 - 38 seventh graders received probation letters for Math in Term 1. (35 Cs and 3 Ds)
 - 33 eighth graders received probation letters for Language Arts in Term 1. (19 Cs, 13 Ds, and 1 F)

SPURLOCK'S GOAL NOT MET

- Annual Student Outcome Goal Plan
 - By the end of March 2022 (Term 3), the 37 students on probation in 6th and 7th grades will decrease the number of deficiencies in Math by 46% from 37 to 20.
 - Went from 37 students to 34 students on Probation for Math from Term 1 to Term 3.
 - Decreased by 8.11%

- 15 eighth graders received a probation letter for ELA and another core subject 



TERM 3 Data

JONES' GOAL NOT MET

- Annual Student Outcome Goals Plan
 - Decrease the number of 7th Grade Probation letters in Math by 47% by the end of March 2022 (Term 3).
 - Went from 19 students in Term 1 to 22 students in Term 3.
 - Increase of 15.79%.
 - Decrease the number of 8th Grade Probation letters in ELA by 55% by the end of March 2022 (Term 3).
 - Went from 33 students in Term 1 to 27 students in Term 3.
 - Decreased by 18.18%



HOW CAN WE IMPROVE OUR GOALS?

- Lower the percentages in our annual student outcome goals to make them more achievable.
- Be consistent with small groups for several topics.
- Continue conducting individualized Academic Sessions with each student.

WHAT WE CAN CELEBRATE!!!!

- There were **no students** in 6th and 7th grades that received a probation letter for 3 or more subjects for Term 3.
- Each student received an Academic Session during the Fall and Spring Semester to discuss grades and to offer academic supports.
