Arthur Dove: An American Painter

Arthur Garfield Dove was born in 1880 in Geneva, New York, where his father was a building contractor and brick manufacturer. He attended Cornell University in Ithaca, from which he graduated in 1903. He then moved to New York City, where he worked as an illustrator for various popular magazines for several years.

When he was young, Arthur Dove traveled to Paris to explore the art and architecture, and to meet other young artists. Returning to New York, Dove met an important artist and art gallery owner named Alfred Stieglitz, who was responsible for starting the careers of several notable artists, including Georgia O'Keeffe. In 1912, Dove's first one-person show was held at 291, a New York City art gallery owned by Stieglitz. This important exhibition helped establish Dove as an important American painter.

In 1910 and 1911, Dove created a number of exciting works of art that used simple, abstract forms at a remarkably early date in American art; he is considered the first American artist to have created such purely <u>non-representational</u> images. His non-representational images showed simple lines, colors, and shapes instead of a realistic view of the world.

In 1932, Dove married the artist Helen Torr, nicknamed "Reds." Dove and Reds began living together on a houseboat docked on the north shore of Long Island, New York. Dove's main subject for his art was the local landscape, which he painted using simple forms and emotional color.

Dove's first-hand experience of the ocean tides, weather patterns, and seasonal cycles also influenced these works. Other influences included sunsets, bodies of water, mountains, and other natural forms. Dove was fascinated with cycles of growth and renewal in nature, and he was interested in using nature and natural forms in his art. He was also frequently inspired by music.

In 1933, Dove moved to Geneva, New York with Reds and lived on his family's property, even though he did not want to leave Long Island. Despite his <u>reluctance</u> to move to Geneva, which he considered too isolated, Dove remained there with Reds through 1938. Geneva provided him with new subject matter for his art, including the family farm, the local barnyard animals, and nearby lakes, as well as the city's more industrial downtown area of warehouses, machines, and railroads.

In 1938, Dove and Reds returned to Long Island and rented a small house, a former post office that stood directly on the shore of a mill pond in Centerport. Forced to live a sedentary life after a heart attack and a diagnosis of severe kidney disease, Dove was unable to leave his home. His paintings still showed the natural world, and he painted what he saw from his window.

Dove continued to work into the last year of his life; he died after suffering a heart attack in 1946, only a few months after his friend Stieglitz had passed away. Until his final days, his diary entries recorded his artistic goals alongside observations of the natural surroundings. His reputation continued to grow after his death, and he is credited with being the first abstract American artist.

Option 1: Write a Letter

Arthur Dove Landscape Project

Directions:

You will create your own Dove-inspired landscape. Follow the four steps below, and use ONLY 1 piece of sulphite paper, pencils, a sharpie, and colored pencils to complete your drawing. <u>Your finished drawing should be NEAT and COMPLETE</u>, with your ENTIRE paper colored in carefully! No white space should be showing. Use your OWN ideas, and do not copy anyone else's artwork.

Step 1: Draw the horizon line across your paper.

Step 2: Use contour lines to draw your landscape. Space your lines close together--about 1-2 cm. Your lines should be curved, with lots of movement. Consider putting the following natural elements in your drawing:

- Different types of trees
- Flowers, small plants
- Weather: rain, stormy skies, sunset, etc.
- Animals
- A specific location: beach, farm, forest, or desert

Step 3: Outline ALL of your pencil lines with a black marker.

Step 4: Fill in your design with bright, contrasting colors. Color NEATLY and make sure no white space is showing!
