Woody Guthrie is a famous folksinger and song writer that wrote songs about everyday lives and happenings of people and events. Woody Guthrie was born in 1912 in Okemah, Oklahoma. In the 1930s Woody traveled by train, foot and even hitchhiked across the country. He ended up in California where he lived as a hobo, a homeless person. He often would write and sing songs to the migrant workers who also lived in California. In 1940, Woody traveled to New York City where he wrote and recorded many of his famous songs such as, "This Land is Your Land."

By the 1950's, Woody had became very ill and spend the rest of his life in hospitals. He died in 1967.

Will Rogers was a traveling professional entertainer, well-known writer, and Broadway performer. He was born on a ranch near Oologah, Oklahoma on November 4, 1879 but later he claimed Claremore as his home. He traveled as an entertainer with Colonel Zack Mulhall's Wild West Show. Later, he had a well known newspaper column about politics. Rogers had a love for planes and aviation. Will Rogers died in a plane crash in Alaska in 1935. Humorously, Oklahoma City's airport was later named "Will Rogers World Airport." Will Rogers is remembered for being kind and generous. During the depression he paid for nurses to work with the Cherokee Indians in Eastern Oklahoma, he was part Cherokee indian, he felt the need to support other tribe members.
