USDA funded Child Nutrition Programs use two primary sources of data to determine whether a site is area eligible – school data or census data. Established area eligibility is effective for a period of five consecutive participation years.

Area Eligibility based on School Data:

- ✓ CACFP <u>At-risk Afterschool Meal</u> programs and <u>NSLP Afterschool Snack</u> programs must use school data to determine area eligibility.
- ✓ School data may be used to establish area eligibility for open sites sponsoring the <u>SFSP</u> or <u>SSO</u>.
- ✓ School data must indicate that the proposed meal **site** is located in the attendance area of a public school where at least 50 percent of the children are eligible for school meals at a free or reduced price.
- ✓ OSPI Child Nutrition Services posts a <u>Washington Public School Data for Area Eligibility Report</u> annually, with a March 1 effective date.
- ✓ Schools that draw students from throughout the district may not be used, for example:
 - Alternative high schools or skill centers may not be used to qualify sites as area eligible.
- ✓ Community Eligibility Provision participating schools are included in the <u>Washington Public School Data for Area Eligibility Report</u> (the data for these schools has been adjusted so that no further calculations are needed).

Area Eligibility based on Census Data:

- ✓ Census data may be used to establish area eligibility for open sites sponsoring the SFSP or SSO.
- ✓ Census data must indicate that the proposed meal site is located in a Census Block Group or Census Tract in which at least 50 percent or more of the children are eligible for free or reduced price school meals.
- ✓ The FNS Area Eligibility Mapper identifies if a specific location qualifies as area eligible, using the address of the potential meal site. The mapper is updated annually in October.

SFSP Special Situations:

- ✓ Use of Other Approved Data Sources in SFSP:
 - Other approved sources may demonstrate that 50 percent or more of the children in a defined area are eligible for free or reduced-price school meals.
 - Approved sources: Department of Welfare, Zoning Commissions, USDAs Rural Development Housing Authorities, Housing and Urban Development Housing Authorities, and Local Housing Authorities.
- ✓ SFSP and SSO sites serving children of migrant workers:
 - Area eligibility may be established upon a determination that a meal site predominantly serves the children of migrant workers.
 - Sponsors must submit information obtained from a migrant organization that certifies that the site serves the children of migrant workers.
- ✓ SFSP and SSO sites serving American Indian or Alaska Native Children:
 - Area eligibility may be established for sites that are located in areas in which poor economic conditions exist.
 - Defined as a geographic area where at least 50 percent of the children enrolled at the site are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
 - Sponsors must provide documentation from a Tribal authority that certifies that the proposed site is located on a Tribal reservation, on trust land, or in an Alaska Native village where at least 50 percent of the children enrolled at the site are eligible for free or reduced-price meals.
