#### WHAT IS AUTHOR'S CRAFT?

- Author's Craft is the language and techniques that the author purposely uses to <u>craft</u>
   (or create) and <u>enhance</u> a story
- Includes LITERARY DEVICES,
   STYLE, and NARRATIVE
   ELEMENTS





- Add meaning
- Create more compelling stories
- Give the reader a greater understanding
- Help the reader visualize the text



 Simile – a comparison of two completely different things using "like" or "as"

Example: "...David stumbled to a dusty corner of the bathroom and slid to the floor like a rag doll."



 Metaphor – a direct comparison of two different things; conveys meaning by this comparison

Example: Ms. Scheve was a raging firestorm the other day.



Example: Luckily, Ms. Scheve is a cool refreshing breeze today.



 Personification - When a non-living object, concept, or animal is spoken of as though it has human qualities

Example: The wind and rain decided to pick up and show their anger just as the trick-ortreaters began to descend on the neighborhood.

 Hyperbole - an exaggeration for purposeful effect, definitely not to be taken literally

Example: This past Thanksgiving we had enough food to feed an army. It was a good thing too because I was hungry enough to eat a horse.



#### LITERARY TERM

• Allusion - the writer or speaker refers either directly or indirectly to a person, event, or thing in history or to a work of art or literature

EXAMPLE: "Ms. Cheapskate didn't like to spend money. She was no Scrooge, but she seldom purchased anything except the bare necessities".



#### LITERARY TERM

 Parallel Structure - repetition of the same pattern of words or phrases within a sentence or passage to show that two or more ideas have the same level of importance or are connected thematically (also called "parallelism")

EXAMPLE: The coach told the players that they should get a lot of sleep, that they should not eat too much, and that they should do some warm-up exercises before the game.

 Irony – when the outcome is the opposite of what is expected

EXAMPLE: One would expect a billboard on a crowded road to be seen by many people. When Calvin Schwab rents one in an attempt to finally be noticed, the road upon which it is located is, ironically, closed for construction so no one sees it and he remains "unseen."



 Imagery - descriptive language that appeals to the reader's 5 senses

(touch, smell, sound, taste, and sight)

Similes, metaphors, and personification are all **types** of imagery

# FIGURATIVE LANGUAGE REFRESHER

For example: Line 1: "Remember those walls I built..."

- Is Beyoncé known for traveling the United States with a hard hat, bricks and mortar, building walls?
- NO! As listeners, we have to make *inferences* of her intended meaning by analyzing her use
   of figurative language.

#### CLAIM IT: NAME IT! FRAME IT!

Claim It! Quote from the Work	Name It! Label the Device/Technique	Frame It! Explain/Analyze Author's Purpose
"Remember those walls I built"

#### CLAIM IT NAME IT! FRAME IT!

Claim It! Quote from the Work	Name It! Label the Device/Technique	Frame It! Explain/Analyze Author's Purpose
"Remember those walls I built"	walls=metaphor	To show that she's been hurt before and is guarding her emotions/ heart
"they didn't even put up a fight"	personification	To show that she is really in love now, not fighting it
"I got my <i>angel</i> now"	metaphor and/or allusion	To show emotional significance of new love
