When he sighted Cuba later that October, he believed it to be China. During his expedition in December of 1492, he found Hispaniola, which he thought to be Japan. He established the first Spanish colony in America with 39 of his men. He proudly returned to Spain with gold and spices in March 1493. On his third journey, Columbus realized that he had not reached Asia, but actually stumbled upon an unknown continent to the Europeans—the Americas.

People who had had yellow fever were immune. <sup>A</sup>They couldn't possibly get the disease again. <sup>B</sup>But none of the men on Reed's team had ever had a full-blown attack of yellow fever. <sup>C</sup>Reed had certainly never had the disease. Neither had Lazear or Carroll. Though there was a chance that the Cuban-born Agramonte might have had a very mild case as a small child, he was not definitely immune. <sup>D</sup>And all four doctors knew that by being on the fever-stricken island of Cuba, by coming close to sick patients, and by studying bacteria in the lab, they were running a serious risk of getting yellow fever.
