

Art Bingo Challenge!

You must complete 4 challenges. Each is worth 50 points. Your pieces must be no smaller than a 9 inch square. For example you can do a 9x9, 8x10, 7x11, 6x12, etc. You may complete as many as you like, if you need extra points, and if you get a bingo I'll have a treat for you upon our return. Every time you finish a square, take a photo of the work, upload it to Synergy and indicate somewhere in your pic the number of the challenge. You must turn in each assignment on its due date. The work must be your own. Nothing copy written or trademarked. Have fun, experiment, try new things, and expand your art skills and knowledge!

Look through your old art projects and find one that you aren't happy with. Draw, paint, collage over it and make it into something new! Don't stop until you have something new!	Research 'Found Object Sculpture' and 'Found object jewelry'. Gather objects from around your house and yard and use them to make a piece of art.	Draw someone in your house from observation, it can be you if you'd like! Experiment with your materials, and add a background that tells a story about your subject.	Draw 3 different sketches of a project(s) you'd love to make when we get back to school. Take your time! Push your creativity and skills!	Watch 'Rivers and Tides' about artist Andy Goldsworthy (look it up!) and make a piece of art outdoors. Remember not to damage anything, and take great photos when done!
Research Origami. Find a fold you would like to create and fold at least 15 examples. Be creative and think outside the box - combine these into one finished piece	Use 3, 5 or 7 items of different sizes and heights to create a still life. Set it up in a window with natural light. Paint or draw from observation focusing on form and value	Who is one artist you always wanted to learn more about? Do some research about them. Write a short paper about what you learned and create a piece of art in their style	Covid-19 is changing our world overnight, and it is very surreal. Create a piece that captures your feelings and thoughts in this moment in history.	Find a pen. Use it to make a drawing. Keep layering until you run out of ink. Do not fear the dark side! Find balance within the force.
Develop cartoon characters that represent you and a few friends or family. Create a finished piece that depicts these characters interacting.	Use paper (can be old mail, newspapers, etc) to create a sculpture. Research different methods and artists that have worked with simple paper as a medium	ART BINGO!	Research 'Op-Art' or 'Pop-Art'. Write a paragraph about that movement, then make a piece of artwork that fits within that movement.	Use collage to make a dynamic landscape. Draw into your collage. Focus on building texture, creating the illusion of depth and color scheme.
Practice drawing your hand from multiple perspectives in multiple positions. Use tutorials if you need help. Then, create a finished piece based what you've learned.	Look through past projects you've made. Find one you loved and make another piece inspired by it. Focus on creating a high quality piece.	Make a self-portrait in any style and medium of your choosing. Capture an important part of your personality, life experiences, or mood.	Find an artist you love who works in the materials your current class is in. Write a short paper about the artist. Create a piece of art inspired by their work.	Research Cubism. Make a drawing or painting of your pet in this style. Fill the entire page with your composition (little to no negative space) focus on shape and color.
Research how to make your own pigments from plant or vegetable matter. Make your own pigment and then create a piece of art from it.	Use toilet paper and paper towel rolls and other found cardboard to make an abstract sculpture. Think about the negative space as shapes that are just as important as the sculpture.	Surprise me! Come up with your own great idea and see where it takes you	Take a pic of an everyday view and draw it. For example, inside the fridge, under the bathroom sink or stuff in the garage. Make it look amazing, using color and/or value.	Research Alexander Calder. Create a mobile in any style you would like from any materials you would like.
