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CHS senior wins Lilly Endowment scholarship

Montgomery County Community Foundation

The Montgomery County Community Foundation is pleased to announce that Campbell Mason has been named the 2024 Lilly Endowment Community Scholar for Montgomery County. He is a senior at Crawfordsville High School and the son of Keith and Rebekah Mason.

Each Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship provides for full tuition, required fees and a special allocation of up to \$900 per year for required books and required equipment for four years. The scholarship is for undergraduate students studying on a full-time basis leading to a baccalaureate degree at any eligible Indiana public or private nonprofit college or university. Lilly Endowment Community Scholars may also participate in the Lilly Scholars Network (LSN), which connects both current scholars and alumni with resources and opportunities to be active leaders on their campuses and in their communities. Both the scholarship program and LSN are supported by grants from Lilly Endowment to Independent Colleges of Indiana (ICI) and Indiana Humanities.

"I am tremendously fortunate to be named this year's Lilly Endowment Community Scholar," said Mason. "I am extremely thankful to the Montgomery County Community Foundation and Lilly Endowment for believing in me and investing in my education, as well as for their kindness throughout the

entire application process. This scholarship is an incredible opportunity, and I am grateful for the opportunities in my life that it will open. It is the highest honor to be named this scholar in such a great community. I couldn't have done it without my principals and administrators, dedicated teachers, coaches, friends, and family who supported me throughout the process. It is my current goal to attend the University of Notre Dame to pursue a degree in Economics. Once again, I am humbled and so incredibly grateful for this life-changing opportunity, and I would like to thank everyone involved at the Montgomery County Community Foundation for their belief in me. I aspire to use this further education to bring positive change back to Montgomery County."

Campbell has been involved in many different clubs and organizations throughout his high school career, including National Honor Society, Student Council, Spanish Club, and the CHS Recycling Club. He has also volunteered his time as a peer tutor, member of the Montgomery County Mental Health Task Force, and regularly helps deliver meals to the elderly through Meals on Wheels.

A talented athlete, Campbell has many accomplishments as a four-year member of the CHS varsity swim team. He is a two-time qualifier for the state finals and is serving as captain his senior year. Campbell also competes as a member of the Sugar Creek Swim Club, where he is

also a captain. When he's not in the pool Campbell enjoys playing pickleball with friends, going to the gym, and spending time with his parents and grandparents.

To be considered for the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship, students must be a resident of Montgomery County, have a minimum cumulative GPA of 3.85 on a 4.00 scale, and be in the top 10% of their graduating class at an accredited Montgomery County high school. Campbell, along with 19 other local applicants, participated in a highly selective review process that evaluated academic achievement, student activities and leadership, and two essay responses. Finalists were also required to appear before the Board of Directors of the Montgomery County Community Foundation for two interviews. Concluding the process, the scholarship committee narrowed the field of applicants and submitted the finalists' names and applications to Independent Colleges of Indiana, Inc. (ICI) for final selection of

the recipient.

The primary purposes of the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Program are: 1) to help raise the level of educational attainment in Indiana; 2) to increase awareness of the beneficial roles Indiana community foundations can play in their communities; and 3) to encourage and support the efforts of current and past Lilly Endowment Community Scholars to engage with each other and with Indiana business, governmental, educational, nonprofit and civic leaders to improve the quality of life in Indiana generally and in local communities throughout the state.

Lilly Endowment created the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship Program for the 1998-99 school year and has supported the program every year since with grants totaling in excess of \$505 million. More than 5,200 Indiana students have received the Lilly Endowment Community Scholarship since the program's inception.

Ms. Drake named Outstanding Teacher of the Gifted

Ms. Drake has faithfully served the students in Indiana as a classroom educator for over 50 years. For the last 22 years, she has taught in a self-contained high-ability classroom of third graders at Nicholson Elementary School. Ms. Drake has served on the Broad-Based Planning Committee for Crawfordsville Schools for 33 years and was instrumental in helping design and implement one of the first

formal programs for gifted students in a public school corporation in Indiana.

According to Crawfordsville Superintendent Dr. Rex Ryker, "One of Shelly's outstanding qualities is her remarkable ability to recognize and celebrate her students' individual strengths and unique abilities. She creates a nurturing classroom environment where every child feels valued and appreciated for who they are, fostering a sense of belonging and self-worth. Even as she sets high academic and behavioral expectations, Shelly's grace and understanding are a testament to her unwavering support."

Upon receiving the news that the IAG Awards Committee had chosen her as the 2023

Community Foundation announcements fall 2023 grants

The Montgomery County Community Foundation announced their awards for the 2023 Fall grant cycle. A total of \$334,003 was awarded to various local organizations. Crawfordsville Community School Corporation received money for two separate areas.

Willson Preschool received \$52,503 which will provide furniture and re-

search-based curriculum for two classrooms, allowing them to double their current program. These items will help meet criteria towards becoming Paths to Quality Certified, allowing them to accept CCDF and On My way Pre-K vouchers.

The CCSC health department received \$10,000 and the money will be used for the health and welfare of students K-12 with

financial need. This could be for dental, vision, medical, mental health care, or prescriptions. It will also provide education on topics such as drug use prevention, growth and development, CPR trainings and supplies, and more.

CCSC is very grateful for MCCF and the work they do to support our community.

First Academic Letter winners announced at CHS

Crawfordsville High School awarded its first group of Academic Letter winners recently for their participation in various academic activities.

To earn an academic letter, students are required to participate in an academic competition during their time at CHS, meet eligibility requirements, complete an application, and receive approval from the Academic Coordinator and the Academic Teams Committee, which is made up of academic team coaches.

The inaugural group includes four seniors, Beth Turner, Thomas Bowling, James Novak, and Elli Jeffries.

Principal Jay Strickland said, "The academic letter is offered at CHS to continue to praise, recognize and celebrate the academic achievements of our students. We are proud of our highly successful

academic teams and encourage our students to participate in team and individual competitions. This was an idea that came from some of our Academic Team coaches such as Maggie Bryant, Emily Race, Kelli Bowling and Cindy Turner."

The eligibility requirements include a 2.75 cumulative GPA at application time, and a minimum of 12 points over a minimum of two academic school years involved in one or both categories of academic teams and individual academic competitions. One season of an academic team earns a student four points. Individual competitions such as the Anna Willson Oratorical Contest are worth two points. After earning the initial letter, students can earn an additional bar for every six points earned. Both Turner and Novak earned a bar after their letter.



Beth Turner, Thomas Bowling, James Novak, and Elli Jeffries earned the first-ever Academic Letter for participation in academic activities including Academic Super Bowl, Speech Team, and Spell Bowl.
